## Sawyerville Day Camp: How you can be a part of something amazing!

For almost 30 years, the Diocese of Alabama has held a summer day camp for the children of Hale County, Sawyerville. The mission of Sawyerville is to create opportunities for children and youth in Hale County through free summer programs, mentoring, and scholarships. All of their programs work to serve God, broaden the horizons of participants and staff, improve race relations in Alabama, and enrich the lives of those living in poverty. This ministry started with a few teenagers and adults who went down and did their best to provide a



Vacation Bible School like experience for a handful of kids has grown over the years into something truly amazing that has transformed the lives of campers and staffers alike for decades.

Today, Sawyerville has five programs serving the children of Hale County: Summer Camp, Summer Learning, Mentoring, Person2Person and Scholarships. Each of these is equally important, and requires the time, talent and financial support of the whole Diocese to be successful.

Nativity has had a presecene with this ministry for many years. Both adults and teenage leaders from our parish have served on staff, as mentors and prayer partners, served on the advisory board. Nativity has also helped in the past by holding supply drives, donating outreach funds and providing meals for the summer staff.

This year, we have the opportunity to support the mission of Sawyerville once again! There are several ways that you can support this ministry, and we hope that you will find a way that works for you. 
#### SUMMER CAMP

Sawyerville Summer Camp is a free day camp for children and youth ages 6-13 living in Hale County, Alabama. In Summer 2021 we hosted three four-day camp sessions, welcoming over 300 campers and more than 200 volunteer staff. The staff are high school and college age young people ages 16 and up. ### SUMMER LEARNING

The mission of Sawyerville Summer Learning is to help close the achievement gap and prevent summer learning loss in Greensboro, Alabama. SSL will work toward this mission by hosting a multi-week summer

learning program in which students will strengthen their literacy and math skills. Additionally, SSL is invested in helping students grow as scholars and citizens through participation in academic field trips, community engagement, and other enrichment opportunities.

Sawyerville is looking for certified elementary school teachers who can serve for at least one week in the summertime. Teachers receive a stipend, and housing and meals are provided in Greensboro. Nativity member Tameka Slaughter has served as a Sawyerville Summer Learning Educator for the last several years. She will be attending the

One the goals of Sawyerville is to broaden the horizons of participants and staff, and one way we work towards that goal is by offering a mentoring program for students at Greensboro High School.

#### PERSON TO PERSON

One of Sawyerville's three goals is to improve race relations in Alabama. In all of their programming, they teach campers, students, participants, and staff to love one another with no exceptions, as Jesus loves us, and to respect the dignity of every human being, as our Baptismal Covenant requires. Sawyerville hosts weekend conferences for high school and college youth every year over the Martin Luther King, Jr. weekend. Participants talk about how to improve race relations in Alabama and visit various historical sights



that mark the Civil Rights Movement. The Person2Person Fellowship was created to provide year-round programming for the Sawyerville community. 

ativity is one final inspection away from using Joffrion Hall again! Like many of you, this experience has taught me the 'hurry up and wait' syndrome of the construction industry. In looking at our use of Joffrion Hall, I have rearranged some rooms to better accommodate our needs. Mary Coe is working on getting the nursery back up and ready for your children.

With the summer months approaching, (HOT WEATHER) I have examined all our cooling units. The unit which serves Ridley Hall is very old and in need of replacement. I have contracted with a company to replace the unit and am hopeful our 63 year old unit will hang on a little while longer. Nativity definitely got her money's worth!

I appreciate your support concerning the Bell Tower. The Building and Grounds Committee has been aware of the deterioration of the mortar and has been actively seeking masons qualified to work on historic structures. Nativity has contracted with Masonry Arts to repair the deteriorating mortar on the Bell Tower and to install copper flashing to prevent future damage. I anticipate work will begin within the month.

Nativity is very close to completing the landscape work on the playground. Once completed, the area will be plumbed for irrigation. Then comes the fun part of selecting plants!

During July, Marlin plans to strip and wax the floors in Angel Lane. With his attention to detail, the area will be nice, clean and ready for activities this fall.


My family lives on Echols Avenue, we have 8 kids and we love to play at the parks around our house. The other day we realized that the park you have built as part of your church is open to the public.

# Becoming Beloved Community & Sacred Ground: What's Next?

During Lent, a small group of folks gathered every Thursday at 5:00 pm in Ridley Hall to participate in a Becoming Beloved Community conversation. Each session was led by a lay person who served as the facilitator, and clergy were there each week to help tackle any big questions. For some the conversations were a continuation of what they had learned as one of the participants in a Sacred Ground group. For others BBC was a bit of an insight into Sacred Ground and the racial reconciliation work the Episcopal Church is doing.

At this point you might be asking, "what is Sacred Ground and Becoming Beloved Community"? Sacred Ground is a film- and readings-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups are invited to walk through chapters of America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family stories, economic class, and political and regional identity. The 11-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories. Sacred Ground is also part of Becoming Beloved Community, The Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in our personal lives, our ministries, and our society. This series is open to all, and especially designed to help white people talk with other white people. Participants are invited to peel away the layers that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day – all while grounded in our call to faith, hope and love.


One thing became apparent through these conversations, "we want more"! Those who have completed Sacred Ground are looking for "what's next" in this journey, while those who are just beginning to take interest in the churches role in racial reconciliation are looking for something deeper. Well, we are here to try and provide both!

