
Celebrating Our Future

Nativity is a great community and I've made a lot of good friends here. I've enjoyed being an acolyte, and the acolyte masters were awesome!







Heifer International and the Annual Heifer Market

Heifer International is a 75-year-old charity that works in communities around the world to end hunger and poverty while at the same time promoting care for the Earth. Heifer is active in 27 countries, including the United States!

The core of Heifer's model is called "Passing on the Gift," which means families share the training they receive, and pass on the first female offspring of their livestock to another family. This extends the impact of the original gift, allowing a once impoverished family to become donors and full participants in improving their communities. The goal of every Heifer Project is to help families achieve self-reliance by providing them the tools needed to sustain themselves. It's thanks to the generosity of donors like us that this is able to happen!

Nativity supports Heifer International via our yearly Heifer Market, a living gift market charity where parishioners have the opportunity to financially support Heifer through donations, as well as by purchasing art

made by the children of Nativity. Our Heifer Market was started by Lane Tutt, in the early 1980's, when she was Director of Children's Christian Education. Her goal was to make the church's support of Heifer International a more concrete experience for the children and youth of the parish. It has evolved over the years. Many people will remember beloved parishioner and local veterinarian, Dr. Louis McCurdy, who brought animals from his farm to the churchyard in order for the people to experience the animals that would be donated to families in the Heifer program.



ENSURING NATIVITY'S LEGACY:

TWO GREAT WAYS OF SUPPORTING NATIVITY THROUGH PLANNED GIVING

One of the ways of ensuring Nativity's legacy is to include Nativity in your will. Since the first Book of Common Prayer, Episcopalians have been encouraged to make a will to provide for their families and to make bequests for religious and charitable purposes if possible. It is quite noteworthy that the Episcopal Book of Common Prayer includes a specific direction to making a will. Page 445 of the Book of Common Prayer states: "The Minister of the Congregation is directed to instruct the people, from time to time, about the duty of Christian parents to make prudent provision for the well-being of their families, and of all persons to make wills, while they are in health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, not neglecting, if they are able, to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses."

At the Church of the Nativity, there are two separate, endowed funds for which planned gifts can be

Endowments are investment vehicles that allow the **principal to grow** while yielding annual income for further investment and/or designated expenditures. **It is a gift that keeps on giving**.

designated. These endowment funds are the Nativity Trust and the Nativity Historic Preservation Foundation.

The Nativity Trust is a way you can help Nativity's mission expand, reaching out to others in creative ways above and beyond what is funded through annual pledges. Trust and Foundation money is never used for the daily operating costs of our parish, including salaries, routine maintenance and utilities. Per the Covenant with the Alabama Episcopal Foundation, not less than 75 percent of annual distributions from the Nativity Trust must be used for expenses outside the normal operations of the parish with particular concern for new outreach initiatives. The remaining portion of the annual distribution is used primarily for major maintenance and capital improvements.

The Nativity Historic Preservation Foundation was established as an additional program to ensure we could build appropriate funds for historic preservation of our beautiful campus. The foundation was formed to provide capital improvements and/or maintain the historic buildings and grounds of this holy place- a National Historic Landmark- so that it may continue to invoke the

spirit of the past and inspire future generations. (It should be noted that it is necessary for you to be specific if you want your gift to go to Nativity Historic Preservation Foundation. If you put just "Nativity" in your will, it will go to the Nativity Trust according to Nativity's Covenant with the Alabama Episcopal Foundation.)

So, if your passion is OUTREACH, designate your gift to the **Nativity Trust**, which provides financial support primarily for new outreach programs and special capital needs of the parish.

If your passion is for HISTORIC PRESERVATION, designate your planned gift to the **Nativity Historic Preservation Foundation**.

As you enjoy God's blessings through Nativity, may your gratitude for these good gifts inspire you to do

the same for others through your planned giving. Please pray for how God is calling you to help expand the Kingdom's impact and growth through Nativity's mission and ministries.

