## Margaret (Peggy) Ewing to Rebecca Gratz

July 14, 1805

Easton, July 14th.

I did not intend that you should have been beforehand with me in your remembrances but that you have been so, gives me a great deal of pleasure independent of the gratification to my vanity I have been so [whirled] about since I saw you, that I did not feel myself stationary long enough to tell you where my abode was and since I came here, my old employment, nursing, together with the extreme hot weather, has made me almost unfit for any thing Amelia still continues to have chills and since Boston air has failed in driving them away, I know not what will have effect Mamma too has not been well but I bear all wonderfully here I have pitied you Philadelphians \_ do pray tell me where Sally contrived to get cold this burning weather for my part I think I shall literally melt away if it continues much longer \_ you do not say any thing of Mrs. Hayes \_ I presume therefore she is well \_

Mrs. Rodman's regret at not being better acquainted with me is extremely flattering \_ I should be unjust to her as well as to myself if I did not also lament the accident which prevented my knowing her more intimate--ly \_ you must remember me to her when you write \_ Rachel, I suppose, will spend the summer with her what has become of Mrs. Hopkinson \_ I hear nothing of her I presume you do not keep up much of the ceremonial of visiting \_ excepting it be by moon-light \_ In spite of the men's scandalous accusations against us, we shall all, I think, be votaries of Diana, at least this hot weather I wish I could have derived so much advantage from my travels as to have amused you by an account of them but though I have climbed and descended mountains, I have met with no fairies or giants to retard <u>my progress</u>; nor valorous Quixote's to break the enchantment, had I been so encountered and as the Goddess of Romance does not appear to reside in this quartre of the world, I have no hopes of [deriving?] any [end of page]
