

#### ROBERT ELLIOTT OBITUARY



Robert Elliott Jul. 29, 1939 - Oct. 21, 2022 Robert Wayne Elliott died in Huntsville, Alabama on October 21, 2022 at the age of 83. He was born in Wichita Kansas on July 29, 1939, the son of a World War I veteran (Paul Emil Elliott) and Grace Darling Elliott (ne Mahieu), who was the daughter of pioneers and homesteaders in western Kansas. Bob. as he was


known to all, graduated in 1967 with a Master of Science degree in Electrical Engineering from Wichita University. While in college, he was active in the Beta Theta Pi fraternity, interned at the Institute of Logopedics in Wichita, served in the Kansas Army National Guard, and got his first engineering job working in aerospace control systems for Beech Aircraft. He also played piano for weddings, parties, and other events.

On June 1, 1963, Bob married his college sweetheart Sally Anne Fenn at Woodland United Methodist Church in Wichita, where both were members of the choir and served as youth Sunday School instructors. Bob, a basso profondo, remained an active church choir member for most of his life, first at Woodland, then at the First Evangelical Free Church in Wichita, and still later at Calvary Bible Church in Huntsville.

In late 2019, he retired from singing in the choir at First United Methodist Church in downtown Huntsville, where he and Sally had become members in the early 1990s. Bob and Sally also served their communities as volunteer stroke judges and timers for the Wichita Swim Club and the Huntsville Seahorses Swim Team and as volunteer "Grubbers" at the Huntsville Botanical Gardens. After Beech, Bob went to work for the Boeing company, where he spent the rest of his career working on a variety of defense and aerospace projects. Relocating from Wichita in 1981, he led one of the first Boeing teams in the company's "return" to Huntsville prior to the construction of Boeing's Jetplex plant. Major projects he developed or led included: the gimbal control system for the Forward-Looking Infrared (FLIR) sensor deployed on the B-52 G and H model aircraft flown by the US Air Force; the first automated avionics test systems employed on US Navy aircraft carriers; a number of systems designed to support the effectiveness and safety of US Army Special Operations forces; and environmental control and redundancy systems for the International Space Station.

Bob was preceded in death by his wife Sally in 2016. They are survived by sons Thomas Robert Elliott and Matthew Wayne Elliott and five grandchildren. At the family's request, no memorial service will be held. In lieu of flowers, volunteer or financial memorials could be made to: Caring for Life Hospice Family Care (Huntsville); Heartspring (formerly the Institute of Logopedics) in Wichita; the Huntsville Botanical Gardens; or any youth education, sports, music, or drama organization.



Dear Church Family and Friends of Salida UMC,

This letter is to include you in an important conversation in which the One Board is actively engaged. The One Board is the decision making board of the church which includes all the aspects of leadership in the church, such as Worship & Outreach, Finances & Endowment, Trustees, Lay Leadership and the Staff Parish Relations Committee (also known as the HR aspect of the church). Your voice, as our faith community, is an essential aspect to these conversations.

We celebrate that there are many dedicated attendees each Sunday, and we welcome all our new members and visitors. Our building use is the most active it has ever been, which generates welcomed revenue for us. We host our weekly worship services and church programs, as well as, partner with several community groups to provide a variety of services for individuals and families in need. Many community organizations hold their meetings, classes and services in our building. We are still a destination location for traveling youth groups who come to stay in Salida for skiing in the winter and to enjoy all the summer activities. Last June & July, our wildly successful Summer Raft Guide Dinner Program (now preparing for its 11th year), served over 635 meals to 175 different raft guides, from 38 states and 5 countries, along with 52 hardworking volunteers. These outreach efforts demonstrate our commitment to "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors".

Unfortunately, recent economic challenges have brought difficult realities regarding the overall rising costs in all aspects of running the church. We are also aware that when congregation members pass away, move away for personal needs or choose to make changes in their lives that take them away from this church, it impacts our finances.

Last November, we held our 2023 Stewardship Pledge Drive, which resulted in a significantly lower financial projection for us to build our 2023 church budget. The past five years our pledge income has been consistent at about \$120,000 per year. This year our pledged income is currently projected at \$80,000. While pledged income is the most significant building block for each year's budget preparation, we also benefit from non-pledged income, loose plate offering, building use fees, as well as grants and occasional significant contributions, which we call a "Faith Offering".

