

Lancaster August 19<sup>th</sup> - 1807

Accept my dearest Becky my warmest congratulations on the propitious nuptials of your amiable friend - that she is united to a worthy and respectable man - our loved aunt affirms who she doubts not will render her perfectly happy - and strew her path of life with roses - too long has thorns availed to abeome her once bright prospects - I well know what your sensations were when apprised of her marriage - and can pardon - a silence which procured from - a source of so much joy - her tender friend still far my Becky was truly conspicuous in devoting - such a moment to her - when her ~~heart~~ must have been divided - and perplexed by a thousand nameless emotions - I hope you may not be disappointed in the expected visit from her - aunt Shirah intends writing to you from her - you will receive every information of the husband of your friend - I had a letter from my dear Sally Lucas a few days ago they were all well - she bade me to congratulate you on Maria's marriage - she says Mr Hafforan - is a man of sense and talents - from my dearest Eliza I have had no letter since I have been here - the S. Lucas says she is in health - and would write soon - she adds her spirits are bad - which makes me very unhappy about her - Heaven grant no new source of trouble has happened to cast a gloom over her prospects - af blip - for in the last letter she said they were bright - from her acute sensibility I have much to dread - and her last favorite aunt is in a decline which threatens my loved friend - with a depreciation of her maternal

I feel written in a penseroso style to day - I can account for it in some measure - for I have heard nothing but the mournfuls - last evening poor Henry Rippel expired - after only one weeks illness - and left his inconsolable wife in the most melancholy situation possible - hourly expecting to usher into the world a second pledge of the affection - of her departed Husband - Her friends dread the consequence of her violent grief and fear it will prove fatal - indeed they already think her infant dead - Did you ever see any Becks hear of a more deplorable event - every person here appear uninterested and have prevailed on her if possible to bear the removal - to stay during her confinement at her mother's - to remove from a habitation that was wont to be cheered by the presence of her good partner - must cast her among a party who have scarcely been able to think of any thing else all day - and indeed feel unfit for writing - Still reflect <sup>with</sup> pleasure on your all being happy - and delighted with your charming retreat - which you can now enjoy whilst the alarming accounts of our desertsed City decrease - and your minds are no longer tortured by a agonising fears for the safety of those you love -

I wish much to hear how my dear cousin Fanny and her lovely children are - note one of you have mentioned them in your letters - in you next say every thing about them -

My dear Packets letter was handed me this afternoon - thank her for it - and will reply to it soon - was rejoiced to hear you all prospered health - and that my loved cousin Fitchie and Mr Hays latterly as faring as a visitor - I hope they will come and not fancy obstacles to prevent them - we shall all be happy to welcome them here - I sent a letter to that loved woman to day -
