GEARING UP FOR SUMMER AT NATIVITY

Dear Parish Family,

WOW! What an amazing Easter Season we have had! We celebrated marriages, baptisms, confirmations and lives well lived. We continued to worship both in-person and online, and we have just completed our new Audio/Visual system installation. Our playground committee has been working hard and construction will begin soon. In keeping with our Bishop's guidelines, we have lifted most COVID-19 restrictions. We have also re-introduced Children's Chapel, and have launched our "One Body" Accessibility Campaign. This is all to say that your church continues to be the active and growing faith community it has always been. I am so grateful to you for your patience, continued stewardship, and joyful hope during this anxious year.

Worship is the heart of who we are, so I am very excited to let you know about our summer worship schedule which will begin on Sunday, June 6.

Sunday:

- 7:30 am Holy Eucharist, Rite I without music
- 10:00 am Holy Eucharist, Rite II with choir and Children's Chapel After service in the Courtyard, "Lemonade in the Shade"
- 6:00 pm Holy Eucharist, Rite II with camp-style music in the Courtyard If it rains, service will be held in the church.

Weekdays:

- Wednesday at 12:00 pm Holy Eucharist Rite II and Healing Service in the church
- Thursday, June 10 6:00 pm Holy Eucharist Rite II in the church

Having our weekday services in the church will allow us to livestream for those who choose to worship from home. Once we secure the funds to purchase and install a camera and microphone for Bibb Chapel, we will move our Wednesday and Thursday services back into that space.

For now, we will continue to offer bread only at communion, and our nursery will re-open on Rally Day in August. We will also be livestreaming our 10:00 am Sunday service, and all church spaces are open to resume most church activities.

I know this is a lot of information! Please call or email the church office if you have any questions or concerns. I look forward to celebrating Pentecost with you this Sunday and I am excited to be baptizing three children at the 9:00 am service! God is good!

FAQS ABOUT THIS PROJECT

What is the scope of work?

The 2,200 square foot project includes an elevator that will allow access to all floors of both Joffrion Hall and Ridley.

There will be a new power assisted entryway where the breezeway between Joffrion and Ridley is currently.

New HVAC equipment providing increased outdoor air intake and quality will be installed for all the new spaces.

15 new toilets will be added which includes new restroom facilities for Bibb Chapel. Many of our current restrooms will be renovated. There will be a new Garden Guild work room, new vesting room, additional kitchen storage, additional Joffrion Hall storage, and a renovated choir robing space.

How much is this going to cost?

The estimated total cost of this project is 2 million dollars.

THE ORDER OF DEACONS

Now during those days, when the disciples were increasing in number, the Hellenists complained against the Hebrews because their widows were being neglected in the daily distribution of food. And the twelve called together the whole community of the disciples and said, It is not right that we should neglect the word of God in order to wait at tables. Therefore, friends, select from among yourselves seven men of good standing, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to this task, while we, for our part, will devote ourselves to prayer and to serving the word.' What they said pleased the whole community, and they chose Stephen, a man full of faith and the Holy Spirit, together with Philip, Prochorus, Nicanor, Timon, Parmenas, and Nicolaus, a proselyte of Antioch. They had these men stand before the apostles, who prayed and laid their hands on them. Acts 6:1-6

Thus began the order of deacons. Deacons were selected to fulfill the worldly needs of the early church; to take care of the widows in the community. The role of the deacon has expanded from these early duties and include

being in the world to bring the needs of the world to the church and empower the church to go into the world and serve the needs of the community.

As part of the ordination service for deacons, the ordinand is charged with the following:

As a deacon in the Church, you are to study the Holy Scriptures, to seek nourishment from them, and to model your life upon them. You are to make Christ and his redemptive love known, by your word and example, to those among whom you live, and work, and worship. You are to interpret to the Church the needs, concerns, and hopes of the world. You are to assist the bishop and priests in public worship and in the ministration of God's Word and Sacraments, and you are to carry out other duties assigned to you from time to time. At all times, your life and teaching are to show Christ's people that in serving the helpless they are serving Christ himself.

The Book of Common Prayer defines the ministry of the deacon in the catechism. The ministry of a deacon is to represent Christ and his Church, particularly as a servant of those in need; and to assist bishops and priests in the proclamation of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments.

The role of the deacon in the modern church has included ministry to the homeless, food insecure, aged and elderly, those in prison, the mentally ill, victims of disaster, victims of racial inequality, immigrants and to provide environment consciousness.