Our church operates on a very lean budget, with our largest expense being the Pastor's Financial Package, providing for a full-time Pastor. Many churches across our nation are currently in conversation to determine their needs. Is a full-time, three-quarter time or part-time Pastor needed? Many churches are collaborating with other churches to share the services and financial responsibility of a full-time Pastor. A benefit of being part of the Mountain Sky Conference is that the conference leadership is available to provide resources and support during these conversations.

We are being guided to ask these same questions of our church. As faithful stewards of the finances, we are deeply committed to being resourceful and fiscally responsible. The need for this conversation is not in any way a reflection of our current Pastor, but rather a response to the finances of the church.

Each Pastor's clergy year is July to July. By the end of February we must let our District Superintendent, Chris Carr, know if our church will need to make a change in our full-time Pastor status. If we choose to keep our Pastor status as full-time, we must have a significant increase in funding. If we change our Pastor status to three-quarter or half-time, (which would reduce our Pastor expenses significantly), that decision would be reflected in this spring's appointment process for the upcoming year (July to July).

<u>Please Note</u>: Choosing to retain a full-time Pastor does not guarantee that our current Pastor would be staying, nor does changing our Pastor status to less than full-time guarantee that person would be leaving. Each year, every United Methodist Pastor is subject to the appointment process.

We ask you to prayerfully consider how you can help to improve the financial needs of our church. Here are a few immediate suggestions:

- Become a pledged donor for this year
- Increase your pledge amount for the year, if you are already a pledged donor.
- Make an additional significant donation to the church to be considered a "Faith Offering".
- Designate our church to receive your Required Minimum Distributions from your retirement plans.

Changes in pledge amounts will help us navigate our decision regarding future Pastor status based on what our church can responsibly afford.

#### Please read this message from our Bishop....



#### Mountain Sky Conference – Bishop Karen Oliveto – 1/14/23

I am praying for the laity and clergy of the Mountain Sky Conference as we prepare for worship tomorrow.

A few days ago, I had an interview with Yellowstone public radio. The interviewer, Kay Erickson, wanted to ask me questions about the current events in The United Methodist Church. I steeled myself for her questions but then was delightfully caught off guard by her first question: "What can you say about the reformation happening in The United Methodist Church?"

"Reformation". I like that.

Her question had me exploring the meaning of reformation. One source describes it as "improvement (or an intended improvement) in the existing form or condition of institutions or practices etc.; intended to make a striking change for the better in social or political or religious affairs." Synonyms for reformation include "improvement", "betterment", "correction".

Instead of "split", "schism", or "disaffiliation", what if we saw this moment in the life of The United Methodist Church as a reformation moment?

If we were honest with one another, we would note that it is time for a reformation. While the Gospel message of love of God and neighbor hasn't changed, the world around us has. Our communities are filled with "Nones" (those who have had no encounter with the Church) and "Dones" (those that have left for a variety of reasons, including spiritual trauma). In fact, the "Dones" have increased in numbers as studies show that church attendance has dropped off since COVID. How we share this life-saving, life-transforming love of God in Jesus Christ needs reforming in order to reach people outside the walls of our church.

Imagine a church where all people in your community can call home, receive a welcomed embrace, and find encouragement and strength for the challenges they face.

Imagine a church that sees new people as a gift from God, who possess skills and life experiences that can enrich our common life.

Imagine a church that is a community hub, where people come for learning, recovery, recreation, and creating change.

Imagine worship opportunities that are on days and times other than Sunday mornings, so that people can receive spiritual nourishment and a faith community when they most need it.

Imagine a church that centers those lives that the rest of the world shoves to the margins.

Imagine a church where bible study is intrinsically related to service and acts of justice in the world.

Imagine a church that is less interested in building and ministry maintenance and instead with how to best be organized to meet the needs of a hurting world.

Imagine a church whose connective tissue isn't the building but the strength of the community.

Imagine a church that is always open to the Holy Spirit's leading, allowing itself to change in order to remain faithful.

I am ready to engage in the work of reformation. How about you?
