thing for her was to go to face, as she was then & still from  
parting with her child, and really I could not but wonder  
at the change in her appearance, the pure air and  
beautiful face of nature quite revived her spirit, she  
has been gathering flowers and listening to singing birds  
instead brushing away the dust raised by noisy omn-
