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






It's true that Jesus spoke to all those who hadn't demonstrated "ears to hear" in riddles – typically called parables. To apply either of those terms to Jesus' brilliant ILLUSTRATIONS at Matthew 25 would be naive. Why so many Bible "experts" haven't figured that out yet is a matter of magnificent curiosity! He shared the important stuff with His closest friends, the original Disciples, who had clearly demonstrated ears to hear.

As they matured in the faith, He shared more and more. As an example of their progressing maturity, He didn't tell them where good people *really* go when they die until their mutual friend, Lazarus, had "gone to sleep." That dialog is at John 11:11-14. Credible Bible scholars know that Matthew 25 is a continuation of chapter 24, and they wonder why the translators chose to separate them into two chapters. Chapter 24 documents Jesus' <u>initial</u> response to the question, "When are you coming back, what will it be like and how can we know for sure?" Chapter 25 features the **ILLUSTRATIONS** He then shared—to ensure that his closest friends (and we, with ears to hear) would not misinterpret His Matthew 24 narrative.

If not for the rampant pulpit SPIN on both chapters, it is likely that most folk of reasonable intellect would have understood Jesus' message clearly on





their respective first or second reading. Yes, we expect our "experts" to at least do their basic homework, but most of them just repeat what they've heard or read from other "experts." Jesus' 10 Virgins illustration is a classic example of that folly—

But, alas! pentecostals think Jesus was saying that if a believer has not had a recent "talking in 'tongues'" experience when it's time for *the rapture*, he'll get "left behind." Calvinists are certain that He was saying that those who've never once-upon-a-time gotten "truly 'saved'" will get "left behind." Laughable, both.

In Jesus' 10 Virgins illustration at Matthew 24:1-13, He used LIGHT to symbolize the **KNOWLEDGE** of the timing for His return to gather the saints unto Himself.

All ten of those girls knew the bridegroom or they wouldn't have been on his guest list. Five of them were expecting him before dark. So why did they get locked out? There is just one sensible conclusion: Because they had not prepared themselves for travel through the darkest of nights. Perhaps you can visualize them banging frantically on the bridegroom's door while screaming, "But our preacher promised us that you'd come before dark!"







While Jesus is not privy to the precise day or hour for His return, there is no question that He knows and has shared with us the <u>sequence</u> of events that will immediately precede it. Our professional christian Bible "experts" have complicated and confused Jesus' message. In doing that, they have victimized all the good folk who love and revere them. Far too many of their parishioners actually think that their clergymen are their SUPERIORS within the kingdom of God. In the visible church, far too many clergymen perceive their parishioners as their SUBORDINATES.

On Judgment Day many of those who've invested their $Faith\ Equity_{SM}$ in those guys will blame them for their not knowing that Jesus will come at the bitter end of The Great Tribulation. That won't work for them, though: God holds each of us accountable for digging, **personally**, for the Truth about that. See Matthew 24:13 and Mark 13:13 for confirmation. Then, check out 2 Thessalonians 2:11 for a quick refresher on the fate of all the often-sincere, but tragically <u>passive</u> believers who don't do that. "But we pay our preachers to do all that – and 'the ministry' – **for us**; don't we?"

"But...but...but everybody I know is convinced that we're gonna get raptured, at least before all that really bad stuff starts happening!" *Hmmm*... Do you think we should tell that to all those Christians in Africa, the Middle East and Southeast Asia who're targets of the bloody Jihad?

Often heard in the Bible Belt region of the U.S.A. are proclamations that go something like this: "We've gotta keep on prayin' for all those people over yonder who're gettin' burned in cages and raped and drowned and such, but we're gonna get raptured out'a here before anything like that starts happenin' in America! In Jesus' Talents/Money ILLUSTRATION at Matthew 24:14-30, the master entrusted each servant with something of value that he expected him to invest on his behalf. That value – the talents/money – symbolize the **KNOWLEDGE** of the relative <u>timing</u> for Christ's profitable return.






One servant chose not to **INVEST** that knowledge in others. He got cast into outer darkness...deep space?...weeping and gnashing of teeth.² He <u>knew</u> the master's return would be after a time of extreme darkness but was afraid to invest that wildly <u>unpopular</u> notion with others—not "what 'we' believe!"

- ²⁵And I was afraid, and went and hid thy talent in the earth: lo, there thou hast that is thine.
- ²⁶His lord answered and said unto him, Thou wicked and slothful servant...
- ²⁷Thou oughtest therefore to have put my money to the exchangers, and then at my coming I should have received mine own with usury.
- ²⁸Take therefore the talent from him, and give it unto him which hath ten talents.
- ²⁹For unto every one that hath shall be given, and he shall have abundance: but from him that hath not shall be taken away even that which he hath.
- ³⁰And cast ye the unprofitable servant into outer darkness..."
