Stewardship of Creation March 2023

Ezekiel 34.8 asks us, "Is it not enough for you to feed on the good pasture, that you must tread down with your feet the rest of your pasture; and to drink of clear water, that you must muddy the rest of the water with your feet?"

God has entrusted us with the care of his creation and reminds us to cherish what he has given to us. He is asking his people to use the Earth wisely and be conscious of the impact that our actions and consumption have on others.

On my run through Bud Cramer park this morning, I noticed several plastic bags floating in the creek. As I often do, I paused my run and picked several items of trash out of the creek and placed them in the trash can. One consequence was wet feet for the rest of my run. Another consequence was that I had a short conversation with a lady sitting in the park. I don't know her circumstances; she could be one of the homeless people I often see in the park early in the morning, or from the nearby low-income housing, or she could be a crypto millionaire. She thought I was doing a good thing and people should not throw trash in the creek. I agreed and said keeping the creek clean was good for the kids who play there and for the ducks and herons who live there. It felt good to do a bit of clean-up, but the brief connection I made with a fellow child of God who also cares for His creation raised my spirits even more.

Outreach

I can remember when my daughter Molly called me and told me she was listing her husband as her emergency contact rather than me, it was a big step for her and me. Part of me was sad, however I was thankful she had another person in her life she loved and trusted that she wanted called in case of emergency.

The last few months our homeless community has experienced several deaths, some due to drug overdose, some due to cancer and one due to gun violence. Oftentimes I find myself being the "emergency contact" that the police reach out to to try to find the families of those who have passed. One thing we are working hard on doing is updating records at First Stop so we have family contacts for the clients.

We have had funerals for those who have passed both out in the camps and at First Stop. Their family may not be present but the people from the homeless community mourn them and pray for them as the Body of Christ.

Before the Eucharist we read: "life is changed, not ended". When we bring forth this message of the Gospel and the hope of the resurrection, we bring forth life. Thank you for your support, love and prayers.

As a volunteer you will load the washing machines with soap and drop the required number of quarters necessary to run the washers and dryers. Then just sit down and listen to someone's story and maybe share a bit of your own as well. It's a powerful way to be the hands and feet of Jesus. - noon and Thursday's 1:00 to 3:00 pm. You may volunteer as much or as little as you wish.

Maundy Thursday—On Maundy Thursday, April the 6th, Rosie will be holding a Maundy Thursday Service at First Stop/Travelers Altar. In placeo of the foot washing ceremony, we will be cleaning peoples shoes, shining shoes and boots, repairing and replacing worn laces. We will be collecting shoelaces and boot laces as well as assorted insoles for people in our homeless community. Donations can be placed in the bin in Ridley Hall marked First Stop. KNOW BEFORE YOU THROW

When you are ready to part with items you know longer need or want, remember to be mindful of the individuals, organizations and environment you are giving them to.

Books, school supplies & magazines

- DONATE books in good condition to a little free library in your neighborhood or a thrift store.
- DONATE school supplies that are new or very gently used you no longer need to a supply drive or
- REUSE school supplies that still have life left! You don't need to buy all new items every year.
- RECYCLE magazines! No one wants your 10 year collection of Southern Living, but they can be place in the blue bin and turned into something useful.
- RECYCLE books that have missing pages or are badly damaged.
- THROW AWAY used items that are unrecognizable (markers that don't work, crayons that are broken, half used glue or notebooks that are already half full should and should be recycled.





Clothing & shoes

- DONATE clothing that is in new, like new or gently used condition to a thrift store.
 - · Coats, hats, gloves and scarves are warm weather or winter items and can be donated to winter supply drives.
- **DONATE** athletic shoes, boots and other shoes that are in new, like new or gently used condition to a thrift store.
- REPURPOSE clothing items that are extremely worn, have holes or are badly damaged into cleaning rags, or donate them to an organization that accepts rags like Christmas Charities.
- THROW AWAY all used underwear, socks with holes, items that are unrecognizable and shoes with holes or torn soles.



- DONATE unopened non-perishable items like canned goods, pantry staples and boxed goods that are within date to aLittle Free Pantry or local foodbank.
- **DONATE** If properly handled and stored, fresh prepared foods, like leftovers from an event, can be donated. Contact First Stop, 256-533-3391, to determine if your food can be used and make arrangements to deliver. PLEASE DO NOT drop these items at homeless camps! It is unsanitary.
- THROW AWAY food items that are open, used, damaged or out of date. Condiment packs and sauces from take out need to be thrown away.





