

White House 2024 Post-Election



- Donald Trump elected; plans to restructure federal government.
- Senate confirmation for agency heads may involve political mobilization.
- Recess appointments or Senate blocking likely scenarios.

New York Congressional Races



2024 Post-Election



U.S. Senate

U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand is reelected, defeating Republican challenger Michael Sapraicone, 58.5% to 41.1%.

U.S. House

- **Key flips:** Democrats John Mannion, Josh Riley, and Laura Gillen.
- Notable wins: Reps. Mike Lawler (R), Nick LaLota (R), and Pat Ryan (D)
- Minority Leader Hakeem Jeffries (D) expected to retain leadership of House Democrats.
- Trump nominates GOP Conference Chair Elise Stefanik (R) as U.N. Ambassador.
- Rep. **Mike Lawler** (R) speculated as 2026 NY Governor candidate.



New York State 2024 Post-Election



Governor Kathy Hochul



- **Strong election results:** Four congressional seats gained, Proposition 1 passed.
- Senate supermajority loss may provide leverage.
- Speculated 2026 challenge from Congressman Mike Lawler (R) or leftist opposition.
- Recent moves: Controversial congestion pricing reinstated at \$9.

State Legislature

- Democrats retain Assembly supermajority, while they lost the supermajority in the Senate.
- Minimal partisan shift despite a 10-point swing to the right.
- Key wins:
 - Rep. Pat Fahy (D) replaces retiring Sen.
 Neil Breslin in the Senate.
 - Labor Leader Chris Ryan (D) secures competitive seat in Central New York.
- Open party and committee leadership roles in the Senate and Assembly.
- Special session is possible.





Mayor Eric Adams

- Comments on crime and migrants aligned with Trump's campaign themes.
- Potential legal challenges post-election; changes expected with U.S. Attorney resignation.
- December: Housing rezoning proposal review.
- Upcoming 2025 Democratic primary with ranked-choice voting.



City Council

- Entire Council up for election next year, with 10 open seats.
- Southern Brooklyn, Queens, Bronx trending more Republican.
- Common Sense Caucus expands influence to 9 members.
- **Focus:** Pocketbook issues, City of Yes negotiations, and charter revisions.
- Speaker Adrienne Adams term-limited; outcome linked to mayoral election dynamics





State Proposals

 Proposition 1: An Equal Rights Amendment passed, designed to expand protections to include reproductive health care and other areas.

City Proposals

- Four of five measures passed, including proposals on the City's Department of Sanitation, fiscal impact statements, public safety notices, and enhanced capital planning.
- **Proposition 6:** A diversity initiative failed due to perceived voter sentiment.
