## Rector's Corner

*“Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.”*

Ephesians 5:1-2, NRSV

If this bit of scripture is familiar, perhaps it is because it is one I often quote during our Sunday liturgy. It is a common introduction to the Offertory — the point in the service during which we bring our offerings forward. It's a reminder that all we give, has been given to us; that the bread, wine, and money we place on the altar are tangible signs of God's love and ours.

Love is the very foundation of our faith. Jesus came into a culture hemmed in on all sides by oppression and subjection, and caused a revolution of thought and heart, not by force of arms, but by walking in love with the marginalized, the poor, and the sick, and bringing them and us along with him on his journey. Over and over again, he shows that it is not clever politics or force that cause the change in society, but Love.

This is why “Walk in Love” has been the theme for our stewardship talks this summer and fall. Many people have reminded us that the transformation of generous hearts is a journey we make together, in a variety of ways. It isn't automatically part of human nature to give away what we have acquired, or to donate our precious time without compensation. It takes something as radical as Love to inspire us to share our time, talent, and treasure with others.



Perhaps the most miraculous thing of all is that God's love is there within each and every one of us, waiting to be nurtured and set free. When we Walk in Love together we learn this— to share, to give, to volunteer, to accompany others, to feed, to pray, to visit, to strive for change.

In a couple of weeks you'll receive packets inviting you to continue this journey— to commit once again to habits of prayer, giving, and service. I hope you will take the time to think, to pray, and to consider your faithful Walk in Love with All Saints'.

Everyone is invited to virtually attend the investiture of our new presiding bishop-elect Sean Rowe!

“In this historic and joyful season, we invite you to pray for guidance for our church and our new presiding bishop as he leads us in envisioning the reign of God in our midst. May our celebration unite us as a sacramental community, and may we be filled with new energy to bear witness to God's work of redemption.”



- **What:** The Episcopal Church will officially welcome the Rt. Rev. Sean Rowe as its 28th presiding bishop with a smaller, simpler

investiture service aimed at reducing carbon footprint and increasing churchwide virtual participation.

- **When:** Saturday, Nov. 2, with a prelude featuring a “roll call” of dioceses starting at 6:30am PT. The service itself starts at 8am PT.
- **Where:** The service will be livestreamed here (<https://www.episcopalchurch.org/investiture/>) and on The Episcopal Church’s Facebook page. A recording will be posted and distributed after the service.



**Youth Class.** Youth in middle and high school meet on Sunday mornings in the loft from 9 to 10 AM. They begin this month by finishing up their study of





## All Saints' Book Group

Our next book to read is ***The Good Rain: Across Time and Terrain in the Pacific Northwest***, by Timothy Egan. Timothy is the Pacific Northwest correspondent for *The New York Times* and lives in Seattle. In this 1990 book, he describes his journeys around the PNW, through salmon fisheries, redwood forests, impoverished reservations, and manicured English gardens, weaving in history, anthropology and politics.

This is a look at our part of the American continent, both its promises and its problems, by a terrific storyteller. It's been called "an exemplary blend of geology, anthropology, and politics from across the Pacific Northwest." Several readers have commented that, "If you love the PNW, you gotta read this book!"

• Emergency Evacuation

Stairs: Mike O'Neill has a crew working on repairing and preserving the outside stairs from the loft.

- Replace Light Fixture: replace one exterior light fixture about 10 feet off the ground (new light has already been purchased).
- Estimates to Re-Key the Church: get two or three bids for the vestry to consider for re-keying specific interior/exterior doors and a large number of new keys.
- Signage Improvement: assist in hanging frames for exit instructions in classrooms and offices and some larger frames in a few strategic locations to assist folks who are unfamiliar with the building.
