## Rector's Corner

*"Try to remember the kind of September  
When life was slow, and oh, so mellow..."*

These lyrics - the opening lines to a song from the musical "The Fantasticks" - are running around in my head this morning. It's a lovely bit of music that taps into feelings of wistful nostalgia.

However, I must admit that there is very little resemblance in that song to September 2024— or any September in my memory. This always seems to me to be a time of renewed energy and anticipation. It's the beginning of the school year with all the excitement (and anxiety) that can mean for students, parents, teachers and other school staff. Harvest season is in full swing; farm crews are busy working very long days, and the Farmers' Market is bustling. With the general election coming up, various candidates and initiatives kick campaigns into high gear, with supporters and opponents making their final push before ballots are sent out in October.

At church, it also means the beginning of the program year. Christian Formation for children and youth starts up again; the choir returns to enriching our weekly worship; various ministries have fall projects that they're working on in earnest. And the list goes on. It's a busy time; busy in good ways, but hardly what I'd call "slow" or "mellow."

Isn't that the way nostalgia works? We've all experienced a bittersweet wish for "the good old days" that, inevitably, doesn't tell the whole story. Not that anyone's memories are dishonest, but rather, they simply can't encompass the fullness of a whole era and culture. One person's childhood may have been idyllic; another child, in the same neighborhood and time frame, may have been traumatized. One woman may have been happy in her life, either

inside or outside her home; another, in the same circumstances, may have felt trapped and miserable. And so forth.

That's one reason Jesus' example of acknowledging the whole reality of people's lives is so powerful, and so important. In common vernacular, he met them where they were— all people, of all backgrounds and experiences— offering comfort and challenge, healing and hope.

Following in Jesus' footsteps means we needn't pretend that everything is all right when it's not; nor that we be unwilling to hear the whole story of a time, or a place, or a person. Just the opposite: Jesus shows us that we can love more fully, and serve more faithfully, by moving beyond idealized versions of "the way things were." When we open our eyes, ears, and hearts to more, we can better glimpse the Holy Spirit's presence in ourselves, our community, and our world. We can work for that same Spirit to be more visible in all the ways we live, whatever kind of September (or other month) it is.

## Adult Education

All Saints' will offer a variety of options for study, learning, and growth during our Adult Formation time in September.

**September 1:** Those who attend All Saints' on Sunday will conclude our summer study of scriptures centered on "Listening to God and our Neighbors." The Rev. Rachel Jackson will facilitate this week's discussion of Luke 18:1-8, the parable of the persistent widow and the unjust judge. Those at Camp Cross on "Family Camp" retreat will spend some of their time with the Gospel story of Jesus' meeting with the Samaritan woman at the well, John 4:1-42.

**September 8:** We will kick off the program year with a combined class: Godly Play for all ages. We'll gather in the Multipurpose Room, where Katy O'Callaghan will share the story of The Holy Bible.

**September 15:** We'll spend some time reflecting together on the baptismal covenant, and the promises we make when we are "received into the household of God." Where do those promises come from? Where do they lead us?

**September 22:** Issues of homelessness and hunger continue to be an ongoing concern in the Tri-Cities and around the country. Cindy Fish, who works with unhoused people through a weekly meal service in Kennewick, will share her experiences and insights; together we will consider what's possible, and discuss faithful responses to the needs of our neighbors. **September 29:** Remember the RenewalWorks survey we were asked to complete in June? It gave us a snapshot of our congregation's spiritual lives. Please grab a cup of coffee or tea and join us each week, between services (roughly 9:15ish - 10:00 AM); you'll be glad you did.

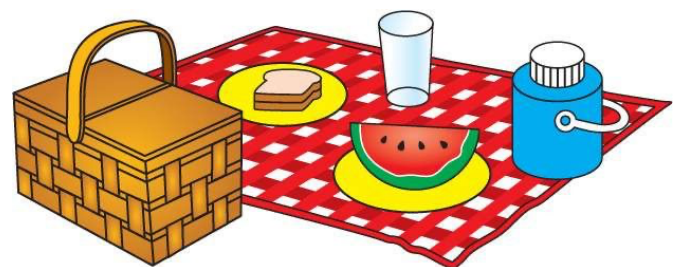
## Children and Youth Ministries— September 2024