Every baptized person is called to the diakonia, to service in the name of God. Deacons are given formal leadership authority to make sure this work is done. Deacons most often lead the efforts to proclaim the gospel's peace and justice in word and deed outside the parish doors.

The deacon's role in the worship service is to mirror those responsibilities in the liturgy.

The deacon reads the Gospel, coming down from the altar to stand among the people so the people can hear the stories of how Christ has commissioned us to be servants in the world. The deacon reads the intercessions (the prayers of the people) to be sure we reflect the needs of the world, not just of our parish. The deacon sets



the Eucharistic table to prepare the food that the people of God need for action in Christ's name and the

deacon stands at the door at the end of the service to send the people of God out into the world to love and serve the Lord.

The deacons are not compensated for their ministry. They go through a period of discernment to be sure that God is truly calling them to this service and then through a period of formation (deacon school) to prepare them for the tasks of teaching, preaching and leading. If you feel you are called to this ministry, review the vows deacons make at ordination (pg 543-4



of the Book of Common Prayer) and the description of the ministers of the church (laity, bishops, priests and deacons found in the Outline of Faith (pg. 856 BCP). Please feel free to talk to any of your clergy who will be happy to help guide you through the process.

RESTORING THE EARTH, WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE: STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION

Restoring the earth" was the theme of Earth Day 2021 with a focus on climate change, deforestation, renewable energies, water conservation and recognizing how these factors are interconnected. Establishing a global culture observing "Ecological Sustainability" is critical and change needs to begin now.

Ecological sustainability refers to the quality of not being harmful to the environment or depleting natural resources, and thereby supporting long-term ecological balance. The term "Eco footprint" is used to estimate the amount of resources humans utilize to survive. Biologically productive land and water areas produce the food, water, energy, clothing, and building materials that humans consume. Globally, the equivalent of 1.5 "Earths" are used yearly by the 9.5 billion people today. Earth takes nearly 1 year and 6 months to regenerate these resources. Given these rates and continued population growth, the UN predicts by the 2030s two Earths may be required. Since we only have one Earth, action is needed now.

For instance, re-generating destroyed forests, of which 18 million acres are lost every year, is recognized as a major response in restoring Earth's equilibrium and mitigating climate change. The benefits of mature forests are of critical ecological importance to the environment as stated by Owen Burney, director New Mexico State University's Forestry Research Center. Forests improve the quality and quantity of drinking water, capture and store atmospheric carbon dioxide, provide habitat for Earth's terrestrial species which, in turn, nurture the forest. Reforestation is the top nature-based climate solution in the U.S., according to Solomon Dobrowski, professor at the University of Montana, with forests playing a "pivotal role" in finding solutions for biodiversity and climate change. Soil, water, and wildlife quality improves as forests become established and expand, as well as our quality of life.

Global water shortages are already upon us. Ample, clean water is vital for human health, industry, agriculture, and energy production. Yet the world's water systems face formidable threats due to unsustainable management and climate change. As many as 3.5 billion people could experience water scarcity by 2025, with demand projected to grow up to 30% by 2050. Water-related conflicts and political instability are on the rise. Climate change is worsening the problem, intensifying floods, droughts, shifting precipitation patterns, and fueling sea level rise. Already, 90% of natural disasters between 1995-2015 were water- or heat-related.

What can we do to improve our sustainability? As stated in Earth Day articles, "Start in your own back yard"! A few suggestions from Earth Day include:

- Plant a tree or native wildflowers, a garden; take advantage of rainwater
- Turn it off if you are not using a resource at that moment, like water or electricity
- Reuse items like grocery bags, coffee containers, water bottles, utensils
- Recycle as much plastic, paper, glass, metal as you can
- \$\ Shop local. Farmer's markets and local retailers benefit the environment
- § Begin educating yourself on environmental issues, discuss with others

Events like Earth Day challenge us to ponder, where is God leading us on or march as global citizens.

Where does the global ecological crisis put us in relation to the "Creation" God has provided us? In Genesis we are given dominion over the earth and its living things; collectively we pray for the just and proper use of his creation. Yet now, we realize that the Creation God gave us is not the same now as that given us.

"We do not inherit the earth from our ancestors, we borrow it from our children" is a popular proverb from David Brower. What will our legacy be to these future generations?
