



Just Mercy, A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson

Bryan Stevenson is the founder and executive director of the Equal Justice Initiative. The EJI opened the National Memorial for Peace and Justice and the Legacy Museum in Montgomery on April 26, 2018.

Bryan Stevenson was attending Harvard Law School when he first got involved with assisting death row prisoners. For over thirty years, he has worked in the deep south, mainly Alabama, to represent the poor, incarcerated and the condemned. He has won national acclaim for his work challenging bias against the poor and people of color. This memoir tells the story of several of these cases and shows that evil can be overcome, and a difference made.

A Reflection on my trip to Montgomery

Spiritual development is a life long learning process, or at least it is for me. I am thankful to Liz Laney for giving me a seat on the bus this past April as I joined the Spiritual Development Committee and guests. We all traveled close to 200 miles to visit the "Legacy Museum: From Enslavement to Mass Incarceration" and then up the hill to "The National Memorial for

Michael Shipley organized this incredible pilgrimage to Montgomery. We met at the church early in the morning and filled the seats of our charter bus. Tom announced the days activities and Michael served a continental breakfast to our hungry crowd. We had all gathered with a purpose. For me, it was a mixture of many things. Though I had not made the trip before, I was familiar with the museum and memorial through my husband

and children. My husband had been asked a few years ago to participate in Bryan Stevenson's memorialization of hundreds of hanged, burned, beaten and drowned Black Americans. It was an awe-filled experience; gathering the dirt and putting it in a gallon jar with Bunk Richardson's name on it. That was all there was to mark his death - the dirt. The jar is now displayed at the National Memorial for Peace and Justice recognizing so many Black Americans.

We pulled up to the museum and wandered through the old building that had once been the slave market. Entering the museum, you are forced to go back in time and invited to participate in the pain of separating families. You can see the ledgers of almost every county in America, cataloguing people who were bought and sold, making it easier to comprehend that "slavery is America's greatest sin."

The museum does not allow you to stay in the past. It tracks our American timeline to the here and now. It was the "now" that made my finger point back at me. I am a part of this. What am I going to do? Our Bishop always prays to "make no peace with oppression." I always want to catch his attention and say "no sir, I won't!" In that museum, I sat watching the testimonies of the men, women and children who will never see peace. I sat, because what

I was witnessing could not let me stand anymore. What does oppression look like? It looks like a prison cell, and they even have them for children.

It was hard to stand up and walk out of that museum. But I had the freedom to leave. I left with the knowledge that our America - the one I pay taxes to, the one I pledge allegiance to, the one I love - has



not allowed justice and peace for all. And upon reflection, I would like to imagine the rusting iron memorials that had been cut, welded, and hung from the heavy rafters of the outdoor memorial - had been repurposed from the iron bars of prison cells. Put there in memory - never to be moved - reminding us to never make peace with oppression and to sing unto the Lord a new song.

Stewardship of Creation: Thoughts on Plastic

Climate change, pollution, plastic, recycling...always in the news these days. What can we do as a parish, a family, an individual?

Southeast Recycling Development Council, Serdc.org, out of Hendersonville, NC, has a

mission to unite organizations as well as individuals, foster communication, promote sustainable programs, and coordinate education and awareness regarding recycling. It is worth a browse.

National Geographic Staff Writer, Laura Parker, published an online article in December 2018, with statistics and facts about the global plastic pollution crisis. There are many disturbing stats, one being that only 9 percent of all plastic ever made has likely been recycled. Again, if you want more, it is worth a look. A warning: it may not make you feel great!

After reading, browsing, clicking, I wondered why more focus hasn't been given to reduce use of plastic?

Most of us have been using plastic for the convenience, because it is handed to us, without even thinking that there is an alternative.

A few ideas for families, individuals:

- Buy a reusable water bottle and a water filter. The Brita pitcher works well for an individual, and a filter for the frig or for tap water would be better for a household.
- Sign Bring a basket or reusable bag to the Greene Street Market and grocery store.
- Don't accept a plastic bag if you are only buying a few items and can carry them.
- Sam's uses less plastic packaging.

Just a start. If we all buy less, use less, demand less, maybe God's earth will have less plastic to handle!
