

Jesus, Thou Joy of Loving Hearts

Was Jesus a Thief?

In our Scripture lesson today, Mark tells us that one day, as Jesus and his disciples *began to pluck heads of grain*. Matthew and Luke both let us know that they did this in order to eat the grain. Wasn't this stealing? After all, we can't go through the grocery store and eat whatever we like from the produce section.

It wasn't stealing because the Lord had made specific allowance for such plucking and eating. In Deuteronomy 24:24, 25, the Lord says, If you go into your neighbor's vineyard, you may eat your fill of grapes, as many as you wish, but you shall not put any in your bag. If you go into your neighbor's standing grain, you may pluck the ears in your hand, but you hall not put a sickle to your neighbor's standing grain. This law didn't justify theft; it was given to benefit the poor, and perhaps the traveler. The economics of ancient Israel included generosity to the poor and the stranger because the Lord had been so generous to his people.

Jesus recapitulated this law in principle for us, when he told his disciples in Matthew 10:8, Heal the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, cast out demons. Freely you received, freely give, as did the Apostle Paul in 1 Corinthians 4:7, What do you have that you did not receive? If then you received it, why do you boast as if you did not receive it?

So, no, neither Jesus nor his disciples were stealing when they are grain from the farmer's field.
