VESTRY NOMINATING PROCESS

Your Vestry Nominating Committee (Grant Thomson, Bill Starnes, Margaret Devenish, Donald Christian, Alice Lanier, David Collette, and Camille Sommer) will be forming this year's slate of 6 recommendations for election at our parish meeting on January 5, 2020. We are excited about the changes in process this year – to better acknowledge the role of spiritual leadership of the Vestry and to improve communication about and during the process.

In past years, nominations would consist of a sheet of paper with a name and a few identifying details (Bill Starnes; usher, cooks biscuits, something to do with men's ministry) and a phone call from the committee asking about their interest. This year, each potential candidate will spend a few minutes completing an application that sets forth the expectations for Vestry participation and talks about the spiritual development and leadership that are so important to that role; including questions asking them to consider their own spiritual gifts.

Instead of secretly dropping a name in a box as in years past, we are asking parish members to talk to those you think would make good Vestry members, share the gifts you see in them and encourage them to participate. Even if they choose not to apply, these conversations considering and discussing their spiritual gifts will be a blessing. And whether it is another parishioner encouraging you or that small voice within yourself that says you should do this, we look forward to your participation

Vestry nominations will be accepted through November 1st. Interested individuals should complete the applicant questionnaire. Questionnaires will be available in the church office and in the entryway of Ridley Hall. An electronic version is available on the church website. The questionnaire describes the responsibilities of serving on the vestry. All responses will be confidential and only used by the Vestry Nominating Committee to form this year's slate of candidates. Questionnaires will be treated confidentially by the nominating committee. 


Pictured above: the new gate at Bibb Chapel



Haiti Mission Team Update

We have not been able to support the Haiti Medical Mission with people due to the unstable political environment in Haiti, but we have been able to support them financially.

Your Outreach donations have paid for a local Haitian medical team to visit 2 remote villages and provide basic medical care. The director of the Lespwa Timoun Clinic, Dr. Donald Delva, reported that the team visited Boukan Boyer, a small village 24 miles from Port au Prince and provided care to 150 patients, 82 of whom were under the age of 14 including 14 infants as well as 21 pregnant women. The following week, the team visited the remote mountain village of Crochu and saw 172 patients and provided pre-natal care to 18 women. These are all patients that would not otherwise be seeing a physician or midwife to help with the pregnancy.

This coming year, the Outreach Committee has agreed to help fund the Krik Krak program which provides meals to school children twice a week (for some, this is the only meal for the week) and will help support about 500 kids.

Once it becomes safe to travel, we will try to resume our regular medical mission team support. We will keep the parish informed.

Stewardship of Creation: For the Love of Trees

With the temperatures finally beginning to break just a bit from the heat of the summer, our thoughts turn to the changing of the seasons. Personally, I love Fall and one of my favorite things about fall is the

foliage changing colors from the bright green of summer to the spectacular reds, oranges and yellows of October and November. The countryside is painted with broad swaths of color that is magnificent to observe and enjoy. Fall is also the very best time to plant trees. An old Chinese Proverb once stated that – "the best time to plant a tree was twenty years ago – the second best time is today". For us in North Alabama, the very best time to plant is the fall of the year with the period between Halloween to Thanksgiving being right in the sweet spot. The are multiple reasons for this but from a plants perspective, planting at this time allows the plant to settle in and get established before the stress of summer comes along. Consider planting now for optimal success.

The reasons we should be planting trees are many – some we have known for many years and others are just being discovered. In the past, many of our plant selections



were based upon aesthetics. Would this plant provide flowers, interesting foliage, colorful fruits or a distinctive shape or form. Now we are looking at our plant selections, especially trees, as to the ecological services they will provide. These eco-system benefits are the truly functional aspects of trees in our landscapes and they are just as important (one could argue more important) than the aesthetic reasons for having trees in our landscapes. There are six major areas of eco-system benefits that trees provide: reduced air pollution, storm water run-off control, carbon sequestration, improved water quality, reduced energy consumption and habitat for pollinators. One could say that Trees are outstanding natural machines that do an incredible amount of work on our behalf. Most of these benefits have been touted before in differing ways, but only now are we truly seeing the magnitude of their benefit to the environment.

