### Dear Nativity Parishioner,

If you are reading this, I suspect it indicates that The Church of the Nativity is important to you and your family. Like countless pilgrims over nearly 175 years, you have found a reason to call our vibrant, historic parish your spiritual home. Maybe you are drawn to the Cursillo community or perhaps the rich tradition of choral music we experience each week.



Families with children undoubtedly appreciate the Christian formation programs and the many opportunities to fellowship together. Our more mature members may find joy in reflection and meditation in one of our lovely spaces both indoors and on the grounds. Whatever path brought you here, you can be assured you are loved, respected and valued.

Most of us would agree that there is a unique sense of space here at Nativity; I might go so far as to call it holy ground. It isn't simply that our buildings have stood the test of time; it is knowing that this historic parish continues to serve as a beacon for our community in the 21st century. Despite the beauty and significance of our properties, it is time to face the fact that we have neglected a need that first became obvious over 40 years ago. Frankly, our property is not as accessible and welcoming as it should be. **NOW** is the time to address that problem.

Because **We** <u>Are</u> **One Body**, it is time to install an elevator, build several restrooms and renovate some other spaces to meet the accessibility needs of **everyone** who visits or calls Nativity home. Your vestry and parish leadership will be sharing more information in the coming weeks but I'm writing to encourage you... no, I am writing to **CHALLENGE** you to consider how you can do your part in this project which will benefit all of us for many years to come.

The **We Are One Body** building improvement project will cost about \$2 Million. You may be like me when you see numbers that large. It might be hard to imagine how we can pay for this project even though it has been a critical need for decades. It helped me to break it down a bit. Our annual budget for pledges and offerings is approximately \$1.4 Million. **If we each pledge 150% of our annual contribution we will have the money we need.** Frankly, many of us can and should do more but **it is important that we all do our part** to fund a project which will benefit all of us.

When this project is completed in 15-18 months, I know you will agree that it will be tangible and symbolic evidence that **all are welcomed at The Church of the Nativity**. Please join me and your fellow parishioners in making this long-deferred dream a reality for this generation and those that follow us.

We are excited to tell you about the Accessibility Project or Elevator Fund at Nativity!

The Accessibility Committee was tasked with finding a way to make Nativity's facilities more accessible to all people, specifically adding an elevator and more restrooms. The result of the Accessibility Committee's work is the One Body Campaign.



A brief history of the project

goes back to the formation of the Accessibility Committee which had three subcommittees: design, finance and communications. All subcommittees coordinated with the Vestry. The Design Committee made a "short list" of architects who were interviewed. James Caudle, NewSouth Architects, was selected. He is developing the construction documents, as he did for the ramp addition to Bibb Chapel. Mr. Caudle is assisted by his team of consultants for the engineering work. The contractor, Chorba Construction, came highly recommended and has been assisting James Caudle with pricing. The Finance group, led by Grant Thomson, is currently interviewing financial institutions while we continue to receive donated funds. All funds given to the One Body Campaign will only be used to complete this project.

The Americans with Disabilities/ADA act was passed in 1990, well after Ridley was complete. Since then, Nativity has grown, which is a good thing. With the Vision 2020, we recognized the need to make all areas of the church accessible to all who worship here. Along with the elevator which will provide access to all floors in both Ridley and Joffrion, the issue of having enough restroom facilities became part of the package. The new elevator core will be located between Ridley and Joffrion, adjacent to the breezeway.

Our existing bathrooms will be upgraded with new fixtures and finishes. Two new unisex restrooms will be located in the elevator lobby of each floor. The Attic space will have two new restrooms as well.

Currently, we have been reviewing the design development drawing set from the architect to finalize the surrounding existing spaces. Adding an elevator core causes a "domino effect" of the surrounding rooms, as it requires connection to the existing buildings.

Because Bibb Chapel is somewhat separated from the new elevator core, it became necessary to add restrooms on that side of our campus. The existing Flower Guild room by Bibb Chapel was previously a

bathroom. The One Body campaign will renovate the space into two bathrooms. The Flower Guild will be housed in a new space, thus displacing the existing women's restroom. The domino effect.




