- AB: Zubin Mehta was born on April 29, 1936 in what is 43 now Mumbai, India (but what was then known as 44 Bombay.) His father, Mehli, founded the Bombay 45 Symphony and was considered to be India's foremost 46 concert violinist: 47
- (MUSIC SAMPLE) 48

AB: After briefly pursuing studies in medicine, the 49 young Zubin moved to Vienna in 1954. There, he 50 studied with the eminent conductor Hans [Zvar-OVE-51 skee] Swarowsky at the Music Academy. (Swarowsky, 52 by the way, was a one-time associate of Richard 53 Strauss.) Mehta studied piano, double-bass, and 54 composition. But it was on the conductor's 55 platform where he truly stood out. His teachers 56 marveled at the young man's effortless ability to 57 assimilate scores. Equally impressive was his 58 strikingly elegant baton technique; his 59 instructions were crystal clear to the orchestra. 60 Zubin Mehta's rise to fame was meteoric. He made 61 his conducting debut in 1958-just four years after 62 his arrival in Vienna. That same year, he won the 63 International Conducting Competition in Liverpool. 64 Shortly after that, he won the Koussevitsky 65 competition in Tanglewood.

AB: The New York Philharmonic can proudly boast that 75 it, too, was among the first international-caliber 76 orchestras to engage Zubin Mehta. His first 77 concerts with them took place at the old Lewissohn 78 Stadium in July, 1960. Mehta had been selected as 79 the Stadium Concerts' Young Conductor of the Year. 80 As a result, the handsome young artist was given 81 two programs-one with legendary mezzo-soprano [REE-82 zuh] Rise Stevens. The other featured cello Aldo 83 Perisot [pare-ee-SOH] and pianist John Browning. 84

- AB: Just one year later, Zubin Mehta was named Music 91 Director of the Montreal Symphony. In 1962-while 92 still under the age of 30-he began a 14-year tenure 93 with the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Before the 94 decade was through, Mr. Mehta made his debut at the 95 Met and he also began an historic relationship with 96 the Israel Philharmonic that continues to this day. 97 And these are just highlights of a decade teeming 98
- It was in January, 1976, that Zubin Mehta was 100 invited to become the New York Philharmonic's Music 101 102 Director. Like his predecessor, Pierre Boulez, Mehta had made only a few guest appearances with 103 the orchestra prior to the appointment. 104 And it was clear—even after the enough. 105 announcement-that Zubin was to be a different kind 106 of Music Director: 107

109 AB: Mehta brought with him a fresh attitude towards
110 repertoire, as well as to orchestra politics.

AB: Wilhelm [FOORT-vang-ler]Furtwangler is best 138 remembered today for being one of the preeminent 139 conductors during the first half of the 20th 140 Century. (In fact, he led the world premiere of the 141 Bartok we just heard.) Nevertheless, Furtwangler 142 considered himself to be-- first and foremost-- a 143 composer. Having grown up on the older man's 144 recordings, Zubin Mehta honored Furtwangler's 145 memory in 1986 by conducting the Scherzo from 146 Furtwangler's Symphony No. 2 in e-minor. 147 concert, which was given to mark the Furtwangler 148 centenary, also featured works by Saint-Saens and 149 A perfect example of Mr. Mehta placing a Bruckner: 150 virtually unknown work into context: 151

152 (MUSIC)

AB: You can hear the influence of Bruckner in that 153 music by Wilhelm Furtwangler. That was the Scherzo 154 to his second symphony as performed in February, 155 1986. The New York Philharmonic was conducted by 156 Zubin Mehta. Later, that evening, Mr. Mehta would 157 conduct Bruckner's Fourth Symphony to further 158 illustrate the musical connections between the two 159 160 composers.

161 (SLIGHT PAUSE)

AB: Mr. Mehta also had a special affinity for the 163 composers of the Second Viennese School. 164 when the appearance of Anton Webern's name on a 165 program could kill ticket sales, Zubin Mehta boldly 166 programmed the composer's Six Pieces for Orchestra. 167 And he didn't just do it once. He led over two 168 dozen performances of the work during his 169 170 residency. He even brought it on tour:

AB: When that music was first performed on March 31, 172 1913, it was greeted with cat-calls, boos and 173 Now it is recognized as one of the major 174 achievements of 20th Century music and it is a 175 vital part of what might be called the "new" 176 standard repertory. We heard the Six Pieces for 177 Orchestra, Op. 6 by Anton Webern. The New York 178 Philharmonic was conducted by one of the composer's 179 greatest advocates, Zubin Mehta. 180

To help audiences better understand the music,
Mehta sometimes included the Six Pieces with works
by Haydn or Mahler. Other pairings included
Varese, Ravel, and Rachmaninoff.

