Reverend's Reflections Getting to Know You

Our relationship with God, in many ways, is similar to our relationships with each other, but particularly in this certain sense: when it is nurtured, it grows. Just as it is the case in any relationship, the more you talk—personally, one-

on-one—the more familiar you become with the one with whom you're speaking; the more time you spend together, the more your lives become intertwined and your personal moments become shared experiences of mutual involvement; and the more you listen to one another, the more you both become recipients of the other.

As we've been considering in our Lenten sermon series, we too often approach God as we might an oversized set of sandaled feet resting at the base of a Jack-and-the-Beanstalk-sized throne. Flawed religious constructs are often to blame for these isolating notions; but Jesus himself taught us something entirely different, reminding us that God surrounds us fully in every breath we take, coursing through our being more deeply than the blood in our bodies. The teachings of Christ showed us that God lives with and within God's creation through every moment as we grow.

So talk with God. Often. Because God is always present with you in any and every room. There's no need to escape to a monastery, or

bend at an altar rail to be in touch with the Life which made you. The presence of God is with you as you read these words, no matter where you stand or sit. Lift your eyes from this page and see God all around you. Close your eyes and feel the presence of God in your soul and in your skin.

This is the essence of prayer.

I hope you will keep in your heart the thoughts we're sharing with one another in worship as we consider the Lord's Prayer and how Jesus taught us was the fullest and healthiest *way* to be with God in conversation. I won't repeat those thoughts here, but for now, will just list some

suggestions for prayerful practices which might help you set aside some moments each day to share yourself with God more regularly, nurturing your relationship with God through staying more often in touch.

Simple suggestions for finding a moment...

1) Consider something—anything—you do every day (in fact, the more mundane the better). Whether it be starting your car or loading the dishwasher, set in your mind to acknowledge God's presence in the room as you begin, and say just one thing to God, either silently or out loud. This can be as simple as "I see You," or as brusque as a complaint about how you don't like the feel of the new soap you bought from the store. This is simply to open conversation and recognize God's company through



- every and any moment. The more often you do this, the more regularly you will be in touch with God, and the longer and more familiar your communications become with God throughout each day.
- 2) Keep your eyes attuned to the light. If you find yourself in a room in which the light enters in a noticeable way, close your eyes in its warmth, lift your heart to God and clear your mind of the clutter, resting still in silence and appreciation for any one good thing which happened since waking up. Instead of afterward saying "Amen" simply say "Thank You," in doing so acknowledging that your communication with God does not end after once again opening your eyes.
- 3) We're presently surviving through some high-tension times. As a result, there are more times than one throughout the day during which something said, or read, or seen causes our anxiety to rise. This actually offers an opportunity to spend more moments with God. Any time something happens which causes your mind to worry about the state of the world. take a moment to lift your soul to Life and say (silently or out loud) "God help me feel Your peace." As you share these words with God, let yourself envision anything in your life which brings a sense of rest to vour heart. Whether it be the smile on the face of a loved one, or the blackness of the space between the stars, let that image rise and stay, so you may enjoy the peace of God's soul in yours through that moment and any similar moment to come before the close of the day.
- 4) Prayer labyrinths are wonderful, but we don't always have the luxury of having one available nearby. You can create one wherever you spend time alone. The only thing a prayer labyrinth does, practically, is provide a space for you to pace slowly and stop at different points to spend a certain amount of time with God in soul. In your own home, or office, or outdoor place of daily-doings, set aside specific spots you can slowly move between, stopping at specific locations in the space (ie if you are

in your family room, you can choose the window, then the lamp, then the doorway) to center your mind in the presence of God, and in each spot pause to either talk with God aloud or simply let yourself be soothed in silence by a sense of the presence of the Holy surrounding. You can practice this daily, once a week, or whenever you feel the desire to connect more fully with God's spirit.

We will, of course, discuss our prayer time with God more in worship throughout the season of Lent. For now, I hope you enjoy this time of spirit-centering as we move each week toward our celebration of Christ's renewal (and our own rebirth!) in resurrection; and I hope you can spend a lot of good time with God wherever you find yourself through the days between Sundays. God bless you on your journey!







Norris Stanford Miller May 2, 1934 – February 23, 2024

HE LOVED AND HE WAS LOVED

Norris Stanford Miller, 89, Beloved Husband, Father, Grandfather, Uncle, and a dear friend to countless others, spread his wings on February 23rd 2024. He was at peace in his assisted living apartment in Denver Colorado, under



the amazing care of Hospice, with his loving daughters by his side.

Norris was born May 2, 1934 on a dry land farm in northwestern Nebraska to Clarence and Marcia Miller. His father passed away when he was 8 years old and his mother was pregnant with her 9th child. After his

father's death, the family endured hardship on the farm until his mother moved the family to Englewood Colorado in 1944. The older siblings all worked after school jobs to help support the family. At the young age of 10 years, Norris took a newspaper route to make his contribution for the family, he also worked at a bowling alley setting pins, and as a bagger at a mom and pop grocery store. He was actively involved in the boy scouts and graduated from Englewood High School in 1952.

