I am so happy my dear Maria to escape from my confinement, that I must communicate my pleasure to you, my faithful Friend. in sickness and in sorrow I have ever found sympathy in your bosom. I regret your feelings should have been so much excited on the late occasion. my illness was of a much more painful nature to my Friends than to myself. my fever was not so violent as to make me delirious but excited my spirits beyond their natural bent to reduce which Doctor Kuhn tried all his skill, and after spilling 50 ounces of my loyal blood, poising me with 6 ounces salts, 16 grains calomel, two large blisters, frequent warm bathing, cataplasms, large potions of foaming draught, oyster shell, prepared, [calcine magnisia] &c &c &c. too tedious to mention. I am again on my feet and right glad to once more visit these lower regions my Doctor took his leave on Monday after giving me strict injunctions to be careful in my diet and so on and above all to keep out of the hands of the [end of page]

Doctors. for which advice, and his cure of me, I [pronounce] him the best Doctor in christendom not bating your Post and Pillar Esculapius who may be a very good Doctor for New York. I have of my own accord put on gauze stockings under my silk ones which expedient dear Maria I would wish you to adopt _ they are comfortable and salutary. March you know is a most trying month to invalids and you cannot be too cautious in preserving your valued health. are yours well as when you last wrote to me? Rodman gave Becky a hint that you dresst too thinly as soon as your Husband returns I wish you to familiarize him to the Idea of your promised visit to us, I already begin to enjoy it in anticipation, and thus you see by a delightful future cheat the dull hours. How is Anne? and how is dear Eliza and her bouncing boy? too much occupied with him I suppose to bestow a thought on her poor sick Friend give my love to her notwithstanding [end of page]

and to Anne too _ was she not astonished at the

consummation of "The youthful pair"? Becky [wishes] to write a postcrip so I must cease my nonsence May God Bless! you with perfect health and every happiness is the sincere prayer of your faithful and affectionate Friend till death!
