Celebrating 175 Years A Snapshot of Huntsville from 1907

Rev. Pace Kennedy Revenwood, W.VA

My Dear Mr. Kennedy, January, 17, 1907

This letter, as I stated in my letter or call, may be considered a continuation thereof. I will endeavor to give you plain facts without any roseate commentary.

First: Huntsville is a city of about 10,000 inhabitants, but including the Cotton Mill districts the estimate is about 15,000, or more. It is situated in the extreme northern part of the State in a valley at the base of the southern range of the Cumberland Mountains, and at an elevation of about 750 above sea level. We think we have the finest climate and water to be found anywhere. No serious epidemic of any kind has ever effected the city, and I believe the Government report on health of soldiers quartered in the South in 1889, placed Huntsville second; this fact should settle the matter of climate.

Second: There are about 325 communicants in this parish. We think we have one of the most beautiful church buildings in the south for its size, and we believe that right here in Huntsville your field of work would satisfy the most ardent Disciple of Christ.

Third: A little Church history: This parish was first presided over by Bishop Lay, succeeded by Rev. John Monro Banister, who was elected Rector Emeritus August 5th, 1905, after forty-five years active service, he is now Rector Emeritus-88 years of age, in full possession of his faculties, but too feeble from the infirmities of age to continue his long and Godly given service.

In August, 1904, Dr. Banister requested an assistant. We called Rev. W.W. Claybrook, then of Tyler, Texas. He came. Dr. Banister on account of the increasing infirmities of age, resigned the active rectorship August 5th, 1905. Mr. Claybrook was then made Rector, during his term just ended on the 15th, inst., he gave us splendid service and did magnificent work. We were very much devoted to him and regretted that he could not be persuaded to continue with us but he accepted a call from the Bishop as General Missionary of the Diocese, after declining a call to St. Paul's Church, New Orleans, La. at a very much larger salary. In justice to the Bishop I will say that having heard of the call to St. Paul's he persuaded Mr. Claybrook to remain in the diocese.

Fourth: Now as to the individuality of the parish, of course we have our faults, but Christianity, refinement and culture find lodgment in the majority of our homes. I am sure if you can find yourself free to come to Huntsville you will find friends who will be your friends for life. Our reverence and love for Dear Old Dr. Banister should be abundant proof.

Fifth: The Rectory is a very neat, one story cottage standing just across the street from the Church, containing three bedrooms, study or parlor, dining-room, kitchen and bath, with city water, sewer, gas, and electric light connections. It is partly furnished and is a very nice little home for any couple.

If there is any further information desired I will be glad to have you command me.

The following is an exerpt from Augusta B. Martin's report on the House of Happiness to the 99th Diocesan Council: "The most difficult part of the work is house-keeping and cooking. Just as long as the human family eats three times a day, just so land will the greater part of the day be spent in the preparation and serving of meals.

Lord of all pots and pans and things; since I've not time to be A Saint by doing lovely things, or watching late with Thee Or dreaming in the dawnl ight, or storming heaven's gates, Make me a saint by getting meals, and washing up the plates.

Altho I must have Martha's hands, I have a Mary mind; And when I black the boots and shoes, Thy sandals, Lord, I find. I think of how they trod the earth, what time I scrub the floor; Accept this meditation, Lord, I haven't time for more.

Warm all the kitchen with Thy love, and light it with Thy peace; Forgive me all my worrying, and make all grumbling cease. Thou who didst love to give men food, in room or by the sea, Accept this service that I do –I do it unto Thee.

I append hereto my financial statement."

On Good Friday, March 29, 1907, John Monro Banister died at the age of eighty-nine, sixty-one years of which had been spent as an Episcopal priest. Bishop Beckwith arrived the next day to conduct Banister's funeral services at Nativity on the afternoon of Easter Eve.

Outreach in Action

The Community Free Dental Clinic was organized in 2013 by a group of local dentists and non-profit organizations. Alabama is the sixth poorest state in America. The poverty level in Madison county is 13.9% of the population, about 45,000 people. This population is largely undereducated,

working paycheck to paycheck with no money left for dental care, elderly on fixed incomes in need of dentures, but unable to afford to have teeth pulled, and some homeless veterans. All have broken, painful teeth and they can get infected gums or abscesses which are life threatening. The bacteria can go to the heart and brain and in some cases precipitate a heart attack or stroke. The volunteer dentists can pull the teeth to relieve the pain and give antibiotics for infections all free to the patients. Since 2013, when the clinic opened over 6,500 people have been helped, and as of July 2018 and over \$ 1,700,00.00 in free services has been provided.

