Christmas at All Saints'

Happy New (church) Year! We're officially in Advent, when we prepare our hearts and minds for the Incarnation. Looking ahead, there are many opportunities at All Saints' during the Christmas season to worship and celebrate the birth of Jesus. Important dates and times include:

Candles and Carols is our parish's Christmas party; if you've never been, we hope you'll join us this year! We begin with a social hour of drinks and appetizers at 5pm, followed by a potluck dinner at 6pm. Afterward we all head upstairs to carol together in the sanctuary.

There are three opportunities to celebrate Holy Eucharist between Christmas Eve and Day. The family service will feature the annual No Practice Pageant (see more on pg. 3) - all kids are welcome to participate! Both Christmas Eve services will also be available live-streamed.

Rector's Corner

The rhythm of our church life is organized around the story of Jesus. Throughout the year we follow along—birth, life, death, and resurrection. We hear teaching and learn of miracles: feeding and healing and walking on water. In this way we glimpse the fullness of God's deep desire for relationship with humanity.

And now, in Advent, once more we begin again. Our focus in this season is getting ready for the coming of our Savior and the profound truth our faith proclaims in the central Christian doctrine of the Incarnation: that God was perfectly united with human nature in Jesus, both fully God and fully human, who “lived as one of us, yet without sin.”

This can be a hard concept to wrap our minds around, but it is one that influences so much of who we are. Our ideas of redemption and atonement are anchored at the core of the Christian belief in the Incarnation. Because of the fullness of both humanity and divinity in the person of Jesus, we are assured that God can identify with the whole human experience, including suffering and temptation, firsthand. This means we can acknowledge our sins and shortcomings honestly and without fear of judgment.

Oh, God does judge us, certainly. But remember, the God we know through Jesus is the fullness of love, perfectly just and perfectly merciful, the very best judge we could possibly desire. God sees us in all our complexities— every virtue, every fault, the whole untidy blend of saint and sinner in each and every soul—and offers healing, grace, and forgiveness.

As my friend Tripp says, “We are judged every day and found to be loved.” Thanks be to God!

On November 30, we will begin a 4-part series called “A Child Is Born: A Beginner's Guide to Nativity Stories.” With New Testament scholar Amy-Jill Levine, we will delve into the fascinating connections between ancient birth stories (Isaac & Ishmael, Samson, and Samuel) and the Nativity of Jesus, to reveal how they foreshadow and enrich the timeless Christmas story in the final chapter.

Godly Play! Our Sunday school for preschool and elementary age students is from 9 to 10 AM on Sunday mornings. Visitors are always welcome!

Youth Class. Youth will meet up in the loft from 9 to 10 AM on just two Sundays in December, **December 7 & 14**. These will be fun, Christmas-focused gatherings. Anyone in grades 6-12 is welcome to come join us. On Dec. 21, youth will be making Christmas cookies in the parish hall. There are no Sunday school classes on Dec. 28.

Combined class, December 21, “Christmas cookies.” This is Advent 4 and cookie baking is back! The Sunday school classes (that includes the youth!) will be making Christmas cookies during the Education hour, and sharing them with our parish family during coffee hour. We will be in the parish hall making and decorating sugar cookies from 9 to 10 AM. Adult helpers and bakers are needed, as well as volunteers to bring in the cookie dough (and extra rolling pins). Recipes and sign ups are in the narthex.



Parents’ Night Out, December 21. Our Youth Group will hold an evening of child care so that parents can have a night out. Supervision and dinner will be provided at the church on this Sunday between 4 PM and 8 PM. There will be a variety of activities available during the evening with dinner at about 5 PM. Please sign up in the narthex so we have an idea of how many children are coming.

This is provided as a service by the youth and is at no cost to the parents. Go to dinner, a movie, or get some last minute Christmas shopping done. (This is the Youth Group event for December.)

Nursery will be open for Candles & Carols on Dec. 22, and the 5 PM service on Christmas Eve, but not the late Christmas Eve service, nor Christmas morning service.

Christmas Eve 5 PM service, No Practice Pageant. Any children at the 5 PM service on Christmas Eve are welcome to participate in our “no practice” pageant. See Theresa in the entryway before the

service if you wish to be included – we will be there getting ready into costume between 4:30 and 5.


Blessing Bags in January. The Youth Group will be putting together Blessing Bags in January for parishioners to keep in their cars and hand out to people in need. Any donations of the following are welcome!: **warm socks, gloves, hand warmer packs; toiletries of deodorant, bar soap, small shampoo and conditioner, toothbrushes and toothpaste, combs, razors, nail clippers, Band-aids, plain lip balms, washcloths; food items such as canned ready-to-eat meals with pop top lids, packages of crackers with peanut butter or cheese, granola or protein bars, trail mix or nuts, fruit cups, individual water bottles, gum.** Bring your donations to the church office by January 8, so we can purchase what else is needed; our goal is to pack between 50 and 70 bags.

WinterCross, February 13-15, 2026, is happening at Lazy F Retreat Center in Ellensburg! This retreat weekend is a fun Camp Cross-like experience in the wintertime for youth in middle and high school from around the diocese. 

Jr. Warden's Update

The Pavilion including preliminary landscaping is essentially complete except for a few minor items. The parking lot is in the same condition, and the installation of new surveillance cameras in the back is nearly finished. A couple of the parking stops that are occasionally being driven over will be moved shortly.

We believe the leak that was depositing water in the Nursery has been corrected but we are waiting for a heavier rain before closing everything up (and scheduling the celebration).

A choir member had a serious fall in the altar area of the sanctuary in an area where falls have occurred before. Some temporary rails have been placed and more effective and permanent possible solutions are being evaluated.

A garbage disposal in the kitchen should be replaced by the time you receive this. Due to some temporary

problems one of the dishwashers was temporarily affected but both appliances should be back in service!

Rekeying of the church is essentially complete. Church keys are numbered “1” for most outside doors; “2” for inside doors such as sacristies, janitor’s closet, and classrooms; and “3” for offices, electrical room and, furnace room. If you do not have the new keys you need, please see Rachel Loer in the office, Monday through Thursday, between 9 and 2:30 or make arrangements with her over the phone. If you have any keys (church or otherwise) for disposal please put them in the pink container in the work room and we will see that they are recycled.

A recent power outage in the area showed that we have some work to do on emergency lighting and exit signs. This will be scheduled shortly. If you know of other work we should have an electrician do please let Linda Munson know ASAP (509-521-8981).

Update from Rev. Mark Sluss

Dear members of All Saints’,

I have now been in Seattle for over three weeks and have undergone numerous medical procedures, including examinations, scans, x-rays, biopsies, and spinal taps. I am pleased to report that all results have been very positive.

My most recent bone marrow assessment shows no evidence of leukemia, and the spinal tap revealed an absence of cancer cells in the spinal column. Additionally, genetic analysis of the marrow did not identify any cancerous markers. These findings are encouraging, and it appears that I am currently in remission.

The next stage involves hospital admission to commence another round of chemotherapy aimed at eliminating my existing bone marrow, allowing the donor marrow to successfully engraft.

If you are interested in offering support by spending time with me following my release from the hospital, please coordinate with Jane to sign up via “Sign Up Genius.” There remain available dates during which companionship would be greatly appreciated. We plan to arrange for respite care during periods when visitors are unavailable, and volunteers will help us reduce the cost of hiring caregivers.
