I should have replied to your, and Ann's affectionate Letters My dearest Ben, before this but Alas! I had nothing to say but a repetition of sad & sor rowful feeling _ or the detail of our poor nieces' sufferings Isabella has been very ill, since her dear Mothers death _ no doubt distress has accelerated her disease, which at all times for years has been so very severe I am with them daily and the presence of their most affectionate Aunt Sally Etting is duly appreciated _ and gives them much consolation yet the loss of such a parent is not likely to be borne without much mental suffering _ they are doing as well as possible and try to submit to the [Divine] will aiding each other, and deeply [sympathizing?] with each other in their individual bereavement for more than a year _ Miriam has devoted herself [end of page]

to home duties _ and strict attendance on her Mother while poor Isabella when free from her afflictive spells of coughing was ever by her side _ so they have prepared themselves, with consola tion from a sense of having perfor -med their duties _ and a conscious -ness that they were acceptable to the beloved departed _ Henry was much benefitted by his jour -ney to the Virginia Springs tho' he was much shaken, on returning home to find his mother in the agonies of death or rather sink -ing calmly into the sleep _ which

terminates our existence here, _ she recognized him _ but could not speak _ and expired with her hand clasped in his _ poor fellow! his heart is sadly disap -pointed _ the hope of seeing her enjoy the fruit of his labor _ has ended _ but the charge of his sisters, will still interest him _ and the privilege of having passed some months with her after his long absence _ when she had [end of page]

reached a great age. will be a future source of grateful memory.

Jo left on Tuesday for his Virginia trip _ of business _ it is not much to his fancy but Jac is unable to travel, indeed he had a chill on Monday _ though it has not been followed by any increase of illness Hyman & our Sister Hays are well _ all her daughters have left Miriam Cohen is the only one of our nieces here she has three lovely intelligent children with her she sends her love, and has been hoping for the happiness of sharing your visit, to which we look forward with earnest desire _ she will sail in the Steamer on the 27th, the weather is beautiful we have rarely experienced a more lovely Autumn give My love to Dear Ann and my little pet nieces and also to your sons I hope Hyman's arm is improving & that they are all well & happy _ when I last saw Charleton Hunt she told me Hyman would be here this Autumn _ so I hope to see him with you [end of page]

When you write to Howard give my love to him & his wife _ I suppose Gratz Moses has

returned home, the last accounts received from St Louis, gave more favorable news of his parents' health _ our brothers send you their love _ Henry Etting has just returned from Balt he saw Jo there _ who thought he would be back in about 10 days _ Miriam desires her best love to you her Aunt Ann God bless you My beloved Brother _ May we embrace you in health & comfort _ and may you & yours long enjoy happiness together is the fervent prayer of your Affectionate Sister RGratz