The Community Free Dental Clinic (DBA) The Free Dental Clinic is a certified 501© 3 non-profit. Funding comes from individuals, local businesses, grants, and churches. In addition to monetary donations, they receive office supplies, tooth brushes, tooth paste and dental supplies. Their mission is to provide quality free dental care, and education to low income, uninsured adult residents of Madison County. This mission is accomplished by licensed volunteer dentists from the local community, licensed nurses who evaluate and help educate the patients in their care,

chairside assistants who assist the dentists, and the office staff who register the patients and make appointments. They do extractions and a limited number of cleanings. Low cost Dentures are now offered and can be financed with a "0" interest loan through the Huntsville Assistance Program. HAP also screens applicants and schedules appointments for individuals who meet the following qualifications:

- · Adult, 19 years or older
- · Have a picture ID
- · Resident of Madison County
- · NO DENTAL INSURANCE
- · Less than 150% of the poverty level

Nativity Outreach has supported the clinic since 2014. Your generous support of the Nativity Budget allowed Outreach to present the Clinic with a check for \$4000!


sickness,

When yarn supplies get low, somehow more appears! (Sort of like the fish and loaves of bread!) One of our members says this group is her favorite: no roll call, no fees, no fines! You don't have to know how to crochet or knit, we can teach you! Making a shawl or lap robe is a very simple project. Everyone is welcome, we even have a few men who

are NASA engineers who make shawls for us and put them in the work room when complete. They do them while watching TV and say it is a stress buster for them! Each shawl is blessed by us in a hands-on prayer before giving to a priest or put in the work room. We invite you to join us. It is a very rewarding activity. Just show up; no reservation needed! 


What are you Reading?

What I Know for Sure by Oprah Winfrey

In her farewell letter, Mother Bonnie expressed her joy of worshiping at Nativity "within the tension of a rapidly changing world." Her phrase reminded me of a line from the theme song from the 1970s television show, *Good Times*: "keeping your head above water, making a wave when you can." We all face life challenges of some sort each day. Reading the Bible, and a practice of prayer and meditation, bring moments of peace in our chaotic lives. Yet sometimes we want insight from contemporary writers to uplift our spirits and help us cope.



I found such words of wisdom in Oprah Winfrey's "What I Know for Sure" while browsing audiobooks on the local library's Digital Media Zone. I wanted to listen to stories I hoped would encourage me, and Winfrey's book fit the bill. It is a collection of articles from Oprah magazine, in which the author shares her own trials and how she handled them, the outcome, and what she learned. The articles are classified into topics: joy, resilience, connection, gratitude, possibility, awe, clarity, and power.

A common theme is listening to your inner wisdom and staying authentic to yourself. True happiness is achieved when we honor our individual guidance system. Then we can present to the world our best selves, and then we are equipped to serve our communities. Winfrey recalls moments when she prayed for God's help, only to find that God waited on her to come to terms with a relationship and to resolve her problem. And she shares Maya Angelou's simple prayer for all situations: "Say thank you."

Stewardship of Creation

What is the Diocese of Alabama Stewardship of Creation Task Force and what does it contribute to our diocese and local parishes?



Mission Statement:

The Stewardship of Creation Task

Force exists to educate the people of the diocese, to promote eco-justice, and to provide opportunities for service in the stewardship of God's creation.

What we do:

The Task Force has approximately 12 members who are appointed by the Bishop to serve for three-year terms. The Task Force meets quarterly to plan events, prepare educational and liturgical materials, and coordinate activities. This group recruits parish Liaisons. The Task Force has produced curriculum materials for adult formation classes and has a website and a Facebook group to facilitate communication.

The Liaisons provide the function of linking the Task Force to the parishes in the diocese. Ideally, each parish will have at least one liaison. The liaisons are welcome to attend Task Force meetings but are non-voting participants. Liaisons keep abreast of materials and activities provided by the Task Force and communicate opportunities with their parishes. In turn, Liaisons communicate back to the Task Force about activities and projects in their parishes in order to share ideas and inspire other parishes to undertake Stewardship of Creation activities.

Over the years at Diocesan Conventions, the Task Force has:

- provided Stewardship of Creation messaging throughout the convention site
- (*) had a booth to share Care of Creation information and to raise awareness of Diocesan Task Force projects
- presented workshops for convention delegates
- worked with Diocesan staff and Convention venue staff to encourage adherence to responsible Care of Creation practices

Important Note: Stewardship of Creation Sunday in the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama is the fourth Sunday in April. "At our 2008 Convention, we adopted the last Sunday in April each year as Stewardship of Creation Sunday in our diocese. This is a very important observance in our environmentally-challenged time," said the Rt. Rev. Kee Sloan, Bishop of Alabama. The last Sunday in April falls close to Earth Day and can be a time to appreciate God's beautiful and bountiful creation in church.


