

Philadelphia May 2nd - 1808

I will endeavour for the future, to give less credit to common report, and yet my dear friend, you know how difficult it is to moderate ones anxiety when those we love are so much concerned. Your letter delighted me, for I feel that my hopes are easily raised to my wishes, and one dear Harriet has so frequently been restored from an almost despairing state of weakness, that I hope she may yet be spared to us for many years.

The Dr's account is encouraging, but tho he gives us every thing to hope, the utmost care must be taken to preserve her from the frequent changes of weather, to which the climate of Albany & New York are incident, I wish your plan of a voyage to sea could be effected - I am ashamed to importune you, who are so good and indulgent to all my requests, but when you have recovered from the fatigue of moving let me hear how you are, for the Harriet is an object of more immediate solicitude - your very dear Maria occupies many of my anxious thoughts. Rachel has followed your advice I hope you will soon follow her example - her boy is weaned - Dr. Kahn says there is no time to be lost at this season - summer is so near

therefore do not delay - It is probable your little Edward will be benefited by it. I hear he is the most beautiful Child in the world. Mrs. Lyden is here & the Col, on a visit to their daughter. They also mentioned Harriet's great anxiety to be with you, and the probability of her embracing the first opportunity -
