UPDATED APRIL 21, 2020 **SUMMARY OF NEW YORK STATE** COVID-RELATED EXECUTIVE ORDERS On March 7, New York Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo declared a statewide disaster emergency to address the threat proposed by the COVID-19 pandemic outbreak. Upon declaring a state disaster emergency, the governor has the power to direct state agencies to provide assistance to local governments and is authorized to temporarily suspend any statute, local law, ordinance, orders, rules or regulations. This has resulted in a successive set of Executive Orders, all issued under the authority of the March 7 disaster declaration. Below Harris Beach attorneys have developed a brief summary of each of the executive orders to date, and the matters they cover. We will be updating this document regularly as the Governor issues new Executive Orders. NO. 202.22 APRIL 20 • Relaxing the requirements of Article 5 of the Real Property Tax Law by allowing: 1. municipalities a thirty (30) day extension to file tentative and final assessment rolls -which were previously to be filed on or before June 1, 2020; 2. tentative assessment rolls to be published online; 3. suspension of in-person inspection of tentative rolls; and 4. Boards of Assessment Review to hear complaints remotely by conference call or other means so long as complainants and public can participate/view such proceedings. • Allowing the Westchester County Executive to negotiate with towns and cities to accept a lesser percentage of taxes and special ad valorem levies to be paid on May 25, 2020. • Suspending Laws of Westchester County to the extent that those laws require town supervisors and city mayors to waive late payment penalties of county taxes. • Allowing the Nassau County Executive to extend the deadline for payment of the second half of school taxes without interest or penalties until June 1, 2020 NO. 202.21 • Modifying EO 202.20 to allow any officiant, public or private, to solemnize such marriage ceremony using audio-video technology NO. 202.20 • Allowing the granting of marriage licenses remotely and authorizing town and city clerks to conduct marriage ceremonies via video-conferencing NO. 202.19 • Establishing a single, statewide coordinated testing prioritization process for COVID-19, and mandating all laboratories in the State conducting COVID-19 diagnostic testing, both public and private, to follow such process • Providing a \$2,000 per violation per day penalty for non-complying with the EO 202.18 directive that requires any nursing home or adult care facility licensed by the Commissioner of Health to notify a family member or next of kin if any resident tests positive for COVID-19, or suffers a COVID-19 related death, within 24 hours • Prohibiting local governments and local departments of health from taking any action that could affect public health without first consulting with the Department of Health NO. 202.18 • Extending all "NYS on PAUSE" restrictions on public gatherings and non-essential workers, as well as school closures, until May 15, 2020 NO. 202.17 • Modifying directive issued under EO 202.16, requiring the Attorney General to issue no-action or no-filing letters related to essential projects involving affordable housing and homeless shelters • Requiring anyone over the age of two-years-old to cover their nose and mouth with a face mask or cloth face covering when in public space and unable to maintain social distancing protocols
