God's family at the historic Church of the Nativity is joyfully and energetically committed to sharing Christ's love and healing by proclaiming the Good News of the Gospel through worship and service to the world.

On Ash Wednesday we will step onto a Lenten path of prayer, repentance and self-examination. Frederick Buechner has some advice for the journey. He says, "Jesus spent forty days asking himself what it meant to be Jesus. During Lent, Christians are supposed to ask one way or another what it means to be themselves." He offers a list of questions for the quest:



If you had to bet everything you have on whether there is a God or whether there isn't, which side would get your money and why?

When you look at your face in the mirror, what do you see in it that you most like and who do you see in it that you most deplore?

If you had only one last message to leave to the handful of people who are most important to you, what would it be in 25 words or less?

Of all the things you have done in your life, which is the one you would most like to undo? Which is the one that makes you happiest?

Is there any person in the world, or any cause, that, if circumstances called for it, you would be willing to die for?

If this were the last day of your life, what would you do with it?

Buechner concludes, "To hear yourself try to answer questions like these is to begin to hear something not only of who you are but of both what you are becoming and what you are failing to become."


Seminary life is full, and I am thrilled that Nativity will be a part of my time. I look forward to worshipping and being a part of the life that you all share together.


Exploring a New Path Between Christians and Muslims

First Grade Eucharist


Instruction Class





Stewardship of Creation Tip - Making a space for nature

When we moved back from England in 2015 we moved into a house on the side of Monte Sano. The back yard is a steep slope with a jumble of rocks and trees and it was apparent that no-one had been back there for a long time! Not surprising as under the canopy it appeared to be an impenetrable jungle of brambles, poison ivy and rotting fallen trees. Over the last few years I have worked to clear out some of the undergrowth and fallen trees and cut a couple of wide pathways (we would call them "rides" in England) back up the mountain. I am convinced this cleanup has led to an increase in the diversity of plant and animal life that our little patch on the mountain supports.



With more light getting to the ground we have had many more wildflowers in the spring, and more natural seed plants for the birds to feed on in the fall and winter. As I write this a mixed flock of House Finches and Goldfinches (and the odd Purple Finch that we only seem to see on the coldest days) are busy feeding on the left over seed heads. The Red Bellied and Downy Woodpeckers are busy exploring the tree branches as the Chipmunks scurry around beneath with cheeks puffed up with their trove of nuts.

It's a bit of a paradox for me, as in my home country of England where back yards ("gardens") are typically much smaller, every square inch is cultivated for a specific purpose. You are actually encouraged by wildlife experts to create a small "wild" area for nature that is not completely manicured! In Alabama, the opposite seems to be true, and cleaning up a part of an untamed wilderness can be beneficial to wildlife.

If you have some overgrown wilderness in your backyard, my tips would be:

- Cut a wide path through the undergrowth to let the sunlight get to the ground
- Allow natural seed bearing plants and flowers to flourish and then die back naturally
- Clear it out every couple of years mid-winter is a good time to do this
- Leave a few brush piles around as shelter for wildlife


