My Dear Peggy

I have been at war with my conscience for several months, in which I have apparently neglected you, yet am willing to suppose you would deem me sufficiently punished did you know how often I have anxiously wished for information of you - which my own fault deprived me of.

Your late misfortune, and subsequent illness, my dear Peggy, has excited my kindest sympathy, and tho' sensible I can offer no acceptable consolation, I hope you will receive the commiseration of a friend, and her best wishes for your better health, to be assured of which from yourself is my strongest motive for writing at present. I heard yesterday from Wm. Davidson that you were recovering.

Give my affectionate love to Amelia, and my respect to your sister, Sally & Rachel request their affectionate remembrance - My sister Mary has escaped any alarming attack this spring but, enjoys very delicate health. I have some thoughts of paying my friends in New York a visit next month. I hope I shall hear

orders to hasten - and witness her maternal happiness - which is
