Do we members of the Link1_{TM} Bible Research Team understand all of what we read in Revelation—beyond the essence of it? No:

- ✓ "For now we see through a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known."
 - —1 Corinthians 13:12

We've heard many sincere believers say that Jesus doesn't even know the sequence of end-time events. They predicate that naive presumption on their favorite professional clergyman's oft-repeated quoting of scriptures like Matthew 24:36, "But of that day and hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels of heaven, but my Father only."

Does Jesus know the day or the hour? No. Might He be intimately knowledgeable of the <u>sequence</u> of events that will precede it? Clearly, yes! Study what He said at chapters 24 and 25 of Matthew, chapter 13 of Mark and chapter 21 of Luke to easily confirm that. Those record His answer to the disciples' question, "When are you coming back, what will it be like and how can we know?" Yes, that's a paraphrase...

Note: Matthew 25 is a continuation of Matthew 24. No change at all in the context. At Matthew 25, Jesus gave us three rather simple ILLUSTRATIONS of what He said about the sequence of end-time events at Matthew 24. It is again unfortunate that the vast majority of Bible "experts" have complicated those stories: They teach as if those ILLUSTRATIONS are parables. They're not. The trumpet of the 7th angel of Revelation 11:15 is "the last trump" at 1 Corinthians 15:52 and "the trump of God" at 1 Thessalonians 4:16. You've heard something very different, we know. We were taught something quite different, too.

The Feast of Trumpets—

The Old Testament Feast of Trumpets is actually called The Seventh Month Festival. "This festival is mentioned in Leviticus 23:24-25, 27-32 and Numbers 29:1-40. It was introduced with the blowing of trumpets, the halting of labor, sacrificing, and a testing...The exact reason for its observance is not clear. Some scholars [are convinced that] it originated [during] the Babylonian captivity as a way of counteracting the influence of the Babylonian New Year Festival..." —The Liberty Illustrated Bible Dictionary

The seminary-educated end-time-prophecy "experts" scrape the bottom of the barrel when they resort to such ridiculous rationale to support their rapture theories. Their mindsets are the same as those of our Secular Humanist university-tenured academic community: "We're smarter than all you little people on the planet, so we can understand stuff that you guys aren't equipped to understand. 
