- AB: Sergei Prokofiev's ballet, Romeo and Juliet, 113 114 caused a great stir in New York when it was performed by the Bolshoi Ballet starring Galina 115 Ulanova. Ms. Ulanova had portrayed Juliet in 116 the first Russian performance of the ballet 117 nearly two decades earlier. The impresario Sol 118 119 Hurok had been trying to arrange a Bolshoi 120 visit for 35 years - and it finally happened in 121 The company made an explosive impact on the audience and so did Prokofiev's music. 122
- AB: The score is rather unusual for ballet music of 123 124 its time. Although there are many memorable 125 dance numbers, there are also extended scenes 126 where the passionate and tragic atmosphere of the love story is created by music that cannot 127 128 be danced. Instead it must be evoked in a kind of pantomime that is much more akin to acting. 129 In fact the entire ballet is composed in a 130 131 rather symphonic style.
- Perhaps it is no surprise then that today it is
 quite common to see selections from the ballet
 presented to concert audiences. In fact,
 Prokofiev himself constructed 3 orchestral
 suites based on selections from the larger