As we are dealing with a warming climate (regardless of how it has occurred) planting more trees is a natural solution. One well placed shade tree on the west side of a house can reduce energy consumption in the summer by as much as 25%. Trees thrive on carbon dioxide so they are a natural sponge for taking carbon emissions for the atmosphere and replacing with oxygen. An increased tree canopy helps negate the adverse effects of storm water run-off, something that is increasingly affecting our urban environments. Lastly, as all of us have become more aware of the plight of our pollinating insects, the planting of trees is an integral part of improving their health. It has been shown that a single oak tree could support as many as 500 different pollinating species of insects. Absolutely amazing! I have long

advocated the planting of pollinating gardens for our insects but they often revolve around beautiful plantings of flowering shrubs and perennials – trees are just as important in this equation of pollinator plantings.


On a final note, I want to share another very important reason for one to consider why planting trees is important – wellness. This past spring, the American Heart Association released a study entitled "Living in a green, leafy neighborhood could cut heart attack risk". This study conducted in Miami with 250,000 Medicare recipients showed that those living in neighborhoods with an effective tree canopy are 25% less likely to have a heart attack. Other studies have shown the impact of trees or being in nature to have an incredible impact on improving mental health. I am much more in favor of prescribing tree planting for wellness than prescribing more pills.

I hope this will inspire you to consider planting trees this fall. Always remember to make sure you take into account the mature size of the tree you are considering to make sure it will be a good fit for your space. Lastly, take some time and get out and enjoy the changing of the seasons and see the incredible palette of color God has provided for us to enjoy.

What Are You Reading:

The Interior Castle and Book of My Life by Saint Teresa of Avila

Early in 2017 I felt the need to immerse myself in extended solitude and silence, sacred time for prayer and reflection. I was mysteriously led to the luminous writings of Teresa of Avila, and I began with Mirabai Starr's resplendent translation of *The Interior Castle*, next Teresa's spiritual biography, *The Book of My Life*, and finally her letters and lesser known works.

In these remarkable writings, Teresa offers a road map for seekers on the spiritual path. Her words overflow with spiritual and psychological wisdom, and with a profound understanding of human nature, and the mysteries of prayer and discernment of Holy Presence.

St. Teresa of Jesus,' as she was known by her religious name, remains near to me as teacher and spiritual guide. The two major books on her teachings and spiritual journey – *Interior Castle and My Life* - are never far from me as she guides my spiritual journey. She reached such depths of prayer and union with the Divine that I long to sip from, and she gives voice to the small baby steps in my faith journey.

I prayerfully offer my gratitude for the gifts of St. Teresa and the community of saints within our Christian Spiritual Tradition in the Reflection below that I wrote one early fall morning:

Prayer Time with St. Teresa of Avila

I'm on our sun porch this early morning, as is my usual way to begin the day. As I sit down, I turn on the old globed candlestick lamp on the table to warm the room with its glow. The double-hung windows are slightly open and a sweet gentle breeze wafts through the room. It's still night outside and the world is very quiet. I light a candle, sometimes three; smooth the white cotton scarf draped across the table, open my Prayer Book, Bible, and Teresa of Avila's *Interior Castle*.

A cup of steaming tea is next to me.

Darkness shrouds the garden and woods beyond. It's an early, cool, fall morning. Again this morning, I'm longing for solitude and quiet. I only desire to be with God... I am CRAVING silence to revive my barely breathing soul.

Slowly as I begin to breathe in the silence, an inner spring imperceptibly begins to flow. As I continue to breathe in and out, slowly my body stills, the thoughts of my mind and memories quieting down.

A subtle and intangible sense of peace begins to radiate from a mysterious center- core somewhere within me.

I am prayerfully reading Mirabai Starr's beautifully translated words of a 16th century Spanish Carmelite nun, mystic and renowned Teacher of Prayer, St. Teresa of Avila.

In some mysterious way we are transcending the distinctions of time and place, and are sharing an inner spiritual unity with one another.

Teresa describes the spiritual core of life, the soul, as a spiritual castle with many room, walls, and doors, like concentric circles that spiral around the sacred Dwelling Place of God: the radiant Center within each of us and present in all creation.

This is the Holy of Holies, the inner Temple of the most High, the True Self, the seat of the heart, the soul.

And she is a safe and true and faithful guide for me. I know this.

Almost daily for 10 months I have returned to this same space of solitude and quiet. St. Teresa has been my spiritual guide, teacher, and mentor for this journey into the Presence of God.

Her understanding filling in my lack of words and my lack of understanding; her experiences clarifying what I cannot express as I prayerfully seek the Holy One; her stages and descriptions interconnecting with my experiences of fear, anxiety, consolation, and desolation: all that I have lived through and come to know as true but cannot express.


