Genesis 32-34 - Lesson 39

Jacob and Esau Reconcile

1. Gen 32:1-21 - Jacob Returns to the Land

- a. Angels are in constant with Jacob, here God's host welcomes him back to the land
- b. "that I may find grace" 8x he calls him "lord", 5x he uses "grace", 4x "servant"
- c. "my lord" Jacob's perspective has changed since the days of usurping Esau
- d. 9-12 Jacob's first prayer shows his change: "I am not worthy" (only 3 people say it)
 - i. 2x grace shows up before it is with Noah, and Lot, two times of destruction.

2. Gen 32:22-32 - Jacob Wrestles with God

- a. Jesus also stayed up all night "wrestling" with God in prayer Lk 6:12, 22:41-44
- b. "wrestled" this is a physical struggle, and Jacob is strong; but God's lesson is to show Jacob his strength is not in his flesh, but in his clinging to God in weakness
- c. Israel = thou hast prevailed with God, not in his flesh, but by his supplication
- d. Israel prevails with God and men; the church in contrast has no strength Rom 5:6
- e. This night transforms Jacob from smart supplanter, to the crippled prince Ge 27:36
- f. Hos 12:3-4 Israel is reminded of this when they face a similar struggle (Hos 14:2)

3. Gen 33 - Jacob Meets with Esau

- a. Similar to the response of the prodigal son's father a picture of reconciliation
- b. Esau has changed from when he was younger as well Gen 27:41 and Ge 28:9
- c. How do relationships get restored/reconciled? Grace. From one person.
 - i. Esau did not require Jacob to give him presents.
 - ii. Jacob did not presume Esau should forgive him.
- d. Grudges should not be harbored. Take the wrong. Forgive. Give grace.
 - i. Remove pride Become the servant not worthy.
 - 1. Meet/admit your failure as Jacob did. (Prov 13:10)
 - ii. Respect the other Esteem them better than you (Phil 2:3-4, 1 Cor 13:4-5)
 - iii. Give grace first Jacob did not presume it. Grace doesn't expect.
- e. 33:10 "face of God" both in Gen 32, but also the grace Esau showed him in return
 - i. Jacob dwells in peace in Shechem, where Abram met God in the land.

4. Gen 34 - Dinah and Shechem

- a. Jacob has learned, his sons have not. We see revenge affecting their futures.
 - i. God is not mentioned at all in Genesis 34.
- b. Why did Dinah go out to see the daughters of the land? cf. Gen 26:34-35
- c. 34:7 "ought not to be done" b/c of of their covenant with God
- d. 34:9 "give us your daughters, take our daughters" forbidden under law De 7:3
- e. 34:11 Shechem is looking for grace, because he loves her, but he doesn't get it.
- f. Some things are not bought and sold, but are valued higher: women and truth
- g. "deceitfully" They insulted God's covenant, used it as a means of vengeance
- h. Simeon and Levi (Dinah's brothers) slay the men in evil anger Gen 49:5-7
- i. Jacob was not the wrongdoer here, but his sons Deu 32:25, Nah 1:2, Rom 12:19
