- Hello and welcome to another broadcast by the New 20 York Philharmonic. We'll hear selections from 21 Tchaikovsky's ballet Swan Lake a little later in 22 the program. Up next, the orchestra's multi-season 23 Nielsen project draws to a close when Principal 24 Clarinet Anthony McGill is the soloist in the 25 Danish composer's Clarinet Concerto. Here to tell 26 us more is Alan Gilbert: 27

- AB: One of the most challenging pieces in the clarinet 30 repertoire, Nielsen wrote this work in 1928. 31 composer was feeling nervous and apprehensive about 32 the state of the world at the time and was perhaps 33 also aware that he was nearing the end of his life. 34 Some have felt that these feelings are at the root 35 of the intense struggle and conflict that dominate 36 this concerto, although there is also a theory that 37 he was poking fun at the constant mood swings of 38 the player for whom it was written - Aage Oxenvad. 39 Whatever the case, the music has abrupt changes of 40 feeling and character. - normally self-deprecating Tchaikovsky was seemingly
