

# Ramblings from the Rector on . . . Overwhelmed

As December came to a close and the calendar rolled over to January, it was immediately filled with important events. The major events were Mark King's retirement (and everything associated with that), the annual meeting, and the search process to find Mark's successor. With everything going in January, I kept thinking, "If I can just get through January, it'll all be okay."

Then February arrived.

Ash Wednesday fell on the 4th Wednesday of the month, the normal day for Vestry meetings; so that meeting had to be moved up a week. That led to a lost week as everyone had to get reports turned in earlier than normal. The Vestry also gathered on the 25th to get to know each other, plan, and meet with a consultant as we continue to develop. Add to that the Parochial Report (the annual report parishes submit to their diocese and the Episcopal church), six Ash Wednesday gatherings with some time at the hospital, a holiday, and Melonie's vacation, and February hasn't been any better than January.

Maybe March will give us time to breathe.

But then I look at the calendar, and March has the Lenten soup and program every Wednesday, jury duty, the special convention to elect our next bishop, the arrival of our next Minister of Music, and all the preparations required for Holy Week. It seems that things just keep piling up with no break. But then I remember what I wrote on February 15 – "How you live your life today is how you live your life."

And while that quote had to do with Lenten disciplines, I could have used that small piece of advice in January and February (and now March). Sometimes our schedules can get so full of things, so busy, and so overwhelmed that we forget our day-to-day lives are a gift. In my case, I was so overwhelmed with the annual meeting, Mark's retirement, the search for a new Minister of Music, interviews, the parochial report, an early vestry meeting, and, and, that I probably missed just being able to enjoy the moment.

As January rolled into February that rolls into March and schedules continue to fill up and get busy and threaten to overwhelm us, remember to find time to appreciate each day. Remember to make time to spend with God. Remember to find time to appreciate the day you have been given. Remember to breathe. You may not be able to avoid being overwhelmed, but you just might find the time to focus on what you have right now.

A substitute comes in and basically clones the ways of the resident musician, but the calling of the interim is more involved as the time is used to prepare for the entry of a permanent musician who is going to be different. This realization has put me on a journey of adjusting my head and discovering the ways of deliberately changing bits and pieces to "rattle the cages," so to speak. This is done to help you become aware that there are different ways that things can be done and managed.

You, as a congregation, have had 28 wonderful years with Mark, who is a well-loved and highly respected musician par excellence. You have been blessed! You are used to the ways of that tenure and those ways are deeply rooted in this church. As I hopefully am helpful at preparing you for the transition, we have to remember that things that are different are just that...different; not good, not bad, just different...and things are going to be different.

It is probably easier for you to tolerate/enjoy the differences that I bring in because you know that I am temporary and I will be gone in a few weeks. The permanent person is just that—permanent—and that will feel different to you...perhaps making you feel more anxious about what is to come. As it just so happened, I ran across some quotes that humored me about the subject of anxiety and I share two of them with you.

"Rule number one is, don't sweat the small stuff. Rule number two is, it's all small stuff." —*Robert Eliot, medical doctor and author* 

"Anxiety's like a rocking chair. It gives you something to do, but it doesn't get you very far.." —*Jodi Picoult, writer* 

I am enjoying working with the choir and the choir has been very receptive of following my lead. Mark and I have worked as a team to get the music planned for the choir through my tenure here. I'm enjoying intersecting with Melonie in the office and talking with and coordinating the services with Father Todd who is being quite helpful with giving language to expectations. I've enjoyed meeting you as time goes by and I really do enjoy that mirror on the organ!

Basically, I'm having a ball here and my hope for you is that you continue to be the delightful people that I have come to know and you share all that you are with the permanent musician as you journey with him. I suspect that the transition will work out just fine.

# A Call for Stephen Ministers

# Are You in Need of Care, Know Someone who could use Care or Have a Calling to Become a Stephen Minister?

### What is Stephen Ministry?

Stephen Ministry began in 1975, when Rev. Kenneth C. Haugk, Ph.D., a Pastor and clinical psychologist, trained nine members of his congregation to assist him in providing care and support to people in the congregation and community who were experiencing life difficulties.

