Strauss was here inspired by a 14th century folk tale about a mischievous figure who swears revenge on all mankind after being rejected by a lovely In the end, after causing a great deal of trouble, Till Eulenspiegel falls victim to the Hangman's noose.

Like many folk-figures, there is evidence that tTill Eulenspiegel is based, at least in part, on factual events. Supporting this idea is the fact that in a little town near Lübeck there is a tombstone dating back to 1350 with an inscription that reads, "This stone no one should lift up. Here is buried Eulenspiegel." In German, Eulenspiegel means Owl-glass and it so happens the grave stone is etched with the image of an owl clutching a mirror.

124		Balakirev not only suggested that the subject
125		of Romeo and Juliet might yield some quality
126		music, but also provided Tchaikovsky with a
127		rather detailed outline for the score.
128		Tchaikovsky, it seemed, needed only to "fill in
129		the blanks," as it were.

When Tchaikovsky introduced his first drafts of his score to the older man later that year, however, Balakirev expressed his general dissatisfaction with the piece, particularly with the music that was supposed to suggest Friar Laurence.

After some revisions, Tchaikovsky heard his score performed roughly a year later in 1870.

Balakirev remained, on the whole, dissatisfied with it. Fast-Forward ten more years to 1880 and it was Tchaikovsky, not very happy with the score himself, that decided to revise the work yet again, but this time of his own accord.
