Christopher Lamb, helped to advise the composer on 47 some fine details of the work, and even assisted 48 him during many excursions around New York City in 49 which they searched for new materials that became 50 part of the percussion array. The final lineup 51 included: the water itself, a soda bottle, a water 52 phone, a pair of water tube drums, a medium water 53 gong played with a bass bow, four water drums of 54 55 different sizes floating upside down in the water basin, a slinky phone, a long water tube was foam 56 pedal, a water shaker, a set of agogo bells, a 57 58 sieve, and a vibraphone prepared with coins taped to certain points. 59
