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AB: Immediately after graduating cum laude from
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        Florida State University with a master's degree
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        in Music, violinist Charles Rex joined the
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        Philadelphia Orchestra under Eugene Ormandy.
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        He spent eight years in Philly before accepting
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        the position of Associate Concertmaster of the
        New York Philharmonic under Zubin Mehta. He
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        relinguished the position in 1999 due to an
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        increasing demand on his time for solo
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        appearances and recordings. He has since
        retired from the orchestra.
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        The first music we'll hear on this broadcast is
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        the Hindemith violin concerto with Charles Rex
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        as soloist.
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        Hindemith wrote this piece in late 1939 while
        he was living in Switzerland. He was exiled
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        there during the Nazi regime. It has often been
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        surmised that the emotionally charged feeling
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        of this work was connected to the upheaval and
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        instability of the composer's life. Here it is
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        now from a recording made on November 6<sup>th</sup>,
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Charles Rex is the soloist and Zubin

Mehta conducts...the New York Philharmonic.

44 (MUSIC 1) HINDEMITH CONCERTO)

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AB: That was the Hindemith Violin Concerto. Charles
Rex was the soloist...and the New York
Philharmonic was conducted by Zubin Mehta.

48 (SLIGHT PAUSE)

49 Charles Rex's brother, Christopher, joined the 50 New York Philharmonic as Acting Principal Cello for its European tour in 1988. Then, in 2004, 51 52 Charles and Christopher gave the premiere of Stephen Paulus's Concerto for Violin and Cello, 53 54 a joint commission by the New York Philharmonic 55 and the Atlanta Symphony. (EXCERPT) In 1935, conductor Arturo Toscanini was greatly 56 impressed when he heard a radio broadcast 57 58 featuring a talented young violinist. He 59 immediately invited the man to become the 60 assistant concertmaster of the New York Philharmonic. And that's how John Corigliano 61 62 senior, the father of today's distinguished 63 composer John Corigliano, Jr., started his celebrated association with the orchestra. He 64

was appointed Concertmaster in 1943—a position

he held for 23 years.

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- 69 Corigliano, Sr. also enjoyed a successful
- 70 career as a soloist when time permitted. On
- October 17th, 1959 Leonard Bernstein invited
- 72 him to perform Beethoven's Triple Concerto with

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- 73 the New York Philharmonic as the violin
- 74 soloist. The other soloists were cellist
- 75 Laszlo Varga and pianist Leonard Bernstein.

93	AB:	John Corigliano's Clarinet Concerto was written
94		in 1977; it was his first commission from the
95		New York Philharmonic. The piece was inspired
96		by the Orchestra's long time Principal
97		Clarinet, Stanley Drucker, who premiered it in
98		December of that year.

99 (ACTUALITY)

100 There are three movements in the piece. The 101 second, entitled "Elegy", is a memorial to the 102 composer's father, who had died two years 103 earlier. In the finale, Corigliano creates an antiphonal effect by placing the brass and wind 104 105 instruments around the auditorium. Here, he 106 quotes from a sixteenth century work by Giovanni Gabrieli. Here now from a New York 107 108 Philharmonic Special Editions recording is the 109 Corigliano Clarinet Concerto as recorded on May 3, 1980. Stanley Drucker-the orchestra's long-110 time Principal Clarinet-is the soloist and 111 Zubin Mehta conducts the New York Philharmonic. 112
