"More than any other work of Mozart it represents the ideal of the 18th Century 31 gentleman," wrote Cuthbert Girdlestone in his 32 33 book on Mozart's piano concertos. Mr. Girdlestone goes on to write, "It is a thing of
- Girdlestone goes on to write, "It is a thing of good taste... It touches on many subjects and goes deeply into none. This is the ideal of galant music."

98		artistic triumphs, the introspective nature of

139	appreciated for the masterpiece it is. In his
140	commentary on Mozart's piano concertos the
141	renowned music authority, H. C. Robbins Landon,
142	was high in praise of this work, calling it
143	"the grandest, most difficult and most
144	symphonic of them all." Jeffrey Kahane agrees.
