Good novels have several key factors:

Central Character
Clear Context
Conflict, Crisis or Concern
Conclusion or Resolution

Character—Nehemiah is a Jew, but serving as the cupbearer of the King of Persia in Susa.

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Context—Jerusalem is described as "...the walls are broken down and the gates are destroyed by fire."

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Conclusion—What had not been done in 70 years was accomplished in 52 days under Nehemiah's leadership.