Many thanks to the children of Nativity for being a part of GET OUT! Discover God in your Backyard

### NATIVITY'S NEW PLAYGROUND

In 2008, a playground was installed at Nativity. The wooden structure was designed for children 2 through 5 years old. For 13 years, the play space provided lots of fun for our children. However, it has deteriorated and was deemed unusable last year. Father Michael Goldsmith formed a committee to determine how to replace the playground equipment. After seeking input from parishioners and their



children, the committee created a Request for Proposal (RFP) which was sent to companies who specialize in playground equipment. The committee asked for structures to be accessible to children of all abilities ages 2 through 8 years old. With the addition of swings and slides, older children will enjoy the space as well.

Three companies replied to the RFP. The committee evaluated the footprint of each company's proposals based on safety, durability and maintenance, visual appearance, 'fun' appeal, landscaping and site furnishings, accessible equipment, flexibility in equipment selection and cost. After due diligence, the committee chairwoman, Allison Proud, presented the committee's request to the Vestry on May 25. The vestry approved a contract with Game Time/Struthers Recreation for the equipment and installation of playground equipment in the amount of \$125,018.53. Due to a combination of 2020 budget surplus funds and generous parishioner donations, the playground has been fully funded. Ralph Vemmer and Andy Cowan have led the demolition effort to prep the site for the new equipment.

The committee requested a door be installed to allow access to the new playground from the nursery in Joffrion Hall. In light of the One Body Campaign, it made sense to the committee to create a safe access point to the playground for our youngest members. In addition to the door, a ramp will be installed. The playground will extend from the edge of Gates Avenue up to Joffrion Hall. Gates will be installed on either end of the sidewalk behind Joffrion Hall to ensure a safe and secure place for play. Because NewSouth Architects and Chorba Construction have been hired for our Accessibility Project, it made sense to use them to install the ramp and the elevator. The contract to install the door and the ramp are separate and apart from the Elevator project.

But wait, there's more! The new playground space will have sail cloths to provide much needed shade and tables and chairs will provide plenty of space for caregivers and parents to rest. This area may also be used for small group meetings.

The new equipment should be installed by the end of the summer. We are excited about the new playground equipment and know it will provide many years of enjoyment!

### STEWARDSHIP OF CREATION

This is the best time of year for our six-legged friends: butterflies, bees, and lightening bugs.

Last week, our back yard seemed like a gift from God with a light display that was truly wondrous.

It seems we seldom take the opportunity to witness this show produced by Mother Nature.

It is this same time of day when our less favorite insect friends can be biting pests.

According to the textbooks, primarily Aedes sp. and less commonly Culex sp. harass human beings two hours after sunrise and several hours BEFORE sunset. If we have bright lights turned on after dark, mosquitos take the opportunity to continue biting us.

Simple measures, such as draining standing water, are the best safeguard against local mosquito populations. So please - drain plant saucers and clean bird baths regularly. If you choose to use pesticides, please be an informed consumer. The most commonly used pesticides are pyrethrins (natural substances from some crysanthemums) and their synthetic equivalent, pyrethroids. My concerns about commercial mosquito control companies are advertising promises and the detrimental effect of their spray treatments on beneficial insects. Mr. Kelly M Stevens MS, Director of Infectious Diseases and Outbreak Division, Alabama Department of Public Health, has a wealth of information regarding mosquito-borne disease. Mr. Stevens also explains in the passage below that pesticide use is a complex issue:

"There are a great variety of mosquito adulticides and larvicides available, and not all kill by contact. Also, the timing of applications and size of the spray droplet is very important in targeting mosquitoes and avoiding beneficial insects as well as preventing harm to non-target animals. Different chemicals and formulations are used to target the adult or immature mosquitoes and have different modes of action. Once you are able to get the name of the chemical(s) being used in your area, you can search more about them using the name of the product. "

The challenge we face is balancing protection of our environment, including insects, and protecting the health of our families. Please be an informed and responsible steward of creation. <a href="https://www.alabamapublichealth.gov/">https://www.alabamapublichealth.gov/</a>
