22 AB: Conductor Christoph Eschenbach with a brief 23 overview of the program he'll conduct on this 24 week's broadcast. Mr. Eschenbach will take the 25 stage here at Avery Fisher Hall any minute...and 26 when he does, he'll conduct the U.S. premiere 27 of "Towards Osiris" by Matthias Pintscher.

(SLIGHT PAUSE)

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29 AB: Born in 1971, German composer Matthias Pintscher is one of today's most distinctive 30 musical voices. The work which we're about to 31 32 hear was written in 2005 on a commission from Sir Simon Rattle and the Berlin Philharmonic. 33 The piece is one of four so-called "asteroid" 34 pieces that was originally conceived to 35 accompany performances of The Planets by Gustav 36 Holst. 37

38 Mr. Pintscher's title refers to the Egyptian god who is hacked to death by his jealous 39 brother Seth; but his sister (and consort) Isis 40 41 searches for and gathers up the pieces of his body and restores him to life. Osiris remains 42 in the underworld, while his sister gives birth 43 to their son Horus, god of light and the 44 living. Here's Mr. Pintscher to tell us more 45 about the piece: 46

- 49 AB: The Chicago Tribune described Towards Osiris as
- 50 "extraordinarily well-made music that reveals

Alban Berg inscribed his last composition—and 72 73 the only concerto of his career, "To the memory 74 of an angel." That angel was Manon Gropius, the daughter of architect Walter Gropius and 75 76 Gustav Mahler's widow Alma. Manon's beauty was such that she was to portray an angel in a 77 Salzburg play. All of that changed when the 78 79 vivacious young woman was struck by infantile paralysis at age 18 and died one year later. 80 Berg, who had been extremely close to Manon 81 throughout her life, was devastated. Earlier 82 that year he had begun a commission for a 83 violin concerto, but work proceeded slowly. 84 Manon's illness seemed to drive him to complete 85 it. Once again, Christoph Eschenbach: 86

88 ALT: Our soloist, Pinchas Zukerman, tells us more:

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- 91 AB: Berg's violin concerto begins meditatively, but
- 92 there are dance rhythms and folk melodies too.
- 93 The second half of the work is agitated and

- of the concerto incorporates a melody from a
- 96 Bach chorale and the piece ends on an ethereal,
- 97 serene high G. Once more, Christoph
- 98 Eschenbach.

- 101 AB: The Violin Concerto became Berg's own requiem
- as well. On Christmas Eve, only a few months
- after completing it, Berg succumbed to blood

- 107 Alban Berg. Pinchas Zukerman is the soloist
- and Christoph Eschenbach conducts the New York

- 112 AB: "It is enough./Lord, if it pleases
- 113 you/Unshackle me./ My Jesus comes;/Good night,

- Heart-wrenching words, indeed, in the context
- of a life taken too soon...and that is
- 119 precisely why Berg chose to quote that hymn in

- 121 That was the violin concerto from 1935 by Alban
- Berg-dedicated to the memory of an angel.
- 123 Pinchas Zukerman was the soloist and Christoph
- 124 Eschenbach conducted the New York Philharmonic.

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AB: Arnold Schoenberg had a great love and affinity 139 140 for the music of Brahms. When asked why he would undertake the orchestration of the first 141 piano Quartet by the older composer, Schoenberg 142 143 replied: "1. I like the piece. 2. It is seldom played. 3. It is always very badly played." 144 Schoenberg also went on to explain that in his 145 orchestration he wanted "to remain strictly in 146 the style of Brahms and not go any farther than 147 he himself would have gone had he lived today." 148 149 The idea for this project first appeared in Schoenberg's plans for a book on orchestration, 150 and he makes a note of Brahms's piece. He never 151 did write that book, but the idea of 152 153 orchestrating the quartet remained. Schoenberg spoke of the myriad challenges of the task: 154

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158	"Brahms likes very low basses, of which the
159	orchestra possesses only a small number of
160	instruments. He likes the full accompaniment
161	with broken chord figures, often in different
162	rhythms. And most of these figures cannot
163	easily be changed, because generally they have
164	a structural meaning in his style. I think I
165	have resolved these problems"
166	(APPLAUSE)
167	Though it has been jokingly referred to as
168	Brahms's "Fifth Symphony," the result sounds
169	neither like Brahms nor like typical
170	Schoenberg; rather it is a stunning creation in
171	its own right. Here now to conduct the New
172	York Philharmonic is Christoph Eschenbach:
