

Pickensville May 8<sup>th</sup> 1828 -

My dear Rebecca, you know not how much gratified I have been in seeing your nephew - Henry. he has made not only Catharine and myself his friends, for we you know have a natural propensity to love all that belongs to you; but each member of my family seem to fall in the conviction - that he is most amiable and interesting; Tell his mother that her children shall always find in us those beings that will cherish them - you my beloved Rebecca are among those precious treasures that bring a value to all that belongs to you. Will you my dear see our friend Miss Gibbs, whom you will find either at Mrs Ware - or shortly to be there - and after introducing yourself to her - whom we say she wants to know above any one else in the world - present her with the enclosed Packet, tell her when I sent my letter to the post office - which was written in the moment I received hers from Govehland Court House. it was too late for the mail and I did not think it worth while to forward a letter in pursuit of the traveller - she will find her Trunk at Mr Ware, 12 puerume - but should you get this letter before Miss Gibbs reaches Philadelphia will you let Mr Ware know, Miss Gibbs' Trunk was sent by "The