The imaginations of Philharmonic audiences under
Mehta's direction were stretched and their worlds
were made bigger. And this growth wasn't limited
to the European tradition. It included deeper
explorations of American music, Latin music, and
even Indian Classical Music:

In April 1981, the New York Philharmonic welcomed 195 AB: another of India's greatest musical ambassadors to 196 Avery Fisher Hall: Ravi Shankar. Zubin Mehta led 197 the premiere of Mr. Shankar's Second Concerto for 198 Sitar and Orchestra, Raga-Mala. The piece was not 199 only played by the Philharmonic, but they 200 commissioned the piece: 201

202 (MUSIC)

AB: Ravi Shankar was the sitar player in that excerpt 203 from his Concerto No. 2, Raga-Mala. Zubin Mehta 204 conducted the New York Philharmonic in that 205 broadcast recording from April, 1981. That was 206 actually the first time Mr. Shankar and Mr. Mehta 207 worked together professionally. Four years later, 208 they'd again combine their gifts to perform Mr. 209 Shankar's Concerto No. 1 for the Philharmonic's 210 Opening Gala. 211

- 213 AB: Mr. Mehta also shed new light on composers closer
- to home. Here he is leading a performance of

- 241 accomplishment."
- 242 (MUSIC SHIFT)
- AB: Mr. Mehta presided over many important debuts and 243 Philharmonic firsts during his 13 seasons as Music 244 Director. We might mention the first Horizons 245 festival of contemporary music. There was the 246 Orchestra's first tour to India. Or there was the 247 time in July, 1986 when the Philharmonic played to 248 800,000 people in Central Park--the largest 249 audience ever assembled for a classical music 250 concert. His residency also saw the U.S. debut of 251 Evgeny Kissin. The professional orchestra debut of 252 Midori. The Philharmonic debuts of Placido Domingo 253 & Luciano Pavarotti. And-the Philharmonic 254 conducting debut of Kurt Masur: 255
- 256 (MUSIC)
- 257 AB: On May 28, 1991 Zubin Mehta led the Philharmonic in 258 a star-studded performance of Arnold Schoenberg's 259 Gurrelieder. It was his last concert as the 260 orchestra's Music Director.

(MUSIC) 261 Before stepping down from the Philharmonic, Mr. 262 Mehta had already been named as Music Director for 263 Life by the Israel Philharmonic and he was made 264 Chief Conductor of the Maggio Muscale in 1985. 265 He'd also become even more of a household name 266 through the success of the "Three Tenors" concerts, 267 which he conducted. From 1998 to 2006 he was Music 268 Director of the Bavarian State Opera in Munich and 269 he led complete Ring Cycles in Chicago, Munich, and 270 Valencia. 271 272 (MUSIC) AB: And, of course, Mr. Mehta has returned to guest-273 conduct his former hometown orchestra in New York 274 more than 20 times. In recent years, those 275 appearances have included two Bruckner Symphonies: 276 The Seventh: 277 (MUSIC) 278 AB: ...and the Eighth: 279 (MUSIC) 280 281 282

284 AB: Mr. Mehta also led a very memorable performance of 285 the Elgar cello concerto with Alisa Weilerstein as 286 soloist. He said he could see the spirit of his 287 dearly departed friend Jacqueline Du Pre smiling at 288 him during the concert.

- AB: Few conductors have as many medals and honors as 290 Zubin Mehta. Few people have done so much as he 291 Together with his brother for art and culture. 292 Zarin he is a co-chairman of the Mehli Mehta Music 293 Foundation in India where more than 200 children 294 are educated in Western Classical Music. The 295 Buchmann-Mehta School of Music in Tel Aviv develops 296 young talent in Israel and is closely related to 297 the Israel Philharmonic Orchestra. He has also 298 created programs that target outreach to young Arab 299 Israelis in the cities of Shwaram and Nazareth with 300 local teachers and members of the Israel 301 Philharmonic Orchestra. 302
