Stewardship of Creation

Clean Energy for All

On September 20, 2017, the Category 4 Hurricane Maria hit Puerto Rico, bringing massive destruction. As horrendous as that was, the aftermath of the storm was even more devastating as 80% of its power grid was completely destroyed and not restored for up to 9 months in some rural areas. Then on October

16th Governor Ricardo Rosselló recognized the situation and issued an executive order declaring any new solar *micro-grid*, (a tiny, self-contained version of the bigger grid that powered the island) could skip the lengthy permitting process and be automatically approved. This act opened the door for a new technological revolution to take place on the island that paved the way for what Bill Nussey terms *local energy*₁ to be realized. Groups such as the non-profit Resilient



Power Puerto Rico (ResilientPowerPR) quickly shipped solar panels and batteries to the Island, allowing them to stand up 3 solar micro-grids built within days to provide electricity to community centers. They were able build a solar microgrid in the parking lot of San Juan's Children's Hospital, restoring operation to full capacity. Rocky Mountain Institute (RMI) led local organizations in early 2018 to build a microgrid that allowed the Pedro Fernandez K-8 school in Naranjito to future power outages so they could remain in school regardless of any future events. Additional work is continuing as Adjuntas, PR recently rolled out a system that includes some 700 panels mounted on seven buildings in the town's central plaza and a battery storage system capable of providing up to 187 kilowatts of power. The batteries can provide enough off-grid electricity to keep 14 downtown businesses running for up to 10 days in case of an extended power outage.

While this may seem insignificant, it signals an early stage of a new paradigm in which individuals, communities and local businesses generate their own energy - a new bottom-up approach that has the power to reshape the electric industry. For more than 100 years the industry - aka, the "Big Grid" - has operated unchanged and unchallenged as a regulated electric monopoly in which a small number of businesses have complete control over their own designated regions. However, as the Grid continuous to grow in size it becomes more and more vulnerable due to its many single points of failure, with climate playing a larger and larger role. Further, it really has no incentive to meet the demands of the day that our climate crisis requires. However, as a result of decades of declines in prices of solar panels, batteries and electronics such as microinverters, it is increasingly cheaper to generate electricity onsite than to buy it from the grid (Parity between the two was reached in 2020). And these prices will continue to decline with technological advances and economies of scale, which projections that residential solar will cost half the



However, one of best reasons for being interested in this new technology as a religious community is that it is better positioned to aid the poor and impoverished of the world climb the "energy ladder" to a better life while not exacerbating climate change. This includes the nearly one billion low-income people living in Africa and India with no access to an electric grid.



Greene Street Market Grant

The Outreach Committee is pleased to announce the Greene Street Market Grant recipient for 2023 is The Community Free Dental Clinic. The Clinic has treated over 9500 patients since opening in 2013 Currently over 49,000 residents in Madison County are living in



poverty. There is a specific niche within the poverty level population that the clinic has extreme difficulty treating. These are the mobility impaired patients within our target population. The clinics difficulty is transferring the patient from their wheelchair into the dental chair. The Grant will be used to purchase a compact wheelchair recliner. This will allow the dentist the ability to treat wheelchair patients.

We are very excited for the Community Free Dental Clinic and thankful for all they do for our community.

Outreach

"So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you......I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."



Our tradition on Maundy Thursday is foot washing, we have always done it that way, so why change? I wanted to change up the Maundy Thursday service because the people I serve needed something different.

Part of my job as Associate at Church of the Nativity is being a priest in the homeless community. That means I spend time providing pastoral care and worship opportunities at the community center for the homeless called First Stop, however we call the spiritual thin space provided, The Travelers Altar, because faith is a journey we are all on.

Over the past few years serving in the community, one thing I learned is that homeless people walk a lot. The other thing I learned is that a new pair of shoes is not something homeless people receive. I have learned that my privilege allows me to wear my fancy rain boots into the homeless camp that I can come home and rise the mud off of when the rain has left the camps in a swamp like state. Our homeless siblings in Christ do not have that privilege. There is no running water in the camps and space to store shoes for every occasion is unrealistic. Even those who live in shelters do not have supplies available and



at the bus stop in bad weather. As I began to think about the act of service Christ modeled for us on Maundy Thursday, I thought about the muddy tennis shoes, I thought about the broken shoe laces, the soles of a pair of shoes being worn thin and the uncomfortable dress shoes passed out at thrift stores that lost their shine a decade ago. I thought about the love and new life that Christ speaks about. So I put out a collection bin in the parish hall and asked for helpers to "wash shoes" at the Maundy Thursday Service at First Stop/Travelers Altar.

Outreach, Cont.....

In the week prior to Holy Week I came into my office and found three garbage bags of brand new tennis shoes. Jill Chadwick, who is a vestry member, had reached out to a family member who works with Fleet Feet and they gave us all the returned shoes they could not put back on the sales floor. It was a beautiful sight to behold.

More supplies came in, shoe laces, boot laces, polish, magic erasers, and insoles for both men and women's shoes in so many different sizes and varieties. I asked Microwave Dave, a parishioner and local music legend to come play the blues during the washing part.

On Thursday morning we had around 95 people show up for breakfast at the center. By 9:30 we had shoes sorted and on racks, tables set out with the supplies to clean and give shoes new laces and insoles, at 10 the service

began. The helpers from Nativity sat among the people during the liturgy and sermon.

When it came to washing shoes, I lost count of how many pairs were replaced. I saw two of the homeless men begin to clean each other's shoes while Nativity parishioners were shining shoes. After I cleaned one woman's shoes one of the homeless men, whom I have known for years wanted to shine my boots. He had been in the army and was excited to show off his boot polishing skills.

The music provided a mood for fellowship and gave a common space for everyone to exist in. It was a beautiful service. I know from the feedback that this is something that we will make a tradition out of, because loving one another is the way it has and should always be done.



WHERE IS YOUR HEART?

Mary Johnson grew up at Nativity, both baptized and confirmed here. Her dad's family came here in the early 1800's and some of them worshiped at Nativity. In fact, the two paintings on either side of the main doors at the back of the church are her grandmother's works (Martha Patton Darwin). Though Mary moved away for a while when she got married, she returned about 20 years ago and rejoined her Nativity family.

In her time here, Mary has taught Sunday School, served as a Lector and helped on the Altar Guild. Most recently, she's been serving on the Spiritual Development committee as a representative for Centering Prayer. She loves the workshops the committee offers that expose the attendees to different methods of prayer and communing with God. To sit in silence, to welcome God into that space, and to feel the transformation from that experience.

Mary has experienced that transformation in her spiritual journey through the practice of Centering Prayer, which she's been doing daily for about 20 years now. She learned of God's presence within each of us through a personal experience many years ago and notes that once she knew that God existed in that way, she wanted to spend time in that space, and "I just want to do what God would have me do. In sitting in silence and intentionally welcoming God into your heart and mind, it does transform you."