In 1958, Norris married Donna Mae Brainerd. They had 3 children, Deborah, Angela and Laura. Norris always went above and beyond to support his family. He worked as a floor mechanic installing flooring and countertops in residential homes. He was a dedicated employee for more than a half century, often working 7 days a week at his job as well as helping family and friends with handy man chores in his spare time. Norris dearly loved his three daughters and was an amazing father. He was loving, patient, kind, understanding and a really fun dad. Norris had a special affection for children and would light up when he saw a baby or toddler.

Norris enjoyed improving and maintaining his mountain cabin where his family has shared many happy memories over the past 60 plus years, celebrating holidays, birthdays and family picnics. He built a doll house for his girls on a steep hillside behind the cabin for them to play in. It was an amazing feat considering logistics. The girls enjoyed the doll house for many years. He always had a project going at the cabin, often times followed by a nap in the cool grass after a hard day's work.

Norris remarried in 1978 to Pat Adams. With the marriage he acquired a son Mark, and Daughter, Kim and eventually several grandchildren. Pat was an enthusiastic woman who would be a partner in adventure and charity. Together they traveled to Alaska, China, Japan, Turkey, Greece, Fiji, Italy, Ireland, New Zealand, Australia, Turkey, Africa and Mexico. He helped to build and repair many churches in Mexico, and taught African farmers to install and use drip-irrigation systems for their crops. At home in Colorado he was involved with building homes for habitat for humanity and was always a helping hand at

the church and to countless friends and neighbors. He was an honest man who always undercharged for his labor or simply donated his time in the name of charity.

Norris and Pat opened their home to foreign exchange students from many countries including Japan, Africa, Argentina and Lebanon. Many of those students, now adults with children of their own, still keep in touch to this day. Norris and Pat relocated from Littleton to Salida in 1998 where they lived for 18 years, making many lasting friendships. They joined a square dance club, enjoyed hiking, cross country skiing, fellowship at the Methodist Church and getting involved in community events. Norris continued to work as a handy man and stayed busy even helping with improvements to the United Methodist Church in Salida.

Norris was preceded in death by; his parents; his wife Anne Patience Miller, daughter Deborah Wolfe, His siblings; Alice Breeden, Douglas (Beth still living) Miller, Mona Nani, Fred Miller, Donna Lockwood, Nancy Horner and Lila Stevens. Norris is survived by his sister, Marguerite (James), Valdez of Littleton, CO; daughter, Angela (John) Page, of Dillon, CO; daughter Laura (Dan) Johnson, of Montezuma, CO; Grandson, Kyle Wilkinson of TX; step son Mark Adams, of Putney, VT; step daughter Kim (Ed) Logsdon, of Fostoria OH, and five step grandchildren.

Joy Rae (Stewart) Findley (b. December 16, 1938), beloved mom, grandma, sister, aunt, and great grandma, passed away on February 26th, 2024. Raised in Fayetteville, Arkansas in the loving home of parents Charles and Mettie Stewart and her three siblings, Charles, James, and June, she graduated from Fayetteville High School in 1956 and the



University of Arkansas (BS/BA in Accounting) in 1959.

After college Joy worked as an auditor for the Dallas County (TX) Schools and the Internal Revenue Service. A blind date at a Texas A&M – SMU football game in November 1960 changed everything. Her date Wayne Findley, a persistent farmer from rural south central Kansas, kept coming back to the big city until she relented. They married (six months later) in May 1961. After a short stint on the farm, they moved back to Dallas when Wayne enrolled in the Perkins School of Theology. Joy and Wayne raised four kids—Doug, Stephen, Kevin, and Stacy—who all managed to leave home and make their own way. While the kids were growing up, Joy went back to school, earned a Master's of Education degree from Wichita State University in 1976, and worked as a public school counselor until 1997.

During this time, Joy was devoted not only to her family but also to the United Methodist churches (UMC) in which Wayne served as minister, including Asbury UMC, Terrell, TX; Douglass UMC, Douglass, KS; Johnson UMC, Johnson, KS; University UMC, Wichita, KS; and First UMC, Hutchinson, KS. When Wayne was asked to serve in the UMC Conference Office, the two of them re-joined University UMC in Wichita, where Joy remained a faithful member to the end. Joy loved to spend her time working puzzles, traveling, reading (especially on contemporary politics), and playing games, very competitively, with friends and family.

Joy is preceded in death by her parents, her husband Wayne, and her brother Charles Stewart, and is survived by her brother James Stewart and sister June Newkirk; children W. Douglas Findley (wife Mary), Stephen Findley (wife Pascale Perraudin), Kevin Findley (wife Lisa), and Stacy Findley; eight grandchildren (Samantha Nelson, Jessica Yang, David McCoy, Allen Findley, Joel Findley, Anna Spradlin, Jonah Findley, and Danny Findley); and two great-grandchildren (Oliver Yang and Graham Findley).