Coming this summer, we will begin two new Sacred Ground groups, one virtual and one in person. Later in the fall, we will begin two additional groups who will meet in person. If you would be interested in being a part of one of these groups, please fill out the <u>interest survey found here</u>, or contact Vicky Hinton for more information, <u>vhinton@nativity-hsv.org</u>. Both the summer and fall groups forming will last 10-12 weeks, depending on how the group decides to structure their meetings. Weekly meetings usually last 1.5 to 2 hours and the preparation for each class (reading materials and videos) can take several hours as well.

This fall, we will also introduce a new Sunday School class for adults using curriculum materials from Becoming Beloved Community. These will be held during the regular Sunday School hour, and will be an option for people who have completed Sacred Ground and want to continue the conversation. There are also new materials for those who have completed Sacred Ground in the Deeper Dive section of the website that can be found <a href="here">here</a>. We are also hoping to schedule a large group trip to Montgomery to visit the EJI Legacy Museum and National Memorial for Peace and Justice and host a presentation by the Madison County Remembrance Project. More information on those two events coming soon.

Finally, we would like to encourage everyone to attend the United City-Wide Worship event hosted by North Alabama Pastors United for Change, (see flyer below) Sunday, June 5 at 6:00 pm. This would be a wonderful opportunity for any group or individual looking to find ways to support healing of racial division in our community. ### Outreach Missioner

e dedicate one Sunday a year to those in or touched by recovery, however it is an everyday thing for those who deal with recovery. This is something I am very aware of at First Stop. I did not have a class in seminary on drug and alcohol addiction; however, I feel like I could teach one at this point. Beside personally having had loved and lost people in my life to drugs and alcohol, I am so thankful for the tools I have been given by the people at R.O.S.S. Recovery and all they do for those in the community as far as helping people seek treatment and guiding them into sober living following treatment.

This past Monday I got to First Stop and saw Brandon. I had not seen Brandon for about a year and a half. I meet him three years ago when I started serving over at First Stop. His drug of choice was meth. He was a regular to services on Thursday. He spoke with me often and we prayed together. He asked me to put him on my prayer list when he broke his arm and made sure I called his mom when he got locked up for getting kicked out of the Rescue Mission.

His mom would call me, ask me when I had seen her boy. Ask if he was coming home. Brandon and I talked about rehab, talked about him going home to his mom many times. I lost count of how many times he was supposed to meet me at the bus station for me to buy him a ticket and he did not show up. Until finally he did.

Brandon has been clean and sober for a year now, he came back to Huntsville because First Stop can help him get his documents like his birth certificate and ID and social security card. The small town where he is from not have services like we do. He was barred for a year from the Rescue Mission but now that his time is up he is back there while he is in town. He told me he is staying there while waiting for his paperwork and watching old episodes of Gun Smoke and going to meetings. He will head back home and go back to work on his mom and stepfathers farm once he has all of his paperwork.

The job I have as an Outreach Missioner is a blurry one, for lack of better term. This past week I helped a mama dog in the camps, organized a haircutting event for the homeless, visited folks in the hospital, held worship, broke up a fight, then laughed with the people who were fighting. There is no model I am following but I am following the Holy Spirit. I see the Spirit on the move also in the church as more opportunities are being presented for people to be involved and engaged, such as The Mother's Day Brunch and the Pep Squad with the Give Back Run.

For the next year First Stop will be under construction. Thank you for recognizing that like Recovery Sunday, outreach does not just happen one Sunday a year but it is something we are called to do and make part of our spiritual practice.

# Creation Care: What it is, and why it matters to Christians

arth Day was officially observed on April 22nd world-wide, and April 24th was designated as Earth Sunday in the Diocese of Alabama. But we don't have to limit our celebration just to those days - God's Creation should be celebrated every day!

Take just a minute to think about: What is one of your favorite things/places in God's creation? Here are some verses to help us understand our relationship with God's Creation:



You alone are the Lord. You made the heavens, even the highest heavens, and all their starry host, the earth and all that is on it, the seas and all that is in them. You give life to everything, and the multitudes of heaven worship you. -Nehemiah 9:6

The earth is the LORD's, and everything in it, the world, and all who live in it; -Psalm 24:1

The sea is his, for he made it, and his hands formed the dry land. -Psalm 95:5

What does "Creation Care" mean to you? What does environmental justice mean to you? Let's look at some answers the Bible gives us:

I know that the LORD secures justice for the poor and upholds the cause of the needy. -Psalm 140:12

Defend the weak and the fatherless; uphold the cause of the poor and the oppressed.

Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked. -Psalm 82:3-4

The King will reply, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'
-Matthew 25:40

How can we care for creation in a way that honors God? Some suggestions:

~Educate yourself, learn all you can! ~Pray about it!

~Talk about it! ~Go renewable/consider solar panels

~REDUCE, reuse, recycle ~Compost

~Walk (or bike) when you can ~Carpool

~Eat a more plant-based diet/try not to waste food ~Shop local

~Pick up trash in your neighborhood ~Consume less

~Tell your elected officials: "these issues are important to me"

- ~Reuse plastic bags or bring your own shopping bags
- ~See who else you can influence (where does your circle extend?)

A closing prayer: For the Conservation of Natural Resources

Almighty God, in giving us dominion over things on earth, you made us fellow workers in your creation: Give us wisdom and reverence so to use the resources of nature, that no one may suffer from our abuse of them, and that generations yet to come may continue to praise you for your bounty; through Jesus Christ our Lord.


### Care of Creation Bible Challenge


One of Nativity's Core Values is Care of Creation. We celebrate creation in our worship, offering prayers and


