Rector's Corner

The date on the top of this newsletter says January, 2025. Happy (secular) New Year!

Are you in the habit of making New Year's resolutions? I confess that I am not. Like many people, I've tried a few times over the years, but most of the well-intentioned improvements I've envisioned starting on January 1 have not seemed to stick with me over the long haul; at least, no more so than a random date in April or August.

That said, I do find that the turn of the year does always seem to trigger some thoughtful introspection.

Godly Play in January. Sunday school classes resume at 9 AM on January 5 with a combined Epiphany lesson in the multi-purpose room. This is a great time to join in on the Godly Play experience! Regular classes are for children age 3 through 5th graders, meeting in the education wing on Sunday mornings. Visitors are always welcome! Godly Play stories for the month are:

Godly Play Epiphany story: Combined class, January 5. The Story of Epiphany will be held in the multi-purpose room for all ages, including adults, with the story beginning at 9:10. We will be demonstrating the thurible, burning real incense, censuring the church building, making crowns, and eating a King's Cake. Will you find the Baby?



Youth Class starting new unit on Dismantling Racism. Starting **January 12**, the youth class will be working with the Dismantling Racism curriculum from the Absalom Jones Center for Racial Healing, Diocese of Atlanta. This material was written specifically for grades 6 to 12. It uses video resources, activities, discussion, and journaling to engage youth in the work of racial healing. "There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus." (Galatians 3:28)

The youth class meets in the loft on Sunday mornings from 9 to 10 AM. These six lessons will take us up to the beginning of Lent and each one is important, so please try to attend all six.

Donations needed for Blessing Bags. The Youth will be packing the Blessing Bags with food, toiletries, and warm clothing for the homeless on

January 12. The complete list of what we put in the bags is here; *especially needed are canned meals with pop top lids, foil pouches or small cans of tuna or chicken, fruit cups, Band-aids, lip balm, and feminine hygiene products.* We have plenty of toothbrushes and toothpaste!

Your donations are very much appreciated! Please bring any donations to the church by **January 9** so we can purchase what else is needed; our goal is to pack between 50 and 70 bags. After January 12, the bags will be available for parishioners to pick up and keep in their cars to distribute as they see need.

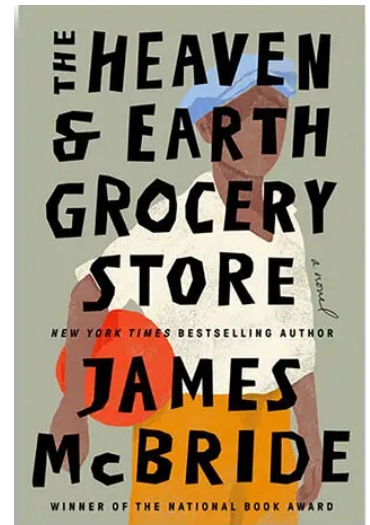
All Saints' Book Group

Our next book to read is *The Heaven & Earth Grocery Store*, a 2023 novel by James McBride. This book sits on many "best book of the year" lists and has won numerous awards, including the Library of Congress Prize for American Fiction. The *New*

York Times Book Review calls it a "murder mystery locked inside a Great American Novel."

In 1972, workers in Pottstown, PA, find a skeleton while digging a new foundation. Who the skeleton was and how it got there were two of the long-held secrets kept by the residents of Chicken Hill, the dilapidated neighborhood where immigrant Jews and African Americans lived

side by side and shared ambitions and sorrows. As the story continues, it becomes clear how much the people who live on the margins of white, Christian America struggle, and what they must do to survive. In dark times, it is love and community—heaven and earth—that sustain us.



We will be discussing this book on **TUESDAY, January 14**, beginning at 6 PM with a potluck dinner. All are welcome! (If the weather is bad on the 14th, we will switch to a Zoom discussion.)

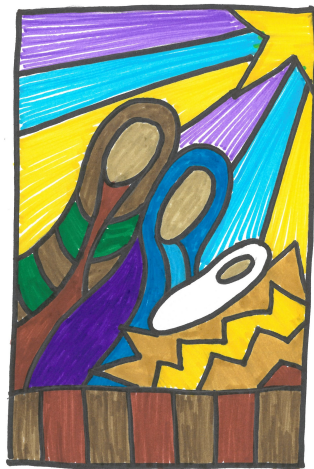
Regional (Eastern WA): Camp Cross, Campbell Farm, Noah's Ark, West Central Episcopal Mission;