Electronics, batteries & phones

- DONATE unopened packs of batteries, phones and tech items that are working and less than 5 years old to a thrift store. Remember to clean and erase all personal data before donating.
- RECYCLE printer cartridges at your local office supply store, Green Team Offices or by using the mail-in envelope often provided by the manufacturer.
- PROPERLY DISPOSE OF used batteries, broken and outdated electronics (printers, computers, televisions, cables and cords) by taking them to the Solid Waste Disposal Authority's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Site.



- **RECYCLE** these trash items in your blue bin every month:
 - Aluminum cans and steel bi-metal cans. Dry paper, magazines and cardboard. #1 and #2 narrow neck plastics. Paper cartons.
- **RECYCLE** glass if possible with a company like Phoenix Industires. This service is not free.
- PROPERLY DISPOSE OF yard debris (leaves, limbs, plants, etc.) by placing on the street in recycleable paper bags for pick-up. Consider composting as another option for yard and organic food waste!
- PROPERLY DISPOSE OF all household chemicals, paints, motor oils and fertilizers by taking them to the Solid Waste Disposal Authority's Household Hazardous Waste Collection Site. DO NOT POUR THESE INTO A DRAIN, WATERSOURCE OR YARD!







Hygene supplies, medicine & medical equipment

- DONATE unused and unopened first aid supplies like bandages, bandaids, saline spray, alcohol swabs, testing strips etc. to the Community Free Clinic.
- **DONATE** unused and unopened personal hygene prodcuts like shapmpoo and deodorant to a food bank or little pantry.
- DONATE working medical equipment like walkers, wheelchairs, crutches, shower chairs and adult diapers to groups like Christmas Charities Year Round or a thrift store.
- PROPERLY DISPOSE OF over the counter and prescription medication properly to ensure the safety of everyone in the community. DO NOT flush these items or put them in the trash. Medications can be dropped for proper disposal at participating pharmacies and the Public Safety Complex Drop Box.
- THROW AWAY open or used first aid supplies and personal hygene products and broken medical equipment.

Furniture & household items

- DONATE furniture, appliances and household items that are in new, gently used and working condition to a local thrift store. Schedule a pick-up with the store directly if you can't move the items yourself.
- **DONATE** linens and towels that are tattered, stained or worn to an animal shelter.
- PROPERLY DISPOSE OF broken furniture, appliances and household goods at the Solid Waste Disposal Authority Household Hazerdous Waste Site. There may be a small fee for discarding these
- When boxing up household goods to donate, consider putting items in boxes with like items (kitchen items together, bathroom items together etc.) and label them appropriately.





- DONATE new and gently used games & puzzles (with all the pieces), toys, baby items, baby furniture and new stuffed animals to a thrift store.
- THROW AWAY Toys that are broken, games and puzzles that are incomplete, used stuffed animals and car seats that are expired.
- There are many safety factors to consider when getting rid of a carseat. Please visit https://momlovesbest.com/what-to-do-with-old-car-seats to determine what you should do.

Outreach Cont.....

The outreach Committee voted last month to dedicate a donation given in memory of Prentice White towards the Uniontown clean water project. We were able to purchase 12 filters to help the community reach the goal.

For over a decade, the Episcopal Church and other organizations have been shipping bottled water to this community to meet their daily drinking water needs. Water is



heavy and hard to transport, and the plastic waste from single-serving water bottles makes this an unsustainable method for a long-term solution.

Additionally, the families need to travel to a central distribution location to pick up the water they need regularly. This is a challenge for this aging, economically depressed community in Alabama's Black Belt. A sustainable solution is needed.

A quick Google search will provide a plethora of details about the decades-long struggle this small community has had with toxic water, coal ash, landfill struggles, and a sewer system with spray fields. Lawsuits and government projects have been a way of life for the citizens and their local leaders. While we can't solve all these problems, we can work towards putting a Berkey water system to produce clean drinking water on every kitchen countertop that wants one.

These systems are extremely effective, long-lasting, and simple to maintain but are not inexpensive. Each pair of ceramic filters will filter 6,000 gallons of water. Estimating two to three gallons per day, that's about 5 to 8 years' worth of clean water before the filters have to be changed; a much more sustainable solution. At around \$400 each, support throughout the Diocese is needed. Thankfully, we have received a few grants and individual donations already to help us reach about 20% of our goal. 
Common Ground by Derek Koehl
