In 1908, a 74-year-old woman in a London workhouse was recorded singing a song called The Farmacyard: Up I was at my fa-ther farm On a May day morn-ing ear-ly; Feed-ing of my fa-ther cows on a May day morn-ing ears-ly, with a moo moo here and a moo moo there, here a moo, it a moo, here a pret-ty moo. Six pret-ty maids come and gang a-long o'me To the more-ry green fields of the farm.6 Through 1917, a more recognizable version was published in a collection of World War I-era songs: Old Macdougall had a farm in Ohio-i-o, and on that farm he had some dogs in Ohio-i-o, with a bow-wow here, and a bow-wow there, here a bow, there a wow, everywhere a bow-wow. The most modern version simply rolls off a variety of barnyard animals with accompanying sounds, each verse adding the previous sound to a long string until, at the end of the song, children are mooing, neighing, barking, meowing, quack, and clucking. The song can continue as long as the singers have and can think of new animals to add to the repertoire. Dating back to 1870s Wales, This Old Man is a fairly established nursery rhyme. What is believed to be the original version was not published until 1937, however, and the version familiar to most of us was published in 1906. The most common version runs: This hubby, he played one, he played knick-knack on my thumb; With a knick-knack paddywhack, this old man came rolling home. This old man, he played two, he played knick-knack on my shoe. With a knick-knack paddywhack, this old man came rolling home. Most modern versions replace patty whack for Paddywhack, a more politically correct term given that Paddy can be interpreted as a derogatory term often translated as brawny Irish. Some historians have also suggested that the more modern version was prompted by a famous pervert who would offer to play paddywhack with young passers-by in a particular colonial city. The song spread as a way for the townspeople to let the old man know they were on him, and to warn children away from him. An even earlier version was reproduced and published by Anne Gilchrist, who said she learned it from her Welsh nanny. With its quaint language, the lyrics clearly precede the old man's version, and are suitably innocent as a child song.
