

Export of live cattle is a topic of debate this morning

A Frente Parlamentar Ambientalista realiza café da manhã hoje para discutir a exportação marítima de gado vivo.

O Brasil exporta anualmente milhares de bovinos para abate no Oriente Médio, em viagens marítimas de até 30 dias, em condições precárias, alta densidade de lotação e só um veterinário a bordo.

Um número crescente de veterinários em todo o mundo se opõe a essa exportação por entender que é impossível promover bem-estar animal nessas condições e que a recomendação científica é que animais sejam abatidos próximo ao local de criação.

A médica veterinária Lynn Simpson, que tem vasta experiência em acompanhamento desse tipo de negócio, foi convidada para falar sobre o assunto.

O aspecto econômico para o país também será abordado. Segundo especialistas, o País perde em geração de empregos e impostos ao exportar o produto direto, junto com subprodutos como, por exemplo, o couro.

Projeto de Lei Na Câmara, já tramita um projeto (PL 9464/18) que veda a exportação de gado vivo por transporte marítimo. O autor da proposta é o deputado Ricardo Tripoli (PSDB-SP).

Governor of São Paulo says that he is in favor of banning exports of live animals Convocation is made for this Tuesday (19). 134 people thanked us for this content. Fabio Chaves View Marcio França, governor of the state of São Paulo, used his official account on the Instagram to support the ban on live animal exports (see here). The Legislative Assembly of the State of São Paulo (ALESP) is in charge of PL 31/2018 (full of PL), which deals with a possible prohibition of this type of export in all ports of the state. It will be the end of ships loaded with thousands of live animals in the ports of Santos and São Sebastião, for example. In the publication, France states that it will sanction the PL when it passes the approval of ALESP: "Do not export live animal for slaughter! I have already expressed and reinforced 100% my support for the approval of the Bill that Prohibits Embarkation of Live Animal for Export in the Ports of SP, which is being analyzed in the Legislative Assembly.

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We support the approval of this Project to end this practice. And as soon as that happens, I'LL PUNISH the Law! It is a commitment to protecting animal life and especially to all of you who have sent messages of support. The State of São Paulo must set an example and defend the prohibition throughout the country! "- he wrote. But for such a Bill to be approved at ALESP, it is not easy. Therefore, the author of the proposal, Deputy Feliciano Filho, made a call for animal rights activists to attend ALESP on Tuesday (19) in the evening for a meeting (see appeal).

Voting in SP rekindles debates over live cattle export Bill that prohibits activity in the State of São Paulo can be approved next week

After the imbroglío involving Navio Nada, at the Port of Santos, at the end of January, live cattle exports returned to the spotlight last week, after the governor of São Paulo, Márcio França, declared through his social networks that he would sanction the a law that prohibits the shipment of live animals by sea transport in the State , if PL 31/2018 is approved by the Legislative Assembly (Alesp), next Tuesday, June 26. The vote comes a few days after NGOs from more than 35 countries protest against the activity. The mobilization took place on June 14, as an International Awareness Day against the Exportation of Live Cattle. In Brazil the acts concentrated in Brasília, DF; Belo Horizonte, MG; Curitiba, PR; Porto Alegre, RS; Rio de Janeiro - RJ; São Luís, MA; Sao Paulo-SP; and Salvador, BA.

"The whole process hurts the welfare of the animals, from the transport to the port like the shipment itself. Usually they spend more than 15 days in ships, where they suffer from excess heat, lack of space and do not receive the adequate supply of food and water," he points out. Another factor highlighted by Feliciano is the type of slaughter that the animals are subjected to when arriving at their destinations, almost always Arab countries. "This is another problem, in this region the slaughter is totally different from Brazil. Here we use an air gun that does not cause any pain to the animals, while there the animals are beheaded. This only increases the cruelty of this activity," he says.

Read more + Exports of live cattle: a discussion that needs to be done + Manifesto criticizes welfare conditions in the export of live cattle On the opposite side, the former secretary of agriculture of São Paulo and current federal deputy Arnaldo Jardim (PPS) defends the activity, stating that Brazil follows all animal welfare protocols established by the World Organization for Animal Health (OIE). "Exporters strictly follow all national and international welfare rules, including additional care to ensure that animals are delivered to the buyer with quality," says the deputy. Jardim also believes that the current moment is not appropriate for the decision to be made. "With the election approaching, many parliamentarians are driven by emotion rather than reason. They are just thinking about promoting and end up leaving aside all the scientific basis that supports the activity," he added. With this scenario, the parliamentarian admits that the climate seems to be favorable to the approval of the PL. "Governor Márcio França was unfortunate to stand in this way.

But, there is no room for regrets. We have a lot of work to do if we are to reverse this situation. It will not be easy, but we can not deliver the points," concluded Jardim. Although the expectation is of victory, Feliciano emphasizes that it is necessary that the deputies of the allied base maintain their position. "The governor has always been in favor of our idea, as well as several other Members. Now the time has come for a decision, and the presence of allies is necessary. If there is a quorum, we will probably get the approval," he said. Source: DBO Portal