Stephen Ministry is confidential. Only the Stephen Leader and the assigned Stephen Minister know which care receiver is connected to a care giver.

#### Who are Stephen Ministers and what do they do?

One way to put it is that Stephen Ministers are the After People.

#### Stephen Ministers are there:

... after the phone call you hoped you'd never get.

...after the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.

... after the relationship falls apart and the bottom falls out of your life.

... after the doctor says. "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."

... after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."

... **after** the last child honks the horn, waves, and drives away – and the house suddenly seems empty.

... after the gavel comes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.

...after the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.

... after you find a pink slip with your final paycheck.

...after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but your still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the After People. They are ready to come alongside you - -or your friends, neighbors, coworkers, or relatives – and provide comfort and support for as long after as needed.

A **Stephen Minister** is a layperson who has received 50 hours of training in how to provide distinctively Christian care & support.

## Deacon's Corner

This is the time of year that can be as crazy busy than those six weeks between Thanksgiving and New Year's. I noticed as I walked into the parish kitchen on Fat Tuesday night, seeing Betty Markle working her magic in the kitchen, that I wasn't the only one with their hands full. St. John's is blessed with a ton of opportunities for fellowship, and Parish Life is all about bringing us together. Parish Life is a gift to us and to God.

What a contrast this year has been compared to the COVID years, as we gather and celebrate each other and God. I see new faces in the pews, some might be new to me, but others who are coming back to be the hands, feet, eyes and love of Christ. It takes a village to find talent for a new Organist, a video communications person, and just keep up with the day to day. # St. John's Painting

Everyone at St. John's is familiar with the pen and ink drawing of our beautiful church. But have you ever noticed the initials "GSH" in the bottom right corner? Those are the initials of the artist, Grant S. Haines, a longtime member of St. John's. Grant was known for his pastel portraits and oil landscapes. This picture is the only pen and ink that he undertook, purely for his love of St. John's.

Grant was born in 1916 and raised in Winchester, VA. He and his 13-year-old son Billy moved to Hagerstown when he married Doris Madden at St. John's on May 1, 1954. This church was his spiritual home until his death in 2011 at the age of 95.

During his years at St. John's, Grant served as a Lay Eucharist Minister, served on the Fabric and Grounds committee among others, and the Vestry. He was the Senior Warden in the early 1970s when Rev. Knisley sadly took his own life. Grant held the church together during this trying period, stepping in as minister until a substitute could be found. Some of you may remember him giving sermons from the pulpit during this time. Confirmation classes continued to be held, and he and Doris hosted Bishop Leighton at their home afterwards. The church survived!

Later, he and his good friends Jerry Sowers and John Chabot were instrumental in overseeing the restoration of the church cemetery on Mulberry St. They researched plots, dug up old stones and restored the ones they could. It was a labor of love.

Grant loved this church and was proud of its beauty. He said the music was his favorite part of the service, and he loved showing the pipes to visitors. He was a self-taught artist, and later in life taught himself how to play the piano and organ. He was also an avid flower gardener, a gift he inherited from his mother. The eastern redbud on the northeast corner of the church was planted in honor of Grant and Doris' 50th wedding anniversary.

So the next time you see the drawing, remember it's not just "a painting of the church." It is a true gift of the heart done by a proud St. John's Episcopalian.

# Tidbits of St. John's history

The bell tower is built of stone and was given in memory of Sallie Roman Baldwin by her husband Christopher Columbus Baldwin, who was a businessman and eventually appointed by President Cleveland to be the Naval Officer of the Port of New York. Sallie and her family were members of this church. St. John's ran out of money to complete the tower, so they reached out to Baldwin. At its dedication, dignitaries from New York to Philadelphia arrived in private railroad cars to attend the event, which was written up in the society pages of the local paper. The tower has a 3-bell peal.

The bells were cast in New York and brought here by rail car.
