It is no secret in the Episcopal Church that many congregations see a dip in attendance during the summer. Many of us, myself included, tend to take a small vacation from Church in the summer. The abbreviated summer schedule, pause from church school and absence of hot biscuits baked by the men's ministry team seem to give us plenty of reasons to "skip this week". Summer travel plans, trips to the lake, out of town visitor's and lack of the school routine also make it easy for us to miss a Sunday or two. So the question for many might be why would we ever take a vacation from church?

As someone who has worked in the Episcopal Church most of my adult life, I have observed summer as a time when things quiet down. As a child Rally Day was the day that assured me in just one short week I would get to see all of my church friends again at church school and youth group. That feeling of welcome and renewal is a good one.

Opportunities and events to take a look back at some of the moments that define us, some of the people who inspire us and some of the events that ignite our love for this communion of saints will be offered at Rally Day and during the month of September. We will have the opportunity to rally together, form new friendships, celebrate our past and welcome each other into a conversations that will lead us on a new journey of fellowship and spiritual growth together. I hope that as we return from summer and rally, that we will all embrace the chance to feel welcome at Nativity.



Celebrating 175 Years

Shortly before Nancy Lacy died she and two of her contemporaries, Betty McCaleb and Anna Ruth Sparks, presented a special program for the Episcopal Church Women's luncheon, entitled "Nativity As I Remember It." Included in these recollections one can find an indepth summary of the twenty-nine year ministry of Emile Joffrion as he lived and worked with his parish family in "The Master's Garden" at the Church of the Nativity.

"NATIVITY AS I REMEMBER IT"

In the beginning, not of creation but of my relationship with Nativity parish, God had created Saint Frances, better known to the thousands of us whom she raised as 'Miss Frances.' There are very few things about childhood that I can remember, but Miss Frances has always been and will always be the source of my first encounter with God, because He truly worked through her. Who of us can ever forget the old parish house where- from the toddling age through the primary yearswe froze to death all winter. But, come we did, each and every Sunday. Our chairs were always prearranged in a large circle. I was sure at the time that it was a throne. We took our chairs quietly and when she gave the signal, we began. Each girl had the privilege of coming to her throne and doing a curtsy. I must have done 5,000 over the years. Following the frills and lace of the lovely handmade dresses the girls wore; it was the boys' turn. Like perfect gentlemen they came, one after the other, to greet Miss Frances with a bow.

I shall never forget the birthday cake and the birthday bank. In retrospect, it was the ugliest, dirtiest cake you can imagine. Made of cardboard and trimmed in pink, covered with torn doilies, used for years and years. At the time, it was the most beautiful cake in the world and the 'birthday boy' or the 'birthday girl' was made to think that he or she was the most important person in the whole world as she lit the candles and the whole room counted in unison as she dropped the pennies into the birthday bank. One of the greatest thrills of the birthday girl was the

honor of taking up the collection. Only boys were permitted to carry the cross, and each Sunday of my life we

processed around the room singing 'Onward Christian Soldiers.'





I don't remember a single Sunday school lesson. I don't even remember if we had them way back then, But I do remember that in that very cold room I was warm all over, God loved me, Miss Frances loved me (I must admit that back then I would have put Miss Frances first) and this was a great place to be. Love permeated every person and corner of that room.

When Miss Frances retired, God in his infinite mercy already had provided us with another saint, known to us all as Miss Katherine Jones – our ever-present, visible sign of love.

As a young child, going to church meant one primary thing- the voices of Miss Neida Pratt and Carroll Hay coming from the choir. They truly led us for years in making a joyful noise unto the Lord. I am continually amazed that the choir continues to function without them.

The dolls that were made by the Saints for the annual



Bazaar were the most magnificent creations you could ever imagine. They made Madame Alexander's dolls look cheap. I can remember my mother and Ruth White and others working for 12 months on only two dresses. By then, every member of the guild worked for 12 months on the clothes. When the day of the Bazaar finally came, the Dilworth family was near exhaustion. Traditionally, they were in charge of carving the turkeys, and when you have carved turkeys for the entire city of Huntsville you have done good days and nights work. The carving took place in what is now the Rector's study. The luncheon and dinner tables were set properly in those days. Linen cloths and linen napkins. The menu was always the same---turkey, dressing, gravy, vegetable, beautifully carved orange peels filled with sweet potatoes whipped with real butter and full of pecans, pickles, hot rolls and always Charlotte Russe. If anyone were to tell all the ladies who prepared these meals that we now use margarine, paper napkins and paper placemats, they would each thank God that they were no longer here.


Much of this nostalgia, but much of it has been passed on to us today. Even today, when we say that Bess Pratt Wallace is cooking, the place fills up. And Anna Ruth White Sparks' handwork at the bazaar is a sight to behold.

While I reminisce, there are two people I must mention, for I well remember that they were as inspiration to all the young people of this parish. And back there, I was one, so I can speak to the heart. All of us looked at Rosemarie Burgess and Julia White as the examples of what a Christian was. I can't remember any great thing that they did, but they were always there, and in a quiet loving way living out the Christian Gospel. It was evident in their faces then, it still is.

My nostalgia trip must bring Bishop Carpenter into the picture. He confirmed us all, and there was never any doubt about whether or not it took. When he laid both of his hands on your head you had truly received the 'Laying on of hands.' For those hands covered not only your head, but your face and neck also. I often thought as a child when I heard that booming voice and felt those hands on my head that this must be what God is like.

