The History of School Policing

Purpose

This video provides a history lesson about the rise of using police officers in New York City Schools, which was a notable change from using safety agents in schools.

Reid details how the number of police officers in New York City public schools has risen to more than 5,000. This trend to use police officers to discipline children often overlooks the historical perspective that shows the correlation to racism.