### **Youth Group—Parent Picnic, September 15, 5-7 PM.**

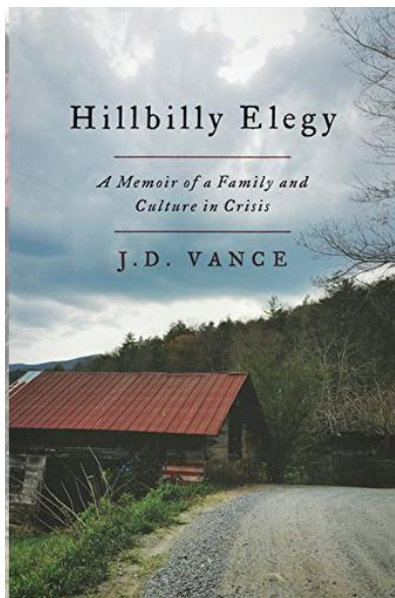

## You're Invited! Fall Bible Study

We are all an inescapable product of our culture, our faith (or perhaps non-faith) background, and influenced to differing degrees depending on whether we are at the perceived top of the contemporary socio-economic ladder, or somewhere much lower. In reading and contemplating the gospels, it can be a challenge to seriously engage them, while attempting to also understand that Jesus was born, raised and died a Jewish man in Roman-occupied Israel in the first century.

This fall, the Bible study group will be engaging in study of a book, *The Jews in the Time of Jesus* by Stephen Wylen. The book discusses Jewish history, the influence of Greek culture on Israel, Jewish worship practices and major festivals, as well as

study texts available to Jews in Jesus' time. Wylen also discusses Jesus' trial, the various Jewish sects that may have been involved, as well as one of Jesus' contemporaries and his influence. The book concludes with chapters on development of various gospel types, and how and when Judaism and early Christianity parted ways.



We will be joined in our discussions, via Zoom, by a no-longer-local Jewish woman, Miriam Kerzner, and her mother in Canada. Miriam has been a source of explanation, correction and inspiration of all things Jewish to our Bible study group for years. She will provide all of that, and more, in our weekly discussions.

The Bible study group meets Mondays in the Parish Hall from 1:00-2:30. We will begin **Monday, September 9**. This is an exciting opportunity to learn about Jesus, his culture, and his religious heritage from a perspective that is totally new to most of us. Please join us!

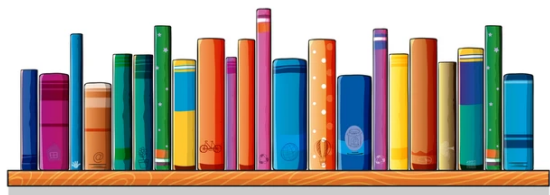


## Scam Alert!

## Walk in Love: Moments in Nature

For this year's stewardship campaign, we are using the Episcopal Network for Stewardship's (TENS) theme, "Walk in Love," based on Year B in the lectionary cycle. The Very Rev. Matthew Woodward of Trinity Cathedral in Sacramento offers this reflection:

*"Walk in love..." is in my neural pathways now. It's worn in; if I say those three words the rest of the offertory sentence flows with little conscious effort. It is almost pre-linguistic: a reflex.*

*You could argue that the idea has become rote. That is what people say about liturgy often repeated. It means nothing. But I don't think that is the case. I think that the idea has now been written into my brain so deeply that it has become a part of me.*

*"Walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself for us an offering and sacrifice to God."*

*My walk is meant to imitate Christ's walk. My walk should emulate his self-offering. My walk is a reminder that everything I have and am comes from God, and living life with that attitude reminds me that I should walk through life as though it is a gift, not a possession.*

*I know this most in the summertime when I go for*

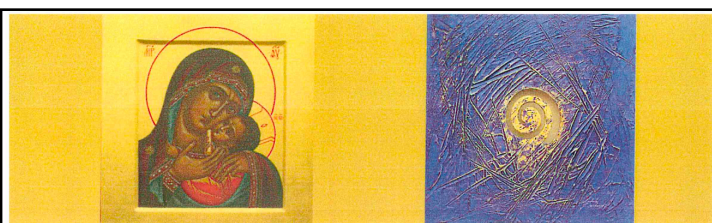
*long walks with my dog, or hike with friends. The first 10-15 minutes of any walk my mind is often turbulent, chundering and fussing about the stresses of the day. But at some point I will hear a bird, or see the sun breaking through a leafy branch. My attention will shift, and I will take a slightly deeper breath. My mind will still, and my walk will become one of love.*

*This is the moment I remember I am a beloved child of a loving God. This is the moment when I become me. This is the moment I become generous.*
