CHAPTER MINUTES April 17, 2008

The regular scheduled meeting of the Arkansas-Boston Mountain Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society was called to order at 7:00 p.m. on April 17, 2008 by President Gary McCullah, at the Shiloh Museum General Store in Springdale, AR. There were 23 members present.

Secretary, Clare McCullah's minutes from the March 2008 meeting were approved as stated in the *Scrambler* dated April 2008.

National Director, Chuck Girard, stated he will not be able to attend the national convention in Ft. Worth. Tom Duggan will be attending in Mr. Girard's absence. A letter was request from President McCullah given permission for Mr. Duggan to attend the convention and vote on behalf of the local Chapter.

Membership Chairman, Chuck Girard, stated he has 7 members who have unpaid memberships. Mr. Girard stated that the National Headquarters is sending notices out to the members to drop their memberships if they don't pay.

Scrambler Editor, Bill Merrifield, distributed the Scrambler to the member attending tonight's meeting. Chuck Girard was asked to send Mr. Merrifield a copy of the list of those members who haven't paid their yearly dues so they can be dropped from the Scrambler mailing list

Treasurer's Report: For the time being, Tom Duggan will be acting Treasurer for the Chapter. Tonight, he gave the financial report to the Chapter members. The report was approved as read. He discussed the tax issues facing the Chapter. He explained that the Chapter had to pay Arkansas state sales taxes but the Chapter has tax-exempt status on income taxes. President McCullah asked the membership if anyone is interested in becoming the new Treasurer for the Chapter.

Special Events Chairman, Al Kaeppel, stated on Saturday, June 7, 2008, the Shiloh Museum is hosting a petting zoo and our Chapter in an event the museum is calling <u>Rails and Tails</u> that will run from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. This is a <u>child-focused</u> event with parents involved. They have requested items of interest to children on display. The Ft. Smith Trolley Museum will host an open house on May 4, 2008

Programs and Activities Chairman, David McDonald, stated he needs programs for October and November 2008. It was decided that the November meeting will be a show and tell. Each member is to bring an item of interest to share with the other members. Each presentation is to only be about 5 minutes long.

BRASS POUNDING DOWN THE LINE

An Elderhostel program that combines education, trains and adventure will be held July 8-14.

Railroad enthusiasts and Western history buffs can immerse themselves in a bygone era with classes and field trips through southern and central Montana. Photo courtesy of Lewistown Chamber of Commerce. "Where the Rails Meet the Mountains," developed by Montana State University's Extended University and Elderhostel, a non-profit educational organization, originates in Bozeman with an overnight trip to central Montana. The custom-designed educational program will appeal to railroad enthusiasts and Western history buffs.

Classes, field trips and a dinner train ride will bring railway history to life, particularly that of Montana's railroads and the Milwaukee Road, one of the West's most appealing and controversial railways. The arrival and technological innovation of the Milwaukee Road's transcontinental line in the Northwest, along with its eventual failure and dismantling, made it a much-lamented operation in transportation history. Field trips include visits to a former Milwaukee operations base, historic downtown district, substations, a former depot, a museum and more.

The program is designed for adults 55 and over. Lodging, meals, transportation and field trips are included. Some moderate walking is required. This trip is ideal for Montanans who want to learn more about the state's past, as well as out-of-state visitors interested in railroad history. A commuter discount is available for Bozeman-area residents who do not need accommodations.

HISTORICAL OPERATIONS

Western Railway Museum completed its largest-ever expansion. On Saturday May 3, 2008, the Western Railway Museum invited the community to celebrate the grand opening of its newest display building, the Loring C. Jensen Memorial Car House.

The 37,000 sq. ft. facility helps the Western Railway Museum permanently preserve its priceless collection of electric railway artifacts and interpret these artifacts for the public. The Loring C. Jensen Memorial Car House is now complete after four years of construction and ten years of fundraising. Costing \$2.5 million, this was the largest and most expensive project in the organization's sixty-year history. The community contributed over \$2.15 million to the project, with the remaining \$350,000 being funded by the Bay Area Electric Railroad Association.

Tours include the new building and the 38 historic trains on display inside, and train rides throughout the day. Visitors can also tour the Exhibit Hall, picnic in the Museum's spacious park, and shop in the museum store. Parking is free. Admission is just \$10 for adults, \$9 for seniors 65 years and older, and \$7 for children 2 - 14.

The building is another major investment in the infrastructure of Solano County's most popular museum. It provides appropriate preservation of the core collection of electric railway equipment, and increased public accessibility to the collection.

Each artifact housed in the Jensen Memorial Car House tells a story: a story of our past, and a story of our future. By focusing on the tremendous and often overlooked influence electric trains had on how land was used for development, how our cities in California grew as a result of mass transit, and how our American notions of travel, place, work, and recreation changed. We can connect people to current-day issues such as energy consumption, sustainability, transportation, and land use.

John Bull Locomotive Dedication Ceremony at Hicksville, NY, May 17

Ties and rails have been laid and the track spiked down for the John Bull replica locomotive at Kennedy Memorial Park.

The John Bull locomotive replica project is progressing on schedule and it is on its way to its permanent home at Kennedy Memorial Park. Most recently, the ties and rails have been laid and the track spiked down in front of the gazebo. Also, the locomotive's boiler assembly has been painted and placed upon the frame/wheel assembly.

The full-sized, non-operating replica, which has taken Hicksville Chamber of Commerce President James Pavone slightly over two years to build, is based on the 1831 "John Bull" locomotive, which was imported from Britain and run on the Camden and Amboy Railroads. It served as inspiration for Matthias W. Baldwin to build locomotives in this country, including the Long Island Rail Road's first locomotive, the Ariel, which serves as the image seen on Hicksville welcome signs and banners.

A public ceremony celebrating the 360th anniversary of Hicksville and the dedication of the John Bull locomotive replica will take place at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 17 at Kennedy Memorial Park.

Lancaster, PA. Streetcar: It may be years away- if ever- before streetcars again rumble through the streets of Lancaster City, but a group organized to establish a streetcar system has already made its first purchase. This streetcar, now in Brooklyn, N.Y., was purchased at auction by the Lancaster Streetcar Company.

The non-profit Lancaster Streetcar Company has bought a 52-year-old streetcar with the intention of rebuilding it for eventual operation here. The streetcar, a PCC model built in 1946, is a former Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Agency car that has been rusting in a lot in Brooklyn, N.Y.

The Lancaster group competed against salvage dealers when they bought the streetcar for \$1,500 at auction in December. Plans call for shipping it to a restoration company in Warren. It will likely cost \$300,000 to \$400,000 to completely rebuild the car. The cost includes a new electronic and mechanical system, a wheelchair lift, air conditioning and bodywork. Once rebuilt, the streetcar should be serviceable for 20 years, he said.

The Lancaster Streetcar Company's plan calls for two streetcars (three at peak times) to travel a 2.6-mile loop between the Amtrak Station at the northern edge of the city and Southern Market Center and the Lancaster County Convention Center at South Queen and Vine streets. The streetcars would be powered by a single overhead electric line and run on tracks in the street.


Question: What would have been their new operational name?
