Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday, February 14th, is the first day in the Christian Season of Lent. It is a call to reflections and repentance. It falls on a different date each year because it is dependent on the date of Easter. It can occur as early as 4 February or as late as 10 March.

Ash Wednesday gets its name from the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of the faithful as a sign of repentance. The ashes used are from the previous year's burnt Palm Sunday branches. These ashes are mixed with olive oil. This paste is used at the service to make the sign of the cross as a sign of penance, upon each person's forehead. As it is placed, the minister recites the words: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return", or "Repent, and believe the Gospel."

The Season of Lent

ASHWEDNESDAY BEGINS THE SEASON OF LENT

Lent is a season of soul-searching, repentance, and renewal. It is a season for reflection, taking stock, and starting over again.

Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as a preparatory time for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and when converts were instructed in the faith and prepared for baptism.

By observing the forty days of Lent (Sundays are not included in this count as they are considered a day for celebrating the Resurrection), the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days.

All churches that have a continuous history extending before AD 1500 observe Lent. The ancient church that wrote, collected, canonized, and propagated the New Testament also observed Lent, believing it to be a commandment from the apostles. (*The Apostolic Constitutions*, Book V, Section III.)

Practice, Practice, Practice

Believe it or not, even though Christmas feels like it is just behind us, Lent is about to begin

(Ash Wednesday is February 14 this year). In the church, Lent is a period of 40 days (not including Easter) during which we re-examine our lives and our faith practices as we prepare for the coming of Easter. The practice of re-examination and recommitment dates to the very beginning of the church as new members prepared to be baptized on Easter Sunday. We may ask ourselves, however, **why is the observation of Lent important to us today?**

The reality of the situation is, if we don't take the time to re-examine what's important to us and practice the basics of faith, we run the risk of forgetting who we are, where we've come from, and what God has done in our lives. Every professional sports team gathers before the season begins and focuses on many of the things the players have done since they were small children. In baseball, they field ground balls (and coincidentally, Spring Training also begins on February 14 for many teams this year). In football, they go over tackling and blocking. In basketball they dribble and pass. These are adults who are the best players in the world, and yet their coaches start them off at the very beginning every year. Only the teams who've mastered the basics have a chance of contending for a championship.

As Lent approaches let's be encouraged to get back to the basics of faith. Come to worship regularly. Take time to become a part of a study group to grow in your faith together. Pray daily. Give generously both your time and your money. The basics aren't just for the young or inexperienced in faith. They are for everyone — from the youngest child to the champions of faith who've been an inspiration to us.

Let's take time to refocus on the basics as we begin our journey to the cross with Jesus.

Two Conferences, One Bishop Opens New Opportunities





Wisconsin and Northern Illinois conferences are anticipating the possibility they will share a bishop beginning in the Fall of 2024. Wisconsin's Shared Ministry Task Force membership was approved at the 2023 Annual Conference session and have begun discussions about what this would mean for United Methodists in our state.

Sharing a bishop will not be a merger of our conferences. It will be similar to a two-point charge where separate congregations are served by the same pastor.

The conferences would continue as distinct entities. One bishop would lead the two conferences, appointing clergy, presiding at annual conference sessions, and providing administrative oversight for each separate conference.

Both the Wisconsin and Northern Illinois conferences, separately and together, are thinking ahead about what sharing a bishop might require. Bishop, the Cabinet and Conference leadership will pursue more of innovative partnership and collaborations in future years.

"This is an opportunity for us to think creatively about how both conferences can positively benefit from sharing our strengths across conference lines," stated Rev. Steve Zekoff, chair of Wisconsin's Shared Ministry Task Force. "We have a common history in the early days of our annual conferences, as well as with the historical language-based annual conferences that were organized for ministry in this part of the Upper Midwest. Having our two distinct annual conferences cooperate more closely will be like family members deciding it is time to be more frequently in contact."

Cooperating as a two-annual conference episcopal area could enhance partnership opportunities. For example, churches in both conferences that minister with language minorities could collaborate and achieve more together. Each conference has its strengths, and if yoked in an episcopal area, may be able to assist each other.

Early conversations have occurred involving district superintendents and other staff from both annual conferences. The task forces from both Northern Illinois and Wisconsin will be gathering together for planning discussions this year.

A few statistical similarities and differences between the conferences:

- Both have significant rural expanses as well as urban centers
- Geographic area: Northern Illinois Conference is about 25 percent the size of Wisconsin
- Number of churches: Northern Illinois 321; Wisconsin, 400
- Disaffiliations: Northern Illinois 8; Wisconsin, 43
- Districts: Northern Illinois, 5; Wisconsin is reducing from 5 to 4
 At the 2022 North Central Jurisdictional conference, delegates from Northern Illinois and Wisconsin conferences read a shared statement affirming that the two conferences were willingly considering sharing a bishop, including holding joint conversations.

Over the past several years, jurisdictions have been asked to reduce bishop positions. Some other conferences around the United Methodist connection relate in this way. As United Methodist membership in the U.S. has declined since the 1968 uniting of the Evangelical United Brethren and Methodist denominations each of the five U.S. jurisdictions (multi-state regional bodies) has seen the number of bishops they could elect go down. The number that may be elected is established by a specified membership formula in The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

Serving on Wisconsin's task force are Rev. Steve Zekoff, Rev. Jenny Arneson, Gail Burgess, Lisa Jones and Tou Yang with staff representatives Rev. Barb Certa-Werner, Rev. Sue D'Alessio and Sarah Sneider along with Bishop Hee-Soo Jung. Northern Illinois has a counter-part task force chaired by Rev. Myron McCoy. - By Steven Zekoff




