## Rector's Corner

*Whoever plants a seed beneath the sod  
And waits to see it push away the clod  
He trusts in God.*

("No Unbelief," by Elizabeth York Case)

It's still very much the middle of winter— grey skies, bare trees, cold weather and short days; but inside our house we're getting ready for spring. It's seed planting time! I'm giving a head start to my garden by starting some seeds indoors. Soon I'll plant tomatoes and peppers; cucumbers and lettuce will follow in a few weeks. The goal is to have seedlings ready to transplant outdoors in mid-April, after the last frost dates in spring.

As we were reminded by our VBS program last year, seeds are often mentioned in scripture. Given the virtues that growing plants from seed demands, this is no surprise. A few that occur to me...

—*Commitment*: growing seeds will reward dedicated effort. While it is certainly possible for a seed to

grow into a healthy plant on its own, regular care and intention will increase the odds of success, both in quantity and quality of the resulting plants.

—*Generosity*: giving seeds an environment in which to thrive requires an investment of time as well as money. It means starting with good soil, and ensuring sufficient light and water on an ongoing basis.

—*Trust*: there is no guarantee of success. Most seeds will germinate, but some won't, and there's no way to tell from the outside which is which. So all the seeds get the care they need, regardless.

—*Patience*: seeds will sprout when they're ready and not before!

Jesus featured seeds in several of his parables precisely because they have so much to say about the practice of faith. Commitment, generosity, patience and trust are key to developing a grounded, life-giving spirituality that will bear fruit each and every day.

What seeds are you planting these days? And what are you doing to nurture them?

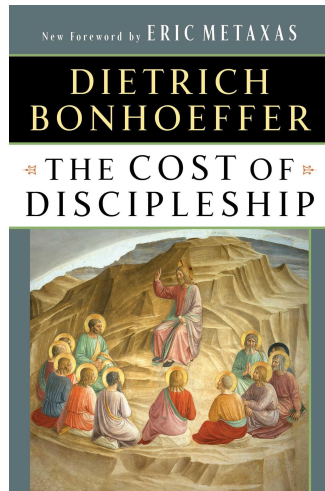
### Winter Cross February 14-16

## All Saints' Book Group

Our next book to read is **Dietrich Bonhoeffer's *The Cost of Discipleship***. First published in German in 1937, this text is Bonhoeffer's answer to the questions, "What did Jesus mean to say to us? What is his will for us today?" Bonhoeffer was a Lutheran pastor and theologian, and a Nazi resistor, and is recognized as a saint and martyr in the Episcopal Church. His feast day is April 9, the day he was executed by the Gestapo in a concentration camp in 1945.



Drawing on the Sermon on the Mount, *The Cost of Discipleship* illuminates the difference between "cheap grace" and "costly grace," and the demands of sacrifice and ethical consistency in living the Christian faith. This book will challenge you to consider what discipleship truly means.

We will meet to discuss this book on **Tuesday, February 25**, beginning with a potluck dinner in the parish hall at 6:00 PM. If the weather turns wintry, we will switch to a Zoom discussion. ## Saints and Sinners

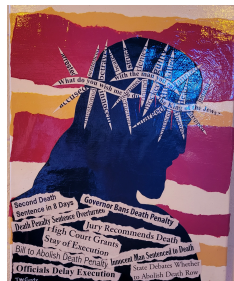

**Rachael Black** (*vestry and delegate*): I am a returning Northwesterner and All Saints' parishioner (2023), having been in the Las Vegas area with my daughter's family for six years. I retired from Boeing (Seattle) after 30 years of managing various

computer programming efforts. In younger years, my spare time was spent hiking/backpacking/climbing in the States and in England, Europe, and New Zealand. During my prior sojourn here, I served on Outreach, Pastoral Care, and Vestry; now I serve on Pastoral Care and Coffee Hour, as a Eucharistic Minister, Lector and LEM, as Convention delegate (2024) and volunteered at our Warming Shelter (2023).