Greene Street Market at Nativity is downtown Huntsville's produceronly, open-air market for fresh, locally-grown vegetables, fruits, meat, cheeses, and flowers. It's where you go to meet farmers with gorgeous local produce, grass fed beef and pork, free range chickens and eggs; pick up freshly-prepared meals, gourmet popsicles, traditionally-made relishes, cheeses, preserves and breads. And, it's where local artisans offer their works.



It's a great place to meet your friends (or make new friends), enjoy your family, hear wonderful music, do your shopping, and eat dinner- all in downtown Huntsville.

The outdoor market (located at the corner of Greene Street and Eustis Avenue in downtown Huntsville) is open every Thursday from the first Thursday in May through the last Thursday in October. The hours are 4 pm - dark May through August, 4 pm - dark in September, and 3 pm - dark in October.

What is Compline?

Lent is now over, and Easter is still fresh in my heart and mind. The walk to the cross with Jesus was felt, and it was experienced more meaningfully by attending a precious experience called compline.

What IS compline? I know it as the most peaceful and beautiful harmonic sounds given Sundays at 8pm in the beautiful nave of the Church of the Nativity. I simply showed up to the service of music, with nothing required of me.



Arriving, I walk along the brick path lined with luminaries that guided me to the entrance. When I opened the door, I was immediately greeted with wafts of incense. Looking around, the beauty is stunning!

Only candles light the nave very dimly—just enough to help me find a spot in a pew. Recognizing others is difficult, probably by design. We have all come to immerse ourselves into a beautiful half hour of peace. Grace. And what a gift of grace it is—the architecture, the scents, the flickering flames of so many candles that light the steps to the

chancel. Then, as the distant sound of church bells chime the 8 o'clock hour, the small choir made of 8 or 10 very talented vocalists walk in silently. They settle in. And then the gift itself resounds—voices meshing together in the most magnificent,

angelic harmony. They sound out prayers and pleas, moans and praises. These are sounds of nightly prayers one might hear echoing through the chambers of a monastery. "Guide us waking, O Lord, and guard us sleeping; that awake we may watch with Christ, and asleep we may rest in peace..."

According to wikipedia, compline is a liturgical tradition found in some Christian denominations, known as nightly prayer at the end of the day. The word was first used in this sense about the beginning of the 6th century by St. Benedict.

Since I was a child, I appreciated some music as being grace-filled—music that stirs the soul and nourishes the spirit. Compline is that to me. I'm grateful that during some of the liturgical seasons, that Nativity offers the experience of compline. My hope would be that others would experience and find it to be the gift of peace and grace that it is.

Stewardship of Creation

We continue coverage of the 188th Convention of the Diocese of Alabama, with notes from the Keynote speaker's interesting and informative address.

The theme of the convention was "The earth is the Lord's for he made it: come let us adore him." The convention was invited to consider how we are called to be stewards God's creation.

McClintock Keynote Address

Bishop Sloan introduced the keynote speaker, Dr. James B. McClintock, the Endowed Professor of Polar and Marine Biology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham. Dr. McClintock shared his research and experiences to describe the effects of climate change on the environment in Antarctica.

And, in answering the question of "what can \underline{I} do [about climate change]?" Dr. McClintock listed twelve ways to impact climate change:

- Vote; call, write, talk to your elected officials;
- Invest in companies with sustainable practices;
- Insulate your business or house;
- Turn off power;
- Smart consumption (avoid items heavily packaged);
- Adjust the temperature of your thermostat;
- Change driving habits;
- Plant a tree:
- · Conserve water;
- Recycle;
- · Change a light bulb; and
- Educate your friends and family.

He also invited folks to learn more about The Nature Conservancy's "We Need to Talk" Pledge.

"Tell your friends: Seven in 10 Americans believe climate change is happening and 6 in 10 are worried about it. Yet more than half of Americans rarely—if ever—talk about climate change with their friends and families. You can help change that.

"Talking about climate change doesn't have to be scary or divisive. Let those close to you know that we have climate solutions that could address global warming, avoid the worst impacts of climate change, and provide economic opportunities. Sign the pledge to start one conversation this week, and do your best to find more opportunities to talk climate. One by one, we can help get our communities talking, and build support for climate solutions."
