Everyone is invited to a baby shower for Amber and Jesse Upchurch on March 23rd from 2:00-5:00 at Smiths Grove Baptist Church.


Our current active deacons are Keith Beckham, Harvey Davis and Porter Martin.

Psalm 146 (ESV) — 1 Praise the Lord! Praise the Lord, O my soul! 2 I will praise the Lord as long as I live; I will sing praises to my God while I have my being. 3 Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation. 4 When his breath departs, he returns to the earth; on that very day his plans perish. 5 Blessed is he whose help is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord his God, 6 who made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that is in them, who keeps faith forever; 7 who executes justice for the oppressed, who gives food to the hungry. The Lord sets the prisoners free; 8 the Lord opens the eyes of the blind. The Lord lifts up those who are bowed down; the Lord loves the righteous. 9 The Lord watches over the sojourners; he upholds the widow and the fatherless, but the way of the wicked he brings to ruin. 10 The Lord will reign forever, your God, O Zion, to all generations. Praise the Lord!

Mark 10:46-52 (ESV) — 46 And they came to Jericho. And as he was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a great crowd, Bartimaeus, a blind beggar, the son of Timaeus, was sitting by the roadside. 47 And when he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to cry out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" 48 And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent. But he cried out all the more, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" 49 And Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart. Get up; he is calling you." 50 And throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. 51 And Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" And the blind man said to him, "Rabbi, let me recover my sight." 52 And Jesus said to him, "Go your way; your faith has made you well." And immediately he recovered his sight and followed him on the way.

Sermon Notes

Bartimaeus stands in contrast to the disciples in the preceding sections and symbolizes the ability of those who have in Jesus to see the truth.
At the beginning of the story Bartimaeus is an: he is outside the city, the crowd, the path. By the end of the story he is a model
Recognize who is
Apart from Peter, Bartimaeus is in addressing Jesus by an kind of messianic title ("Son of David") in the gospel of Mark.
The closer we get to the, the clearer it becomes who Jesus is.
Recognize your need for
"What do you want me to do for you?" James and John asked for; Bartimaeus asked for
Place your in Jesus
Romans 10:9, 13(ESV) — 9 because, if you confess with your mouth that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. 13 For "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved."
Give up everything and Jesus
In Mark's gospel the cloak represents status and; Bartimaeus gives up all that he has to follow Jesus on the road (Mark's metaphor for discipleship).
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
