AB: We next feature one of the last works penned by
Richard Strauss; his oboe concerto in D-major
from 1945.

In the later stages of World War II, Richard Strauss was apprehended by American soldiers at his Garmisch estate in Bavaria. As he descended the staircase, he announced to the soldiers, "I am Richard Strauss, the composer of Rosenkavalier and Salomé." The U.S. lieutenant in charge of the operation happened to be a musician and ordered that an 'Off Limits' sign be placed on the lawn to protect the elderly composer.

Corporal John de Lancie was also part of that U.S. Army unit and was principal oboist of the Pittsburgh Symphony under Fritz Reiner by trade. He knew Strauss's orchestral writing for oboe thoroughly and, in the course of a long conversation with composer, De Lancie asked him if he had ever considered writing an oboe concerto. Strauss answered simply "No," and the topic was dropped. However, in the months to follow, the idea grew on him and Strauss completed the score of his Oboe Concerto on September 14, 1945.

49 The oboe concerto was premiered on February 26, 1946 in Zürich. As the concerto was being 50 prepared for print in early 1948, Strauss 51 revised and expanded its last-movement coda. 52 53 Strauss remembered Corporal de Lancie and saw to it that rights to the U.S. premiere were 54 55 assigned to him. By then, however, de Lancie had given up his chair in Pittsburgh for a 56 57 junior post with the Philadelphia Orchestra. 58 Though De Lancie was honored, Orchestra protocol dictated that Philadelphia's principal 59 would get the soloist part. So De Lancie 60 61 instead gave the rights to the U.S. premiere to a young oboist friend at the CBS Symphony 62 Orchestra in New York by the name of Mitch 63 64 Miller. Miller, of course, later became famous as a music producer, conductor and host of a 65 very popular sing-along TV show. 66 John de Lancie eventually went on to become the 67 68 principal oboist for the Philadelphia Orchestra—a post he held for 30 years--but it 69 70 was only after his retirement that he finally performed and recorded the Strauss oboe 71 Concerto. 72
