Day of the Dead

On **October 26**, we will have a combined education hour for all ages from 9 to 10am, and we will start with a Godly Play-style story about the Day of the Dead, told in the multi-purpose room. Following the story, you will be invited to share your stories at the *ofrenda*, and work on traditional crafts (sugar skulls, flowers, skeletons, *papel picado*). Day of the Dead is a wonderful way to remember the saints who have come before us.

El Dia de los Muertos (The Day of the Dead) is celebrated each year on November 1st and 2nd, when families honor their loved ones who have died. This holiday has its origins in ancient Mesoamerican cultures that blended with those of the Spanish Catholic conquistadors, who arrived in Mexico in the early 1500s. The Aztecs believed that life and death were the forces of the earth and a natural part of the cycle of regeneration. Bodies die and go back to being part of the earth. Rituals developed to honor the souls of the departed, including leaving food, burning incense, and making an *ofrenda*/offering. The Spanish encouraged the indigenous people to practice these rituals on All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day.

The Day of the Dead is the joyful holiday that resulted, meant to welcome and honor the souls of the dead. Today, people build the altars in their homes, decorated with candles, flowers, and lots of food. Trips to the cemetery involve cleaning the graves, eating, and all-night parties with live music and memorable stories.



All Saints' continues to celebrate the Day of the Dead and the saints who have come before us. We

will have an altar set up in the parish hall: please bring your pictures of loved ones who have died (include the name on the frame or with a separate paper), along with a favorite item/food of theirs, to add to this altar. You will have the opportunity to share a story on October 26 during the education hour. This altar will remain up through November 2 (All Saints' Sunday) and you may leave your items on it for the week.

Rector's Corner

*"I believe in the Holy Spirit,
the holy catholic Church,
the communion of saints,
the forgiveness of sins,
the resurrection of the body,
and the life everlasting."*

Does this sound familiar? I hope so! This is the end of the Apostles' Creed, which we say during Morning and Evening Prayer. This creed is also the foundation of our Baptismal Covenant—the promises we make and/or reaffirm every time someone is baptized, and a few times a year regardless. These statements are a summary of some foundational Christian beliefs about the nature of the Holy Spirit and the ways we see it at work in our lives. They may be brief, but they encompass profound theological concepts that say a great deal about how we choose to live as followers of Jesus.

Take, for example, the Communion of Saints—the theological focus of our “Building Bridges Between Believers (B4)” program in October. What does that mean? The Catechism in the Book of Common Prayer (p. 862) says,

“The communion of saints is the whole family of God, the living and the dead, those whom we love and those whom we hurt, bound together in Christ by sacrament, prayer, and praise.”

It means that we believe followers of Jesus are part of one great spiritual body, in union with one another across time and space.

Rooted in scriptural teaching and ancient tradition, these few words have a tremendous impact on our practice of faith. Belief in the Communion of Saints upholds our common bond with God and one another in the great worldwide Body of Christ; it reinforces our understanding of resurrection and life after death; and it supports the Christian traditions of prayers for the dead and seeking the intercession of the saints.

All that, in four words. Want to learn more? Join us **October 14 at 6pm** for our next B4 dinner. You'll be glad you did.

Adult Formation

In October we'll continue delving into "Transforming Questions." This is a course designed to help both new Christians and longtime churchgoers move into deeper life in Christ. Children and Youth Ministries: October 2025

Godly Play is our Sunday school program for young children in preschool and elementary school. They meet in the Godly Play classroom on Sundays from 9 to 10am. Visitors and friends are always welcome. Good stories are worth repeating!



Outreach Focus for October: My Friends’ Place

This month, Outreach is excited to support the work of My Friends’ Place, a program of the Safe Harbor Support Center that strives to fill a gap in services for 13-20 year-old homeless individuals in the Tri-Cities. Homeless youth do exist in our community and come from all socioeconomic classes, all religions, all races, all genders.

My Friends’ Place provides homeless teenagers with a bed, meals, clothing, showers, laundry facilities, support services, and individualized case management services. Drop-in services are also available to all youth in need in our community.

Jr. Warden's Report



The Pavilion Contract is complete and paid for - the pavilion and shed are officially ours! We have already held our first event (the picnic with St. Paul's) and we are looking forward to our second, October 17, Saints and Sinners (weather permitting). We definitely have some items to complete, notably:

- suitable fall prevention on the south and east sides (playground and yard, respectively)
- painting of the sacristy shed floor and cabinet installation
- security camera installation
- landscaping

By the time you get this we should be well underway on the restoration of the parking lot. We expect to add a few more spaces and a considerable number of parking stops to keep cars off the grass and planting areas. Additional curbing is also planned.

We have had some shrubs in the memorial garden die and we believe it is from inadequate water. The existing sprinkler system was probably very effective when the shrubs were smaller but some of the successful ones seem to block water from others.

We have authorized our landscaper to remove the dead shrubs and replace the current sprinkler system with a drip system which will use less water and keep the shrubs healthier. He will also replace the dead boxwoods in the hedge and that should improve the looks of things.

We are also getting bids to maintain and/or improve the gutters on the main building.

Emergency Shelter Orientation

Since December 2022, All Saints' has hosted an emergency warming shelter in our parish hall when the weather turns bitterly cold. Should the need arise again this year, we want to be intentional about "equipping the saints to seek and serve Christ in all people."

An orientation for anyone interested in serving as a volunteer will be offered on **Saturday, October 25, from 1-3pm**. We will review shelter policies as well as answer any questions you may have.


Let us know you're coming by adding your name to the signup sheet in the narthex, or by calling the office (509-943-1169), so we know how many people to expect. There is no cost involved.