To complete the circle, today must be a part of thoughts about this parish. Over the past few years, we have had many joyous moments together. By more importantly, we have hurt and suffered through many tragedies. I say that the tragedies are more important because it has been through them that we have so

many times become bound together and have grown together. We have come to know that God can and does work through when we let Him. He has healed our wounds and guided us to greater things. From where I sit, I see today a parish that is moving, that is being filled with the kind of love that accepts human beings as they are and where they are. This kind of love is contagious and can't be stopped. It seeps into the depths of men's souls, spreads throughout their bodies, and influences everything they do in relationships with other people. One of the main reasons this has happened is because we are being led by a man who has always been open to let it happen and never tried to force it upon us. Our rector, Emile Joffrion, is that man. We are free in this parish to proclaim the gospel each in our own way, and that is GOOD.


August 12, 10:00 Back to School blessings during service.

Making a Difference

Looking for a fun ministry that only takes about two hours on Friday afternoon? I recommend passing out Snack Packs at Blossomwood School. I have had the

pleasure of being a part of the team that does this for two years and it is great way to start the weekend. It is very satisfying to know that I am a part of Nativity's effort to see that students who might not have much to eat on Saturday and Sunday are receiving a bag full of snacks.

Nativity volunteers with the Blossomwood Snack Pack Program packed 160 bags a week this past school year. That's more than 5,440 times that a child in our neighborhood school didn't have to go hungry on the weekend! The Blossomwood Snack Pack Ministry will begin soon and we have volunteer opportunities to fit every schedule! Opportunities include:

1. FOOD PICK UP

Time Commitment: approximately one hour 1-2 Wednesdays a month. It can be done solo but is fun with a friend! **Description:** volunteer picks up food from Manna House (near the South Parkway/ Governor's Drive intersection) around noon and delivers it to the church by 2:30 pm., and unloads it at Nativity in the lobby area of Joffrion Hall. An SUV or pickup truck is needed, or if two people do it together it could be delivered with two hatchback cars.

2. FOOD PACKING

Time Commitment: approximately one hour on Wednesdays from 4-5pm. **Description:** volunteers meet in the library in Joffrion Hall and fill 160 snack packs in assembly line fashion. This is a great volunteer opportunity for young children and their adults or for tweens and teens.

3. SNACK PACK DELIVERY

Time Commitment: approximately one hour on Thursdays or Fridays once or twice a month. It can be done solo but fun to do with a friend! Deliveries to the school can be made Thursdays from 8:30-2:00 and 3:30 -4:30 or Fridays 8:30-2:00pm. **Description:** using a

hand truck, the volunteers load their vehicle with approximately 16 large totes and then drive them to Blossomwood Elementary school where the bins are unloaded into the cafeteria. An SUV or pickup truck is needed.

4. SNACK PACK DISTRIBUTION

Time Commitment: approximately 30-45 minutes on Fridays (sometimes Thursdays if there is no school on Fridays). **Description:** meet at Blossomwood Elementary School at 2:45 pm on Friday afternoons and distribute snack packs to students before they leave school for the weekend.



What are you Reading?

Belonging: A Culture of Place by bell hooks

With more than a little help from my community, I am doing the work of self-healing, of earth healing, of reveling in this piecing together of my world in such a way that I can be whole and holy. (hooks 68)

bell hooks' Belonging: A Culture of Place first jumped out at me off the shelves of a locally owned bookstore in Hawai'i. I had been interested in place-based studies for a while, and in the preface it seemed like hooks was wrestling with the same questions I was: how do you make a home for yourself? What does belonging look like? smell, feel, and taste like?

At that point in my personal journey, I couldn't believe that hooks would begin her book with the chapter "Kentucky Is My Fate" and then go on to write nineteen more chapters including "Touching the Earth," "Segregation Must End," "Habits of the Heart," and more. She begins with what I thought would be the answer or the conclusion. If knowing where you belong isn't enough, then what else would I need to consider?

I went on to read, laugh, cry, and agonize with hooks while she discusses the empowerment she felt as an African-American girl in the hills of Kentucky, the traumatic transition from the safe space of the hills to the racist and segregated nearby town, seeking to escape her "working class, southern, country" identity in a "geographically neutral" Californian college town, and more. This book continues to keep me company, to challenge me, and to offer me respite.

bell hooks is as sharp as she is humble when recounting with all honesty her experiences and articulating her cultural critics.

Here are thoughts and words about stewardship of God's creation to take into your heart and to guide your actions as you go about your daily activities:

"As the stewards of creation, what account will the Human Race be able to give of our stewardship?" D. Denise Dianaty

Marcia Bunge writes, in a Web of Creation article:

"All of the biblical passages that command us to love our neighbor also have strong implications for environmental responsibility ... As we better understand the dimensions of our environmental problems, it is clear that they are often connected to social injustices. We cannot adequately show love to our neighbors, therefore, without taking into account the environmental problems that affect them."

"Do all the good you can. By all the means you can. In all the ways you can. In all the places you can. At all the times you can. To all the people you can. As long as ever you can." — John Wesley

We Are Called "to Serve and to Preserve"

- ...the Bible contains insights that can help form the basis of a sound environmental ethic.
- ...Genesis 1:28 and 2:15 call human beings to preserve and protect the earth and its creatures.
- ... the biblical texts emphasize a humane and compassionate rule that displays responsibility for others and that results in peace and prosperity.
- ... Genesis 1:28 does not advocate tyrannical exploitation of nature but rather responsible care of it.

The Hebrew word for "keep" means to preserve for future generations. Hence, the mandate "to serve and to preserve" the land places human beings not in a hierarchical position over creation but in a position of service to it.

Just as the later Christian message (in the New Testament) depicts Jesus as a servant-king, so humans are challenged in this creation story to assume a similar role: "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all" (Mark 9:35).

Care for creation is to be exercised not to serve our own wants and desires but to serve the best interests and well-being of all Earth-community together, including ourselves.— adapted from Web of Creation
